HALLOWEEN IDEAS: FIVE-MINUTE COSTUMES

There are three kinds of people: Those who never spend more than five minutes on a costume; those who never spend less than five hours; those who spend five minutes, but make it look like five, hours.

Here are some costume ideas that will put you in the latter category.

Here are the ingredients: Cutoff jeans; Big hoop earring; bandana for head; long wig; rough beard; stripped shirt or one with big sleeves; fake knife strapped around waist; Bottle with XXX on it.

50s sock hopper: Straight tight jeans, loafers, white socks, side burns, lots of hairdressing.

Jimmy Buffett: Hawaiian shirt, shorts, parrot on shoulder, straw hat, long-neck beer. In other words, what you wear in July.

CARVING THE PERFECT JACK-A-LANTERN

Put the pumpkin on newspaper and see if it stands up evenly. If not, cut off the bottom so it stands up straight. Place the pumpkin in a bowl so it won't roll while you carve.

Cut a round top at an angle so it doesn't fall in. Scoop out the seeds.

Draw a face on the pumpkin and then poke holes every half inch along the outline. You can then easily cut the face, carving from hole to hole. Push the cut pieces out from the inside.

Cut a hole in the bottom the same size as your candle. If you cut the bottom off to make it stand straight, put the candle on a dish and set the pumpkin over it.

Cut a vent hole in the top so heat can escape. Your pumpkin will last longer.

For an artistic pumpkin, buy a book of patterns for cats, witches, and more from a craft store.

Crimestoppers requests your assistance in solving the following crime:

On Wednesday October 22nd, Deputy Ron Boxell was dispatched to the Catherine Taylor residence located at 11753 South Milo road in reference to a stolen vehicle.

Upon Officer Boxell's arrival Mrs. Taylor advised that that morning she looked outside and noticed that her garage door was open and that the garage lights were on. Upon further inspection she noticed that her 1987 Buick 4-door blue passenger car with Indiana registration of 35B3742 was missing. There were no signs of forced entry into the garage and the keys may have been left in the vehicle.

On October 19, 2003 someone gained entry into a storage unit being rented by a Max Walker located at 3020 W. Park Drive. It is believed that the thieves gained entry into the storage unit on Sunday October 19, 2003.




Topics include electrical theory and safety, single pole switches, three and four-way switching, plumbing with pvc and cpvc pipe, soldering copper pipe, leaky faucet repairs, insulation and weatherizing, dealing with unwanted moisture, ground fault interrupters and basic wood framing. A variety of topics will be discussed each night.

Greg Miller, building trades teacher at Southern Wells High School, is the repair guru for this series. A construction veteran, Miller spent 17 years as an independent contractor and five years as an electronics engineering technician with Indiana & Michigan Electric Co. before going into teaching. He has served as an officer for the Indiana State Building Trades Workshops and on the executive committee of the Indiana Vocational Trades & Industry Technical Teachers Association (IVTITTA). Miller received the IVTITTA Building Trades Teacher of the Year Award in 1991.

"As expensive as running a household is these days, keeping up with simple home repairs is terribly important," Perry stressed. "Dripping faucets and running toilets raise your water bills.
