PROTECT YOURSELF

Financial Bank, conjunction with the American Bankers Association (ABA), is taking an active role to help the community by providing safety tips for consumers when using their mobile device(s). While these handy gadgets provide convenient access to your email, bank and social media accounts, they can unfortunately also potentially provide the same convenient access for criminals.

iAB and the ABA suggest military and civilian government following these tips to keep you and your information safe:

- Use the passcode lock on your smartphone and other devices. This will make it more difficult for thieves to access your information if your device is lost or stolen.
- Protect your phone from viruses and malicious software, or malware. Do this just like you do for your computer by installing mobile security software.
- Use caution when downloading apps. Apps can contain malicious software, worms, and viruses. Beware of apps that ask for unnecessary permissions.
- Avoid storing sensitive information. Passwords or a social security number should never be stored on any mobile device.
- Be aware of shoulder surfers. The most basic form of information theft is observation. Be aware of your surroundings especially when you're punching in sensitive information.
- Wipe your mobile device before you donate, sell or trade it. Use specialized software or use the manufacturer's recommended technique to be sure your mobile device is wiped clean. Some software allows you to wipe your device remotely if it is lost or stolen.
- Beware of mobile phishing. Avoid opening links and attachments in emails and texts, especially from senders you don't know. And be wary of ads (not from your security provider) claiming your device is infected.
- Watch out for public Wi-Fi. Public connections aren't very secure, so don't perform banking transactions on a public network. If you need to access your account, try disabling the Wi-Fi and switching to your mobile network.
- Log out completely when you finish a mobile banking session.
- Download the updates for your phone and mobile apps.





How to donate blood

High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

THE PROPER CARE AND FEEDING OF YOUR BOSS

If you're in a work situation where you aren't getting along with your supervisor or boss, it can be easy to forget that the person who keeps giving you a hard time is also a human being with feelings and problems you aren't seeing.

And why does that matter to Because studies have shown that one of the most important things affecting someone's job performance, stress levels, and overall job satisfaction and happiness is the relationship they have with the person above them.

So what can you do? The only way to improve such situations is for you to take a proactive role in creating a more positive relationship with that person above you.

Start by learning what's important to him or her as a person. Make an effort to find out if there are pet peeves, or things about your department or company that matter greatly to him or her. Does your boss have a difficult boss?

Try to understand what your supervisor expects from you. It isn't always obvious. Ask questions and seek clarification. Is it timely reports, meeting deadlines, and showing initiative? A certain dress code? Or seemingly trivial things that he or she finds important? Understanding what matters to your boss makes it easier to meet such goals, or to discuss alternatives that will still keep I him or her happy.

It also helps to be flexible and understanding. While • frustrating to have meetings rescheduled or interrupted by ■phone calls, there's often a reason for a supervisor to make Supervisors changes.

You want keep to communication open and a twoway street, rather appearing closed off and unapproachable. Good ideas seldom follow a schedule, and emergencies never do. Make it easy for your supervisor to talk to you. And, sometimes, take the initiative. Do a quick checkin with your boss on how things are going, or to discuss an idea or concern of yours.

Make it your job to create a positive relationship with your supervisor. Each of you should feel that you understand the other and can openly talk to each other. With such a relationship, it usually means a more positive, enjoyable work environment where sharing and positive ideas accomplishments can flourish.

IF YOU MUST WORRY, DON'T WASTE IT

For too many, anxiety Velcro's itself to their emotions and serves up exhaustion.

The causes of anxiety may come slowly as arthritis, bringing pain and immobility. It may come quickly with the words, "I want a divorce." The cause may be the amputation of a limb after a horrible accident, an unexpected coronary that allows depression to come sweeping in. It may be an outof-control anger from a friend or

stranger. It may be shock waves from three words that become giants as you hear them spoken, "You are fired."

If possible, ease the pain of whatever is the cause by mixing achieving with grieving. Though divorce is traumatic, a marriage may have been close to a living hell. An amputated limb may have saved a life. A friend of mine recently fell and severely fractured his jaw. Because of it they found cancer which was then successfully treated. The job you were fired from was a job you had wanted to quit for years. It makes sense to look hard for silver than more often than shadows in the clouds. Let's put it this way, "Don't just complain about the weather, buy an umbrella."


Talking about a problem with some-one close can help perspective. You can be so overwrought you put a wrong slant to the thing that's worrying you, or you may have misinterpreted the problem. Maybe the other person has gone through what you are going through or something similar. It is a mathematical solution really because two points of view are always better than just one.

Or pause and try placing your problems and anxieties second in line while considering the problems and anxieties of someone else. That's a tall order, but it is truly the best way to keep from being overwhelmed by self pity.

A case in point. One of our grand-daughters broke her foot. After moping about the house for a day or two, bemoaning the fact that the accident had really put a crimp in her plans, her mother gently reminded her that things could be much worse. That she should consider the plight of a friend, who has M.S. She did and immediately her perspective of her miseries changed.

Another example, but in reverse this time. I was actually the recipient of such concern. A rather large load of trouble had been thrown in my direction. I was handling it but not as well as I would have liked to. And then I got a note, a simple, caring note from a friend. I will never forget it because it came at a time when his friendship and concern, meant everything to me. One part of his note
