## Kudos, Kicks & Karats

### TAKING THAT PARENT-TEEN DISAGREEMENT DOWN A LEVEL

 If there's a teen in your home, odds are overwhelming that there have been parent-teen disagreements, perhaps even hot and heavy fights. But it doesn't have to be that way.

Parents and their teens disagreeing is a normal part of the developmental process. Young children easily accept the black and white rules we create for them ("No snacks just before dinner!"). But as our kids grow up they begin to learn that not everything is an absolute and that there are often shades of gray or alternatives. The result is that they will increasingly question and test us. It may be frustrating for parents, and often the fuel for parent-teen arguments, but it's actually a healthy, normal part of becoming more mature. While only time will make that questioning and testing disappear (and even adulthood may not stop it), there are ways you can keep the disagreements from getting out of hand now.

A starting point is simply accepting that as your child grows he or she will instinctively question rules and decisions, and often want to debate you. When you can accept that this is just naturally going to take place as your maturing child seeks more independence, it can be easier to not let such occurrences make you angry and frustrated. Instead, try to develop techniques to avoid the fights.

One key is taking a non-aggressive attitude in disagreements. If your immediate response to your teen questioning your judgment is one of anger and zero compromise, you can probably expect the same back in response. Instead, stay calm, use a rational tone of voice and make it clear you're willing to listen and discuss. Setting that example helps your child understand that you expect the same sort of response from him or her.

You'll want to avoid words and accusations that put your child on an angry defensive. You'll want to control your anger, and instead consider options and compromises that both of you can live with. When you disagree with something the teen has done or wants to do, make it very clear you're disapproving of the behavior itself, not your child.

Questioning and disagreeing is a regular factor in growing up and learning to be more self-sufficient. When disagreements occur, understand why, stay calm and non-combative and you'll avoid major fights that end in hurt feelings and distrust of each other.

### HOW TAKING BETTER CARE OF YOUR TEETH MIGHT PROLONG YOUR LIFE

Having poor oral health doesn't mean just cavities and gum disease.

Statistics show that an unhealthy mouth can substantially increase the risk of suffering major health problems, including heart disease, respiratory infections, Alzheimer's disease and diabetic complications. In fact, seven of the 10 leading causes of death listed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have been linked to bacteria or inflammation in the oral cavity. Periodontal disease has also been associated with premature labor and a low birth-weight baby.

Clearly, these are all good reasons to exercise consistent oral care, yet many people do not for a variety of reasons, says Dr. R. Craig Miller (<https://drrcraigmiller.com>), a dentist and author of *Get Back Your Smile, Take Back Your Life!*

"It's not just teeth and gums; your whole body can be at risk if you let your dental health go," Miller says. "But too often adults, and especially parents, have put themselves last, including in regard to their own dental care, which they might see as cosmetic and not an immediate necessity.

"As they age and neglect their teeth and gums more, their oral health worsens and it can definitely correlate with overall health issues.

We've got to get more people learning how to take care of their teeth as they would their bodies."

Miller suggests how to get to the root of the self-oral care problem:

**Prioritize your oral care.** Miller says that starts with recognizing behaviors that undermine self-care, or in effect, people putting themselves last. "Parents just get caught up in their daily family life," Miller says. "When it isn't family, it's work. Self-care takes a back seat to everything else. Sometimes, this self-neglect stems from negative behavior patterns that began in childhood due to how they were raised. Perhaps a parent abandoned them, they were deprived emotionally, or they felt like a failure. Understanding and correcting those behaviors can help make dental care an important part of one's improved self-image."

Regular brushing and flossing. People with good oral hygiene spend less on health care overall. "While brushing and flossing well should be obvious, people would be amazed at how much better their teeth and gums would be if they simply adhered to a daily oral-hygiene regimen," Miller says. "Proper brushing and flossing can turn back the clock on gum disease. Oral hygiene has a direct impact on the mouth's microbiome, which is the balance of organisms that keep decay at bay. Without good oral hygiene, the mouth is at risk for developing periodontal

disease — the leading cause of tooth loss in adults."

**Commit to a healthier diet.** Excess sugar is one of the primary culprits of plaque, a sticky deposit on the teeth in which bacteria proliferate. "Bad bacteria in the mouth feed off sugar and are the primary drivers of oral problems," Miller says. "Without eating healthier foods and having good levels of vitamins and minerals in the body, good bacteria turn to harmful, which leads to tooth decay."

**Stick with the program.** "Dental treatment alone offers no guarantees for the long term," Miller says. "The patient is the key person in the whole process. Successful outcomes rely on the patient to be a member of the care team. That means being open to being educated and following through with the dentist, and also it means what they're doing outside the dentist office is just as important."

"Your teeth are meant to be with you for life," Miller says. "And how you take care of them, and your gums, could go a long way toward dictating how long, and with what kind of quality, you live."

### TRAPPING CAMP

Salamonie Lake and Indiana Conservation Officers will host a Trappers Education Course on Oct. 5 and 6 at the Salamonie Interpretive Center. The program will focus on trappers of all ages, especially youth trappers.

The program will start on Oct. 5 at 9 a.m. with speakers on conservation, trapping issues, ethics, and regulations. After lunch, trappers will get to set traps for furbearers and accompany instructors on the trap line. Traps will be left overnight and checked the next day.

On Oct. 6 at 9 a.m. trappers will accompany instructors to check traps on the trap line. Furbearers that are caught will be used in skinning and fleshing demonstrations by instructors. The program will end by 4:30 p.m. each day.

Free camping is available for all course attendees on Oct. 4 and 5 at the Lost Bridge West Youth Campground, which is within walking distance of the Interpretive Center. Trappers will not need a trapping license to attend the program. Entrance fees

will be waived for all participants. Lunch is provided both days.

The program is free for participants, but advance registration by Oct. 1 is required. To register online, visit [register-ed.com/programs/indiana/](http://register-ed.com/programs/indiana/) or call Upper Wabash Interpretive Services at 260-468-2127.

Trappers may want to bring waterproof knee boots or waders to wear on the trap line and will need to dress for the weather. Trappers must attend both days of the course and complete a brief exam to receive DNR Trapper Education Certification.

The Salamonie Interpretive Center is located in Lost Bridge West State Recreation Area, west of State Road 105 in western Huntington County.

### A TRIP TO RHODE ISLAND

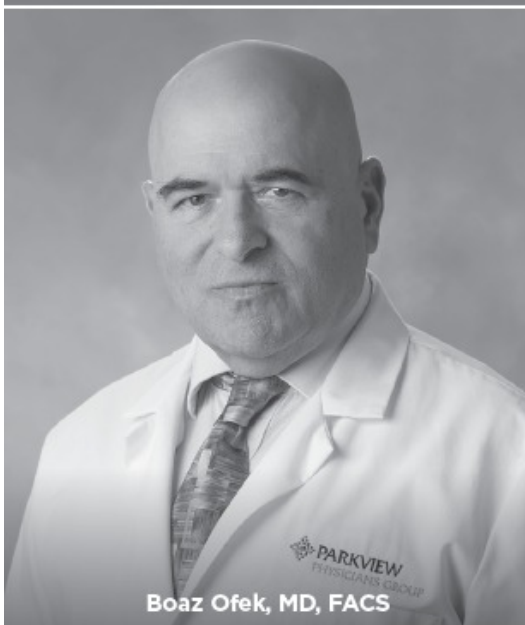
