I have worked in EMS for 24 years. When I was an EMT working as a volunteer in this great town, we knew everyone and knew where everyone lived. Just like everything in our lives, this has changed. I now work as a dispatcher for the EMS in Huntington County. You have no idea how the green reflector house number signs make my job and the EMS people trying to find your house so much easier. Not all the great EMS people know where you or your family live.

In this county and the Town of Warren there are a lot of houses without house numbers. If you or your family would call for help because one of your loved ones were not breathing or had a fire and you had no house number, it sure makes our job of getting to your loved one and home quite a chore. Not all maps in our computer system are correct. We need house numbers that can be seen from the street.

Please help your local fire department and EMS system get to you faster and in the end you get a free pizza from East of Chicago, thanks to Jeff and Becky. If you have a green reflector sign with your house numbers, the pizza will still be hot when you call for delivery.

Go to the Warren Clerk's office and order your sign. Pick the sign up at East of Chicago and get your coupon for a free pizza. In the end this supports the Warren Fire Department and the whole town.

COUNCIL NOTES

President Bill Cartwright conducted the March 26 meeting of the Warren Town Council. Held in Assembly Hall, the meeting opened at 6:30 p.m. with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the March 12 meeting were approved as submitted. Heartland/Saturn Wheel is undergoing a major building project. The CEDIT request was to be in the office of Carol Pugh at HCUED by Wednesday. The total cost for utilities was expected to be \$330,000. Council approved to request \$275,000.

Spring Clean-up Days for Warren is set for May 6 to 12. Roll-offs will be located at the town barn on West Second Street.

Trash collection will follow the regular schedule on Good Friday.

IMMDA meeting will be held in Mishawaka at 11 a.m. on April 18.

Council members were in receipt of a letter explaining the Governor's Purchasing Directive.

INDOT Trash Bash is scheduled for April 7 to 23.

Council approved Krista Brubaker to be a summer employee for the town.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison reported the 20076 Budget has been approved.

HAS Accounts Procedures are in place.

Council agreed to closing of an unimproved street.

Curtis Day reported from the Utility/Street Departments. He said crews had started working on alleys. He noted that all alleys are to be improved by the time the project is completed.

There are also 20 street signs to be replaced.

Fire Chief Lee Poulson thanked Council for use of chairs from Assembly Hall for a meeting at the Fire Station.

Council approved a request from Marshal Dennis Spitler concerning Huntington County Communications System.

The Park Board is scheduled to

meet April 9.

IACT Roundtable will be April 10 at Grabill.

Council will meet April 9 and 23 at 6:30 p.m.

NEW SENIOR SCAM

The IAAAA Education Institute wants to warn seniors of the latest scam to separate them from their money. It's happening right here in Indiana.

A female caller, who was representing herself as calling from Social Security, contacted a senior Monday in northern Indiana. She said the senior had been approved for a \$5,000.00 grant. She asked for the senior's last 4 digits of the Social Security number, her bank account number and her bank routing number because there would be a \$300 service charge for processing the grant.

Melissa Durr, CEO of the Association said, "Remember, unless Social Security is contacting you as a result of a problem that YOU requested that they resolve, Social Security will not phone you. They will also not ask you to verify your Social Security number since they already have it and they certainly won't be asking for your banking information."

Durr continued, "If you, or anyone that you know, has been contacted by a call of this nature, remember to report it to your local Area Agency on Aging by calling 1-800-986-3505. The AAA will file a complaint and forward the information to the appropriate agency for further investigation. If you have provided any information, report it to your bank so they can take the appropriate procedures."

This is not the first time

scammers have been in action. Earlier this year, seniors in Georgia received collect calls from individuals claiming they represented Medicare or the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Once seniors accepted the charges, the callers asked them to verify personal information (i.e., name, address, Medicare number and bank routing numbers). Durr advises that if individuals receive collect calls from scammers claiming to work with Medicare or Social Security they should not accept the charges. These types of incidences are likely to occur more often and people with Medicare should be on guard and protect themselves. The IAAAA Education Institute wants older adults and persons with disabilities to be aware of the potential for fraud and offers some tips on how to protect themselves and their important financial and personal information. "If someone contacts you and pressures you to buy, hang up the telephone or close your door," said Durr. "If you have questions about the viability of the product being sold, explore it further on your own. Make sure to clarify what is covered, what the cost of the product is, how to cancel if you change your mind and that you understand what you are buying. If these questions can't be answered by the salesperson, then the product is probably not for you."

The following tips will also help older adults and person with disabilities detect and prevent them from becoming victims of fraud:

- * Never sign anything you don't understand; Have an attorney or trusted adviser review it.
- * Stay socially active. Isolation

increases your risk of becoming a victim.

- * Don't give out your credit card number over the phone or Internet unless you initiate the transaction.

- * Shred or tear into small pieces all mail solicitations, bank records or any other discarded documents that contain identifying personal information.

- * Be aware of scams. If you're told you just won a prize, you probably haven't, and if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

BABYSITTER'S TRAINING

To help improve the safety of young children left in the care of adolescents, the Huntington County Chapter of the American Red Cross is offering Babysitters Training on Saturday, April 21st, 2007 from 9am to 3pm at the Courthouse Annex 354 N Jefferson St Room 204.. The cost of the class is \$30.00. This course instructs youth on how to care for infant through school age children by teaching them how to prevent injuries and what to do if an emergency arises.

The American Red Cross Babysitters Training is designed for youth age 11-15. It provides adolescents with a range of injury prevention, first aid, and basic childcare skills. 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



FREE SCREENING KITS

Since 2005, Parkview Hospital's Community Health Improvement Program has provided nearly 18,000 EZ Detect colorectal cancer screening kits to people in northeast Indiana. "This year Parkview plans to continue its colorectal cancer-screening initiative," said Teresa Tracey, manager of Parkview Hospital's Community Health Improvement Program. "The educational message of this initiative is that it is important to do blood-stool screening annually to reduce your risk of colorectal cancer and to identify

colorectal cancer in its earliest stages."

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths. On average, one in 20 people will develop colon cancer. Yet if diagnosed and treated in the early stages, colorectal cancer is highly curable.

Beginning at age 50 (age 45 for African-American men and women), the American Cancer Society recommends that people at average risk for developing colon cancer have a fecal occult blood test yearly and a sigmoidoscopy every five years. People with higher risk factors may need to begin screening at an earlier age. A colonoscopy screening may also be recommended.

THE UPTOWN GARDENER

Several have asked me if the peas I planted on St. Pats day are up yet. Yes they are peeking thru the ground very nicely and this week I must get out there and put a row cover over them or the birds will have them picked down to the ground. Row cover material is nice to have, it is a very soft sheer fabric and light weight, that can be draped over vegetation and still lets light, air and moisture thru. It also keeps the temp a few degrees warmer under it. I use it a lot in the spring and fall when the weather is unsettled and unpredictable such as this week may be. I have several tender leaf perennials up that may need protection. Tulips and daffodils I don't get concerned as the usually come thru ok, sometimes a bit scrubby looking, but they usually survive the cold.

I am concerned about the fruit trees as some of ours are ready to bloom. It can be a critical time for them.

We are thinking about planting potatoes Friday but if we get more rain or snow I won't be out there doing so. We are still using potatoes we grew last year but will soon be needing to buy some. Sure was nice to have home grown ones all winter.

Soon the mushroom season will be here and for many years I would look forward to that time. For the past few years I have not been able to ramble thru the woods in search of them. How I miss it. When I was at home I would hunt for them as I went after the cows for milking. I can remember one particular year I was on my evening journey and I had spotted a patch of unusual wild flowers and the need to investigate them and behold in front of them was this patch of 50-75 mushrooms. I was so thrilled having never found that many in one spot before. I knew I may not come back this way with the cows so I took time to gather them and wondering how to get them back to the house. Lucky in those days Mom made us girls wear dresses. Shorts or jeans were not proper even on the farm. So I took the skirt of my dress and gathered it up into a pocket and put my harvest in my skirt and ever so carefully went on my way to get the cows which wasn't all that easy. For once they must have known my situation as they behaved very nicely and headed straight for the barn. My Mom seen me coming across the pasture and couldn't imagine what I had. She figured I was bringing up some baby critters from the woods. She was really surprised and that nite we had some mighty tasty morsels for supper.

Another time I was on my daily journey and was following the path back to where the cows were and along the way always looking for mushrooms. I came back bringing the cows the same way and all at once they stopped and would not move. I figured there was a snake in the path so I proceeded to see to the problem and there in front of them was the biggest mushroom I had ever found. It was 4-6 inches tall and very fresh. I picked it and we all proceeded to the barn. I think ole Jerse knew I was fond of mushrooms. Dad said they come up quickly and it surely was true as if it was there before I would have stepped on it. So this is a couple of my mushroom tales from way back. I think every one in Andrews had their favorite hunting ground and stories to tell from along the Loon Creek. I know my dad and I had ours and he had a few places that was a secret only to him. How I would love to go back and tromp the ground that was so familiar to me. Someone told me that it was grown up in a solid thicket and can hardly walk thru it. What a shame, so I'll just keep my memories, but I bet that somewhere in that thicket there is some dandy mushrooms coming up this spring.

This is how Mom fried the mushrooms. She would wash them in salt water leaving them soak a few minutes then wash them few more times in clean water, drain them well and mix flour salt and pepper and coat them and fry in butter (fresh made on the farm). Another way was to fix them with round steak. Fry the tenderized steak floured and browned and cooked till nearly well done add the mushrooms on top of the steak and cook few minutes and then mix a gravy of cornstarch and milk and pour over the steak and mushrooms and cook till the gravy thickened. It was some pretty good eating.

The Warren Fair was it!! Families would take their vacations the same week as the fair. Fair week was a week everyone looked forward to all year long. Attendance could be numbered in the thousands coming from all around.

Exhibits were held at the fair and ribbons were passed out for the best items grown, the best canned goods, quilts, etc. There were the carnivals with a full line of rides, shows of all kinds, and other attractions. Farm machinery was on display and there were dress reviews. Church groups and other organizations had tents selling sandwiches, pie, cake and other refreshments. Town merchants would close up their stores so the help could go to the fair. The merchants would set up in one building and show their best selling products. The Warren Band would play during the fair.

Warren had many legendary "horse" people. R. H. Smethurst had a horse called Happy Hal, George Swaim had Barbara Wilbur, Ned L was owned by G. Baker, Alf Thompson had a horse called Chestnut Don, Ambrose "Brose" McCord had a record setting horse called Walter Stone. Alpha Hull trained many

horse for Dr. Bonifield. Other horsemen were Ernest Van Dolsen, Marshall Chopson, Harry Gill, Dot Darrow, Frank Palmer, "Boston" Brubaker, James Schemerhorn and Frank Lewis.

In November 1932, the fair association decided that it was hopeless to continue and there seemed to be nothing to do but discontinue the fair. During the first years the fair and race ended with a surplus, but the last few years had not been profitable. For years the stables were used

by race horse owners to house and train their horses. One year a rodeo show wintered at the fair grounds and drove their cattle and horses west to the river [Taylor Bridge] to water. The Warren Fair was a great thing for the community and we will probably not have anything like it again.

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
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
