THE UPTOWN GARDENER by Ruth Herring

What great weather we had for the festival this year. Hope all of you enjoyed your time with the long weekend. Thank you to all the people who had part in planning this years event. It is a big chore and we need to realize how much time and effort is given to those who had part in planning the event. For many of the early years from the first festival forward I was a part of the festival in one place or another in planning. You give many hours of your time that is often unseen. So a big THANK YOU to all who served this year.

In my backyard 2 tomato plants and 6 bean bushes they are coming along great I have picked enough beans for me a meal and how great they tasted. There is plenty more coming on so look forward to that. Soon will have 1 ripe tomato. Also I have enjoyed fresh lettuce and peanut butter sandwiches for lunch. That is one of my favorite summer time treats.

This summer with the much rain the rose bushes are suffering black spot which I have been trying to clean up. It is caused from too much rain and humidity. one of the best cures I have found is to bathe the bushes in a solution on 1 ounce of milk mixed into 1 cup water and apply it early morning or late evening, when it has time to dry on the plant. Trim out all the infected areas as much as possible and discard what you trim away. It may take several times to apply but eventually it will help and when watering, water at the base of the plant and try keeping as much as possible away from the foliage of the plant. It is good to also feed it a couple times during this blooming season. I save left over coffee and grounds and pour it over the base of the bushes it provides some acid to soil. I also do this in the winter, so when you see me out in the cold and snow with my coffee pot I am just helping Mother Nature along and thinking spring.

Treva has informed me that the next 2 issues she is going to write about an experience that happened in our family life that was rather frightening at the time. Some of you may recall it being in many newspapers at the time it happened. This will give me a nice break for a while. So happy summer, gardening, vacationing or what ever you might be planning.

Here is a summer kind of salad I like that has not really a recipe to. Dice fresh tomatoes, summer squash, red and green peppers, green onions and fresh chopped basil, make an oil dressing of 1/3 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon garlic powder or fresh garlic rubbed generously around the inside of the bowl, 1/2 teaspoon celery seed, few flakes of red

ON YOUR WAY UP

The Youth Services Bureau of Huntington County is seeking donations for its On Your Way Up program.

The On Your Way Up, a program of the Youth Services Bureau of Huntington County continues to meet the needs of families in Huntington County, said YSB Executive Director Jan Williams. The program began in 1997 at the request of young parents who needed assistance in obtaining items for their children.

The program has three primary components. The On Your Way Up store is the typically entry point into the program. Parents can earn "voucher" dollars by participating in healthy activities for themselves and/or their children. There are 18 community partners who present the vouchers to their clients. Community partners include but not limited

to: WIC, Parkview Huntington, Huntington Health Department, Healthy Families, Early Head Start, local physicians and Bowen Center. Activities include; obtaining pre-natal care, well baby check-ups, remaining in school, and participating in community resources.

Items that are available in the store include; gently used clothing newborn to size 5, diapers, toys, educational books and puzzles, safety items such as gates, locks, etc. and various other items most often needed by families with small children. The program depends heavily on community donations for the majority of items offered in the store. Gifts are tax deductible.

The store is located within the Youth Services Bureau's office located at 1344 Maple Drive. The hours are every Wednesdays 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Families unable to visit during open hours may call the office at 260-356-9681 to schedule an appointment. Educational and informational materials are available at the store. Information includes immunization timelines, lead poisoning, safe sleep, Parkview Live and much more.

The second component of the program is the one-on-one, on-

going support. "There are times when a parent just needs someone to walk them through a rough time," stated Ira Bencun, program coordinator. Additional referrals to other community resources can also be made to help provide the supports the family may need.

The final component is the child safety seat, "Fitting Station". This provides parents with information on the appropriate type of car restraint their child needs, proper installation and possibly the availability of an age appropriate child restraint.

- Gauge/Lid Inspection only for \$3. The dial gauge will be tested for accuracy and the petcock and gasket will be checked for cracks and condition.

- Full canner inspection for \$5. Includes the dial gauge, the safety plug, petcock and gasket and the overall condition of the canner.

You may bring your lid or entire canner during the week of July 7-11 to be tested. Plan to bring it in and leave it for testing and make arrangements to pick it up later in the week. If this week doesn't work for you, please bring your canner in to the Extension Office between 8-4:30 M-F another day of your choice.
