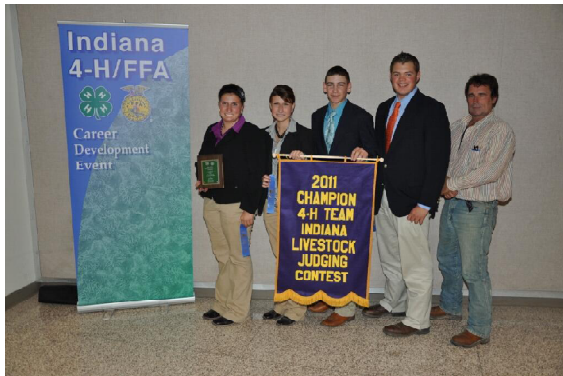

COUNCIL NOTES

The September 12 meeting of the Warren Town Council was held in Assembly Hall at 6:30 p.m. President Julia Glessner opened the meeting with a Public Hearing on the proposed 2012 municipal budget. The hearing closed after no questions or comments were heard.

Sealed bids were opened as advertised. The following high bids were accepted: \$600 from Cameron for the roller; \$2900 from Wilson for the chipper; \$400 from Zeller Construction for the hammer and \$300 from Zeller Construction for the tank and trailer.

Discussion was held concerning the condition of playground equipment at Tower Park. One unit of equipment had been removed due to vandalism. It was suggested the remaining units be removed. It was decided that Council members should inspect the equipment before a decision is made for removal. Both the 2011 and 2012 budgets include line items for playground equipment replacement. Manager Day has been pricing units. Purchase is expected in the fall of 2011 or spring of 2012.

Council approved adoption of Ordinance 2011-1, 2, and 3, wages and benefits for 2012.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison reported that contact had been made with the Wells County Highway Engineer regarding the Town's inclusion in a grant application to restore access points along the Salamonie River. The project is not expected to be finalized until 2013 but preliminary steps are necessary at this time. Day had met with DNR officials regarding an access point at the Scout Cabin site. Those officials indicated that area would be suitable. DNR would handle the construction of the site through a Transportation Enhancement Grant with the Town of Warren meeting a

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match of ten percent. The Warren site is expected to be one of several within the Wells County Grant application. Day said the Scout Cabin roof replacement project has been completed.

Council discussed four properties listed to be sold at the upcoming Tax Sale on September 29. It was decided that a market analysis be done on each site. A decision regarding the properties is to be made at a special meeting scheduled for September 19.

A letter was submitted to Council for approval to be sent to Hy-Line International. The letter stated the Town's intention to cover cost of paving an area on Millsite Drive as part of expansion and improvement of the Hy-Line facility. Also as a part of the project E&B Paving had submitted a quote for \$9200.00 for repaving of an area along two blocks of Wayne Street that was inadequately paved during water line replacement. Council approved.

Jeff Souder, representing Warren Area Chamber of Commerce, updated Council on upcoming events. A meeting is scheduled with a representative from Indian Main Street on September 19 at Assembly Hall, which Council members are invited to attend. Council also discussed offering the First Street Municipal Parking Lot to the organizers of the Farmer's Market so it could return to the downtown area. Souder is to make contact.

Morrison submitted and summarized budget information including budget comparison for the past four years. Council is scheduled to meet September 19 for Budget adoption.

The Clerk-Treasurer's office will be closed September 20 and November 2 for computer training with Keystone.

Day reported that approximately two weeks remain for the completion of tree trimming and removal. Two quotes were submitted from Environment Dynamics for work on the Diffusers at the WWTP: \$11,150 for

stainless steel and \$9,820 for PVC. Council approved the outlay but left the final decision to Poulson and Day. A transformer had been ordered at a cost of \$7,250 to replace one leaking oil which services Heritage Pointe. The transformer is scheduled to be replaced immediately upon arrival. An Electric project at Salamonie Heights is reported to have progressed well although delayed by slow delivery of the backhoe unit for the Bobcat. The project includes underground placement and upgrade of electric lines.

Fire Chief Lee Poulson gave a monthly activity report. Also submitted was a quote for Fire Department Motorola Radio in the amount of \$2,843.75. The quote included some programming charges which will not be necessary. The purchase will be submitted to the insurance company. Payment of \$500 deductible is necessary.

Marshal Spitler reported that replacement of the Taser units will need to be considered in the near future.

FALL ALFALFA

There have been many challenges this year for alfalfa growers. To begin with the first cutting was behind due to the extremely wet weather this spring. Then the hot and dry weather caused a standstill for growth.

It is now mid-September and some producers have a knee-high stand of alfalfa. They aren't sure whether to cut it now or to wait until a killing frost, as many specialists recommend for fall cutting management. Waiting is often considered the best option to improve an alfalfa stand's chances for winter survival.

Steve Barnhart, a forage production specialist from Iowa State University, notes in a recent article (<http://www.extension.iastate.edu/CropNews/2011/0912barnhart2.htm>) that "alfalfa plants should get 5 to 6 weeks of uninterrupted growth to accumulate root carbohydrates and proteins before going dormant in the

winter".

Barnhart goes on to explain that the risk lies in that low levels of winter root stores of carbohydrates and proteins leaves the alfalfa plant susceptible to winter cold injury and a delayed spring recovery. If there is a cutting in September, the alfalfa plants will begin to regrow and begin to use what they have in stores.

Thus a producer who is short of hay and needs it for the winter should wait until after the killing freeze (23 to 24 degrees F) to cut it, according to Barnhart.

Another specialist from Michigan State University, Tim Dietz from the Dept. of Crop and Soil Sciences, reminds us in a recent article (http://news.msue.msu.edu/news/article/no_september_harvest_of_alfalfa_right) that the outcome is largely dictated by the weather. Dietz mentions that he is often asked if the "no alfalfa harvest in September" rule still applies today. He says that producers should wait to harvest until they are sure that the alfalfa will not grow more than 2 inches in the fall after harvest. Dietz further recommends using historical weather data to make an informed decision.

Barnhart reminds alfalfa growers to consider these factors when considering the stand's ability to overwinter:

- 4" or more of winter-long snow cover
- a winter tolerant variety
- 2 or 3 summer cut harvest systems with good regrowth between cuttings
- 5-6 weeks of uninterrupted growth during September and October
- All of the last growth of the season is left in the field (no cutting or grazing) – if you did take a late fall cut or grazed, you left a 5 to 6 inch stubble.
- Management of insects (potato leafhoppers) during the growing season
- Good levels of available potassium in the soil
- Young stands – or older stands with no root or crown disease

Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology is now in its 20th year of offering free tutoring to Hoosier students. Sunday through Thursday, 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. EST they can call 1-877-ASK-ROSE (1-877-275-

7673) and receive personal attention as they work through difficult problems.

"I would like to express my deepest appreciation to Rose-Hulman and all of the tutors who have offered assistance to Hoosier students over the past 20 years," Holdman said. "This is a great resource that provides students with additional tools to help them succeed academically."

Students calling the hotline will need to provide their first name, their school's name and be prepared with necessary materials:

- Homework assignment;
- Textbook (if available);
- Paper;
- Pen or Pencil; and
- Calculator (if necessary).

Homework questions can also be submitted online at www.AskRose.org starting Sept. 26. Responses to online questions are given during the Homework Hotline's hours of operation, 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Holdman said tutoring is provided by college students who were recommended by their professors. Tutors are chosen based on technical and communication skills. They are trained on how to best answer questions and explain difficult concepts to younger students.

"In order to provide help with questions, tutors are armed with copies of state-recommended textbooks and Internet access," Holdman said. "While they are not to give students the answers to problems or assignments, tutors will help students analyze questions and come up with solutions."

Holdman said teachers may access lesson plans, articles, a summary of Indiana's academic standards and other

educational resources when visiting www.AskRose.org.

"Thousands of Hoosier students took advantage of this educational resource during the 2010-2011 school year," Holdman said. "Homework Hotline answered 45,042 calls and conducted 2,934 online tutoring sessions last year. Locally, students from Adams, Blackford, Grant, Huntington, Jay and Wells counties received assistance in finding the right solutions to 1,191 problems."

DON'T HARVEST

Harvesting ginseng, goldenseal (aka yellowroot), and other plants is illegal on all DNR properties.

Although ginseng is currently in season, it can be harvested only on private property, with the permission of the landowner. Public Law 107 (IC 14-4-8) and the Ginseng Rule (312 IAC 19) prohibit all digging on state property.

The purpose of these regulations is to ensure a healthy ginseng population for the future.

Details of the ginseng regulations are at www.in.gov/dnr/naturepreserve/files/ginseng99.pdf.

The only items that may be removed legally from DNR properties are nuts, fruits, berries and mushrooms.

HOMESCHOOL PHYS ED

Huntington University's physical education students are offering a homeschool P.E. program for children ages 3 through 5th grade this fall.

Children will be split into one of four developmental levels: preschool (ages 3 and 4), grades K-1, grades 2-3 and grades 4-5. The nine class sessions will be offered from September to December. Class time is from 2:15 to 3 p.m. in the fieldhouse of the university's Merrill Physical Education and Recreation Complex. The dates for the sessions are Sept. 29, Oct. 6, 13, 20 and 27, Nov. 3 and 17 and Dec. 1 and 8.

This service is available to all area homeschooled children in preschool and elementary

grades, including students from Huntington and surrounding counties. All families are asked to come a few minutes early on Sept. 29 to complete the registration forms.

The class is free to all participants.

In light of the new state teacher education licensing requirements, the preschool class is new to the homeschool physical education program. This class will be available to children ages 3 and 4, however, one adult must participate with the child.

Huntington University students conducting the elementary physical education class are either physical education majors or elementary education majors. Curriculum development and supervision of the classes are provided by Dr. Jody Davenport, assistant professor of physical education.

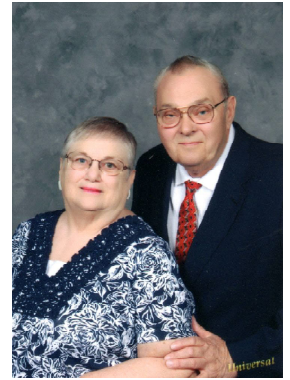
