FOOD DRIVE

Saturday, May 10 marks the 22nd anniversary of America's largest single day of giving — the National Association of Letter Carriers Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive in Partnership with the U.S. Postal Service, Campbell Soup, Feeding America and other partners.

Currently, 49 million Americans—1 in 6—are unsure where their next meal is coming from. Sixteen million are children who feel hunger's impact on their overall health and ability to perform in school. And nearly 5 million seniors over age 60 are food insecure, with many who live on fixed incomes often too embarrassed to ask for help.

In 2013, 74 million pounds of food was collected by Postal carriers nationally, feeding an estimated 30 million people. Over the course of the 21-year history, the Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive has collected well over one billion pounds of food.

The food drive's timing is crucial. Food banks and pantries often receive the majority of their donations during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday seasons. By springtime, many pantries are depleted, entering the summer low on supplies at a time when many school breakfast and lunch programs are not available to children in need.

How the Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive Works

Just leave a non-perishable food donation in a bag by the mailbox on Saturday, May 10, and the Postal carrier will do the rest. It's that simple and millions of Americans will be helped. You

WIND GROUP FORMS

Huntington County residents eager to see construction of a \$195 million wind energy project announce the creation of a group called "Citizens for Wind Power" and are inviting those in support of the Plum Tree Wind project to join its public awareness campaign.

Citizens for Wind Power is holding an information and organization meeting 7:30 pm, Monday, May 12 at the Knight Civic Center in Warren, IN. The meeting is open to the public.

Citizens for Wind Power spokesman Luke Vickrey says the group formed to give those in support of the Plum Tree Wind project a stronger voice in the permitting and decision-making process underway by county officials. "We believe many people around the county support the project, but had no way to show it. That's why we created our "Harvest the Wind" yard signs."

The group has already distributed 100 yard signs and just received another shipment. Supporters

can request the free signs at Facebook.com/yessplumtreewind.

Apex Clean Energy is exploring construction of Plum Tree Wind in southeastern Huntington County near the town of Warren. The company estimates a \$100 million impact over its 20-year lifecycle.

Vickrey says members support Plum Tree Wind for a variety of reasons. "Some are motivated by the need for clean, renewable energy. Others believe the entire county would benefit from Plum Tree Wind taxes and jobs. There are landowners who say lease payments would be an important source of revenue to help keep farms in the family."

A statistically valid survey by an independent polling firm found 83% of Huntington County homeowners believe Plum Tree Wind revenue would benefit the community. 79% said they would be willing to have a turbine on their property if they lived in a rural area. 56% said they support wind energy for rural Huntington County. 33% were undecided.

MORE ABOUT THE WIND

We are now experiencing the possibility of monster Industrial Wind Turbines (IWT) becoming reality in Huntington County. The reason being desire of a very few (less than 0.0004% of the county population) who hope to benefit from installation of (proven inefficient - heavily taxpayer supported) IWT at the Plum Tree project. Unrealistic IWT financial, production and safety promises have been made to county officials and land owners alike. A retired (30 Years) Plum Tree Dairy Farmer related he had read the wind turbine contract "word by word" and "found nothing for the land-owner" - "plenty for the company". Sir, I too have read the contract - and you are absolutely correct.

Many nations trusted the IWT hype, created by potential investors and environmental opportunists, on claims of 'electricity with minimal costs'. After 20 years of failure, those same nations now provide solid evidence only promoters and investors benefit. Our government (we the people) and those effected nations have lost disgusting amounts of taxpayer funds to provide majority of support for IWT. Nation after nation - whom believed IWT was salvation for their electric needs - are withdrawing. Denmark, England, Germany, Spain, Ireland and others recently announced government subsidies would be reduced or eliminated. Reasons given: The IWT produce a fraction of electricity promised. Also, they are destroying irreplaceable natural resources. A major concern is numerous illnesses caused by IWT noises, macro-low frequency vibrations and stray voltage waves that are increasing to pandemic proportions. It is documented that cattle, horses, birds and other wildlife are killed by and do not adjust to IWT. It was

therefore amazing when the local promoter's rep used a picture of horses with large turbines nearby, to advertise an 'Informational Meeting' in Warren.

Australia and New Zealand medical personnel are now leading a world-wide movement to control IWT. They are receiving cooperation from several countries, including the U.S. & American Medical Association. Ultimate goal: Ban IWT. Every day new medical evidence is presented to further confirm IWT create dangerous health problems. The World Health Organization recently entered the fray, releasing new information on IWT. (1) They advise that setbacks for IWT be at least 4,560 feet. (2) "Measurable effects of noise on sleep began at levels of about 30dB...When noise is continuous, the equivalent sound pressure level should not exceed 30dB indoors, if the negative effects on sleep are to be avoided. For noise with a large proportion of low-frequency sound (dB(C) a still lower guideline value 5 dB less is recommended". (Our present ordinance: 1,000' Setback - 60 dB Noise). If WHO issues a 'World Health Problem' designation for IWT, they are history.

Why should any sensible person or entity place trust in an outfit that refuses to provide a verifiable Certified Financial Statement for examination. Why would you buy insurance from a company that denies access to their financial history? Why should we trust this promoter and their verbal assurances? Why?

Local effects of IWT: Plans and dreams of building a new home or enjoying an existing home (gone); People desiring relocation to this area (gone); our blessing of abundant wildlife, including Bald Eagles (gone); other natural resources (gone); recreational facilities adversely effected (gone); or looking across an unencumbered field and enjoying nature at its finest (gone).

BIKE AWARENESS

Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV), Don Snemis, announced that the BMV is launching a Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Campaign during the month of May aimed at riders and motorists alike.

According to the Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), motorcyclists are 30 times more likely than occupants of cars to die in a crash, and five times more likely to be injured.

"This campaign is aimed at all Hoosiers. We encourage riders to wear safe and appropriate gear. We also encourage motorists to be alert and aware of their surroundings while driving. Two-thirds of motorcycle accidents are caused by another vehicle violating a motorcyclist's right of way. Too often, drivers simply fail to notice motorcycles on the road. It's everyone's responsibility to create as safe of an environment as possible when on our roads and highways," Snemis said.

BUILDING SAFETY WEEK

Indiana Governor Mike Pence has declared the week of May 4-10 as Building Safety Week, and the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS) is reminding Hoosiers how building inspections help with Hoosier safety.

The Fire and Building Safety Division of IDHS is responsible for inspecting thousands of public structures a year, including schools, child care centers, nursing homes, hospitals, restaurants, office buildings and hotels.

"Building safety and fire prevention officials, architects, engineers and all those in the construction industry, work year-round to ensure the places we live, learn, work, worship and play are safe," said Dean Illingworth of IDHS's Division of Fire and Building Safety. "Countless lives have been saved due to the implementation of building and fire safety codes by state and local code officials."

Homes and buildings that are built in compliance with building safety codes result in resilient structures that minimize the risks of death, injury and property

damage. Regardless of the department code officials work in—building, fire, planning or elsewhere—they work hard every day to provide public safety by ensuring buildings are constructed safely. Because resilient structures minimize the risk of property damage, property owners may pay lower insurance costs and millions of taxpayer dollars can be saved when rebuilding from natural disasters.

Hoosiers can make the places they live safer by taking simple steps. A few are:

- Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of a home.
- Test smoke alarms each month and change the batteries at least once a year.
- Develop a family action plan for a disaster, and include an escape plan from every room in the house in case of a fire.
- Use surge protective devices to protect electronic appliances.
- Routinely check the condition of electrical appliances and wiring for damage.
- To avoid damage and injuries during an earthquake, hang heavy items such as pictures and mirrors away from beds, couches, or anywhere people sit, and store breakable items such as bottled foods, glass and fine dinner ware, in low, closed cabinets with latches.
- Retrofit an interior room to be a safe room, which can withstand up to 250 mile per hour winds.

Weekly themes during Building Safety Month are: May 5-11, Code Officials: Keeping Fire in its Place; May 12-18, Code Officials: Helping Homeowners Weather the Storm; May 19-25, Code Officials: Surround Your House with Safety; and May 26-31, Code Officials: Building a

Brighter, More Efficient Tomorrow.

In addition, an American Psychological Association (APA) workplace survey found that nearly one-third of employed adults report difficulty balancing work and family life. As families across the country pause to celebrate the women in their lives this Mother's Day, the Indiana Psychological Association is calling attention to the unique stressors that women face and the health consequences they may experience as a result.

According to APA's 2013 Stress in America™ survey, while most men and women say that stress management is important to them, women seem to have more trouble than men in reaching their stress management goals and are also more likely to report symptoms of stress. However, women are more likely to recognize that their stress affects their health and are more likely to think psychologists can help with stress management.

"As health care decision makers, and often, caregivers for their families, women tend to put others' needs before their own," Carrie Cadwell, PsyD, HSPP, Indiana Psychological Association Public Education Campaign Coordinator said. "With so many competing responsibilities, women often don't take time for themselves and their overall wellness can be compromised. This Mother's Day, let's give all

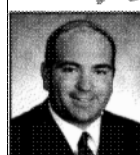

the moms we know a break to help lighten their stress and enjoy the day."

APA and IPA offer these healthy lifestyle strategies for busy women, mothers, and caregivers:

Take care of yourself — Set aside time at least once a week to engage in healthy activities that you enjoy. Try going for a long walk, listening to music, or reading something that interests you to relax. Making time for yourself will help you manage stressful situations and allow you to better care for the whole family.

Recognize how you deal with family stress — Some people deal with stress by engaging in unhealthy behaviors, such as smoking, drinking, comfort eating, or yelling and becoming irritable. Remember that stress is inevitable. What makes the biggest difference is how you manage that stress.

Prioritize — You can only do one thing at a time. Delay or say "no" to the unimportant tasks, and make appointments for more important tasks, such as spending quality time with a spouse or child.

Be organized — Remember that organization reduces stress. Keep the family and yourself organized by putting family health information in separate folders, getting family members to keep laundry in color-coded baskets, and keeping book bags in assigned bins. Last-minute searching for things adds to mom's stress. Enlist your children's help in developing an organizational plan for your household; if they are involved in the planning, they will be more likely to follow through.

Ask for help — Enlist and accept help from others, including friends and family. Identify ways your family can help with specific needs that must be met, like providing a meal or babysitting, so you can find time to take a break and rejuvenate. Take time to connect with your girlfriends when you are feeling overwhelmed. Strong female friendships can help women overcome stressors. If you feel overwhelmed by stress or the unhealthy behaviors you use to cope, you may want to talk with a psychologist who can help you address the emotions behind your worries, better manage stress, and change unhealthy behaviors.

SEASON OPENS

Connersville, Indiana - The Whitewater Valley Railroad opened to the public today May 1st, 2014 with the 10am Whitewater Limited Excursion to Metamora, Indiana. This opens the 40th Anniversary Season for the non-profit railroad history organization. Formed in 1972, the new non-profit organization leased the out of service track between Brookville and Connersville from the struggling Penn Central Railroad. Purchasing a locomotive and a small fleet of passenger cars was the next step for the new group and after spending most of 1973 getting the former New York Central Whitewater Branch up and running it was time to begin train operations. The first public trip departed South Connersville Station on Saturday May 25th, 1974 with local and state dignitaries aboard. The first trains operated to Brookville with a scheduled stop in Metamora to unload Metamora passengers and take a ceremonial photograph with the special guests. The train then continued on to Brookville with passengers for a short layover before returning to Metamora and then back to Connersville. This would be the schedule for each Saturday, Sunday, and Holiday May October in 1974. In 1975 this all changed as the lined washed out between Brookville and Metamora before operations resumed for the 1975 season. Operations were scaled back to trips between Connersville and Metamora which departed noon on Saturday, Sunday, and Holidays May October. This is the basic schedule we operate today.

Connersville to Metamora Schedule for the WVRR's 40th Anniversary Season:

Valley Flyer - Connersville-Metamora

Visit Historic Metamora, Indiana without worrying about parking!! This train departs from our Connersville depot at 12:01 pm on every Saturday and Sunday between May 1 and October 31. Platted in 1838, Metamora is a restored canal town. Visit the working grist mill, restored canal and lock, operating replica horse drawn canal boat, historic covered aqueduct, and over 40 shops and restaurants during the 2 hour layover. Trains consisting of vintage equipment departs Connersville's Grand Central Station at 12:01 pm on Saturdays, Sundays, and major holidays, May through October. The Valley Flyer departs Metamora for the return to Connersville at 3:30 pm, arriving at the Connersville Station at 5:00 pm.

The round trip fares for this train are \$22 for adult and \$14 for children, one way fares are \$16 for adults and \$9 for children. Caboose tickets are available for \$25 adult and \$16 child.

Please note that the Metamora Excursions will not operate June 20, 21, 22 & 27, 28, 29, 2014 due to a special event.

Whitewater Limited - May 2014

This is a special running of our Connersville to Metamora excursion departing every Thursday and Friday in the month of May. Enjoy a scenic train ride though the Whitewater Valley on the Valley Flyer excursion. Relax as you travel back in time to the historic town of Metamora. Visit the working grist mill, restored canal and lock, operating replica horse drawn canal boat, historic covered aqueduct, and over 40 shops and restaurants during the 2 hour layover before your return trip to Connersville. The train departs Connersville at 10:00am. The price is the same as the Valley Flyer service.

The round trip fares for this train are \$22 for adult and \$14 for children, one way fares are \$16 for adults and \$9 for children. Caboose tickets are available for \$25 adult and \$16 child.

Overland Limited - Wild West Train

I think he didn't want to reveal his favorite spot even to a little kid like me. But that was ok he always brought home a nice bunch of fresh mushrooms we all enjoyed.

Mom would soak them in salt water to get the creepy crawlers out then drain them well and flour them and fry in our good fresh made butter. What a treat that was.

One thing she made quite often if we could afford the lemons was fresh made lemonade and pie made from scratch. This is her recipe for pie.

Mix 2 tablespoon cornstarch, 3/4 cup sugar and 1 cup boiling water stir well and place over fire and cook till thickens. Add 1 tablespoon butter, 2 beaten egg yolks, dash of salt, 1/4 cup fresh squeezed lemon juice and grated rind of 1/2 lemon, cook about 3 minutes pour into baked pie shell, cover with the beaten egg whites and 2 tablespoon sugar and 1 teaspoon cornstarch added put over the pie filling and brown lightly in oven.
