## YOU CAN PUT THE PAST ASIDE AND HAVE AN ENJOYABLE THANKSGIVING DAY

More family reunions are held in November than at any other time of the year. Summer reunions may include more distant relatives, but this reunion is with your parents, brothers and sisters, and their kids. It's Thanksgiving dinner.

Now the table is resplendent with turkey and all the trimmings. Family members are smiling at each other and talking about what they are thankful for.

It's not perfect, but it doesn't have to be. Doctors at the New Life Counseling Service of Indiana say setting aside previous negative experiences for two or three hours takes a level of maturity and sensitivity that most adults should have.

Parents should realize their grown kids should be treated as adults. Children must act like guests and display the respect and congeniality they would offer in the home of a friend.

· Grandparents should not overrule parents, but parents should relax some rules so grandchildren and grandparents can have a good time. Kids need activities. Let them trace their hands on paper and cut out turkey place cards.

## CHEESE: THE TOOTH PROTECTOR

Researchers are focusing on foods that protect against tooth decay. According to Nutrition Reviews, cheese tops the list. Doctors say cheese thwarts cavities by neutralizing acids in plaque, by enhancing the removal of cavity-causing sugars, and by "remineralizing" tooth enamel with high amounts of calcium and phosphorus. Cheese is especially effective in protecting against tooth-root decay, a problem for older adults.

One caution: cheese is high in saturated fat and cholesterol, so don't eat too much of it.

## HOW TO BEAT AFTERNOON SLUMP

If you feel sleepy in the afternoon, choose a snack that will boost your blood sugar level and keep it constant for the rest of the afternoon. Some good choices:

- Eat a banana and some string cheese to boost your energy.
- Try a box of whole-grain cereal with a small carton of low-fat milk, available in many places.
- Put two tablespoons of peanut butter on a rice cake or whole-wheat bread or crackers. The good monounsaturated fat in peanut butter is

## CLICK IT OR TICKET

The fatality rate for teenage drivers is about four times as high as the rate for those drivers age 25-69. Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teenagers 15-20 years old.

During the upcoming holiday season, Huntington County Police Agencies will be patrolling local roadways looking for drivers and passengers not buckled up especially young drivers. The increased enforcement is part of Click It or Ticket, a program of the Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving. Accompanying enforcement efforts will be a television and radio campaign especially focused on Indiana's young drivers.

"If teens would just take two seconds to buckle up, it could save their life," stated Chief Terry Stoffel, Huntington Police Depart-

Law enforcement officers from Huntington, Huntington County and Warren will continue in their commitment with Click It or Ticket. This Click It or Ticket campaign is in conjunction with Operation ABC (America Buckles Up Children) Mobilization. ABC Mobilization is a nationwide enforcement effort to crack down on those drivers who fail to buckle up themselves and their child passengers. Increased traffic enforcement begins on November 17.

"It's important for everyone to buckle up," said John Kreiger, Huntington Police Department, "but our teenage drivers seem to need a bit more of a reminder."

Law enforcement agencies from across the state participate in Click It or Ticket. The Governor's Council, a division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute, implemented the program to increase Indiana's seatbelt usage rate. The Council, along with departmental efforts from Huntington County Agencies, is committed to increase seat belt usage and decrease impaired driving crashes, fatalities and injuries.



## By: Dr. Kevin J DeaKyne DDS, PC **EXTRACTIONS AND POST OP TIPS**

An extraction is a removal of one or more teeth for various reasons. Either your general dentist or a specialist called an oral surgeon using local anesthetic and/or I.V. sedation performs this procedure.

Unfortunately, in this day of fluoridated water, toothpaste, brushes and floss, patients still have teeth that are decayed beyond repair, so an extraction is the only option.

Other reasons for an extraction are wisdom teeth (3rd molars) that need removed, periodontal disease or bone loss, trauma, cracked teeth, or orthodontic reasons.

After removal of teeth there are some tips to help the patient cope postoperatively. They are as follows:

- 1. Apply pressure with gauze for 15-30 minutes after treatment to stop hemorrhage.
- If the bleeding continues a moistened tea bag placed over the
- extraction site and continuing to apply pressure should help. 3. Also, patients need to take pain medication before the anesthetic wears off. Post op pain is then more easily controlled.
- 4. Refrain from smoking for 2-3 days.
- 5. No rinsing or swishing around the site.
- 6. Avoid carbonated drinks.

There are cases when a patient can develop a "Dry Socket", meaning that the blood clot was lost from the extraction site. This results in great discomfort. You will need to see your dentist to have them treat the site with a dressing one or more times until this area is healed.






