Boy you talk about hurt but just quicker than a flash Mr. B was right there to make sure I was alright. He took me inside to the nurses station for ice and then, like everyday for a week, he made it a point to check on me and make sure I was ok. I laugh about it now, but then I cried like a baby. lol

Which brings me to the end of my 5th grade year. On your final report card it usually said what teacher you would get for next year, I couldn't wait to see who I got. I was hoping so much that I got Mr. B for my teacher. Then it hit me, mom opened the report card and I got Mrs. VanWinkle. I was devastated, Mr. B got moved to fourth grade. Now don't get me wrong I had a blast in Mrs. VanWinkle's class too but when your hopes was so hyped for four years, you do seem to get crushed.

Many times I have had encounters with him and he always made the time to talk with me just to ask how I'm doing. My daughter was the lucky one, she got Mr. B for 4th grade and

VOLUNTEER TRAINING

Boot Camp for 4-H volunteers will be this year's theme for the Northeast Indiana 4-H Volunteer Training on Thursday, January 31 at the Allen County Fairgrounds, 2726 Carroll Road, Fort Wayne.

Doors open at 5:30 PM with dinner being served at 6:00 PM. Training topics will include: the iGeneration – What is it; a youth panel – Why Join 4-H and What Makes a Good Club; biggest challenge as a volunteer, round table topics on best attended event/activity; favorite event/speaker/field trip; best fundraiser and tips for new and experienced leaders.

Reservations for the event are needed by January 24 and can be made by calling the Wells County Extension Office, 824-6412.

The Wells County 4-H Association will serve as sponsor for volunteers wishing to attend from Wells County.

GUN SAFETY

The Wells County 4-H BB Gun & .22 Caliber Rifle Safety Program will begin Tuesday, January 29, 6:30 – 8 PM at the Wells County Community Center, 4-H Park, Bluffton. Meetings will continue each Tuesday through April 2.

Safety instruction, handling procedures, shooting skills and hands on experience will be included in the safety program.

Youth in grades 3, 4, and 5 can participate in BB Gun. Youth in grades 6 and above can participate in Rifle. First time members who are old enough for Rifle will be required to pass a shooting

skills proficiency which reviews the positions and range safety procedures.

Members are not allowed to bring their own equipment. Advanced enrollment in 4-H is recommended and can be completed at the Wells County Extension Office. All participants must be enrolled before participating in hands-on activities.

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years.

A membership fee of \$20 should be paid at the County Extension Office before the first meeting. This fee is only paid once each year. Youth in more than one 4-H club will only pay the fee one time. There is a fee cap of \$60 per family.

The supply fee for BB Gun will be \$14 for the first family member and a family fee cap of \$21 for more than one family member. This includes printed materials, ammunition, gun repairs, gun cleaning supplies, targets, and member awards. Checks for the supply fees should be made payable to Wells County 4-H Shooting Sports. Scholarships are available for membership and supply fees. No person will be turned away due to financial constraints.

In case of bad weather, listen to radio station K105 FM or check www.wellscountyvoice.com for cancellations. Usually, if one of the schools cancel, the 4-H meeting will be canceled.

Youth may also enroll in the Shooting Sports Fair Exhibit Option. Members may make a poster or a notebook about some aspect of shooting sports or may exhibit something they have made. Examples might include: Poster or Notebook; Firearm Safety; Cross a Fence with a Gun; Eye Dominance; Muzzleloading; Target Trap; Archery Safety; Types of Arrows; Buying a Bow; Shooting Vests; Hunter Ed; Tree Stand Safety; Percussion or Flintlock; Hunting Wild Turkeys; Handmade items – Gun Rack; Ammo Box, etc.

Youth may also sign up for the 4-H Shot Gun Safety Club which will begin April 20 and the 4-H Archery Club which begins April 11.

Volunteers from the Department of Natural Resources will also offer a Hunter Education Class on April 1, 3 and 4.

WOUND CENTER OPENS

On December 18, the new Parkview Huntington Hospital (PHH) Center for Wound Healing officially opened its doors to patients.

Now, Huntington County residents who have struggled with chronic, non-healing wounds have closer-to-home access to clinically proven, state-of-the-art treatments that can help their bodies heal.

The need for specialized wound care locally is significant, says Juli Johnson, president, PHH: "Diabetes and other medical conditions present serious challenges for many area residents. Often, those conditions – or even injuries, such as burns or other traumas – can lead to painful, lingering wounds that resist healing. Our team at the center will be focused on helping these individuals find relief and improvement."

Until now, patients who needed this kind of care typically had to travel out of county, which can be especially difficult for individuals without regular transportation, or who may reside in senior facilities.

"A lot of the physicians are excited about being able to spare their patients the hassle of traveling," Johnson continued. "Even before we opened our doors, they were referring patients for appointments."

The 3,657-square-foot space inside the center encompasses the hyperbaric oxygen (HBO) suite – which features two, see-through HBO chambers – five treatment rooms, a changing area with lockers and

restrooms, supply storage, reception and waiting area, and offices. Treatments offered include HBO therapy, negative-pressure wound therapy, bioengineered tissues, biosynthetic dressings and growth-factor therapies, as well as debridement. PHH is partnering with Healogics, the nation's largest provider of advanced wound care services, to make the range of therapies available.

The facility is the third such Center for Wound Healing to be added to a Parkview hospital in recent years; other centers are located at Parkview Randallia Hospital in Fort Wayne and Parkview Noble Hospital in Kendallville. All three centers operate under the medical direction of Parkview physician James Edlund, MD.

Edlund and the center's care team members were on hand

for a ribbon-cutting ceremony PHH leaders held on the day before the opening, in partnership with the Huntington County Chamber of Commerce. They were joined by members of the hospital's board of directors, the Parkview Huntington Foundation board, Chamber Ambassadors, and local business, government and community leaders. Hospital and medical office building co-workers and the medical staff were invited to visit the wound center for a quick look before it would begin serving the public.

With the center's impressive HBO chambers as a backdrop, Johnson emphasized how proud she and other hospital leaders are of the way the project has come together.

"It's been a terrific effort on the part of so many people," she said. "We have an amazing care team in place now, and the facility is ready. This is going to make a huge difference for so many patients whose lives have been negatively affected by wounds that just won't heal. And it's really exciting to see that there is so much support for this service in the community."

Edlund, who retired from Parkview Physicians Group - Colon and Rectal Surgery earlier in 2018 to head

Parkview's wound care initiative full time, explained the Center for Wound Healing approach: "What we do is work with a network of partners on all of the factors that influence the body's ability to heal."

He continued, "Chronic wound management has many facets, and it takes a team approach because patients typically have a variety of needs. Our partner Healogics is the leader in outpatient wound care in the country, with more than 700 centers, and it maintains the largest database of wound-care results, therapies and supplies. Healogics does all the training and education of the physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses, and hyperbaric techs who provide wound care. And these folks are already very experienced in dealing with wounds, particularly our nurse practitioners. At the center, we meet with the patient, evaluate the wound, clean it out, apply dressings and use advanced products (such as skin substitutes), arrange for other types of care, and see the patient on a regular basis so we can gauge the level of progress.

"Our partner network includes the primary care doctors, who help manage each patient's primary diseases such as diabetes, hypertension and cardiovascular disease. We also work closely with our cardiology colleagues, plastic surgeons, podiatrists and orthopedists, especially the trauma orthopedists. foot sore and onto the leg. We also work with extended-care facilities because many of our patients come and go at those facilities due to their age."

Physicians from other specialty backgrounds may also begin providing care at the center later this year. Two Healogics employees are embedded with Parkview to assist with a variety of needs related to wound care patient relations and center operations.

In coming weeks, the space inside the center will be dedicated as the Huntington County Medical Society Wound Care Center in recognition of a gift from that organization.

The opening of Huntington's wound center represents the end of phase 1 of the local hospital expansion project, underway since early 2018. Located on the PHH campus, next to the medical office building that is adjacent to PHH, the center has its own exterior entrance. Free parking is available in the lot in front of the medical office building, and patients should use the Center for Wound Healing entrance. Hours of operation for the center are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

A physician referral is generally required, although some patients may be able to self-refer. For more

ARE THE WINTER BLUES GETTING YOU DOWN?

With winter here, perhaps you're not quite feeling your normal self. Maybe you're a bit sluggish, a little irritable, sleeping longer, or just feeling a little down in general? Welcome to what's commonly called the "winter blues" or the "winter blahs."

This is a fairly common problem and while it's often minor, there are times when it can be a quite serious issue.

Some people find winter weather affects them strongly enough that it makes daily life difficult.

Severe cases are known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) and can be serious enough to warrant treatment by a mental health professional.

But for most of us these winter blues are just a minor inconvenience and, fortunately, one that you can do something about.

One contributing factor is the shorter days and lack of sunlight in winter. The obvious cure is to increase the amount of light in your life. If it's a bright, sunny day, bundle up and get outside for a bit. If it's gray and dreary, try turning on extra lights to brighten things up and use broad spectrum bulbs (often sold as "therapy lights") that simulate natural sunlight.

Exercise also helps fight those tired and sluggish feelings. Just a short daily walk or gym workout can help your body and mind overcome feelings of low energy.

And even small changes can make a difference. When you're feeling down, give a friend a call and talk about happy things. Watch a favorite funny TV show or movie. Read a book that you know you'll enjoy, or spend some time on a hobby that makes you feel good.

Getting involved with others is another way to feel better. Start going out more, whether it's socializing with friends or volunteering at your church, a local shelter, or nonprofit agency. Helping others almost always brings better feelings, and when you combine that good work with a nice bright smile, you may find you just don't have time to feel blue.

Of course, there are many things that can cause sad feelings besides cold, gray skies. If you find that you just can't overcome such feelings, and they're interfering with your enjoyment of a normal life, seek help. A professional counselor can both help pinpoint the cause of your feelings and suggest ways to overcome the problem.

Bottom line? Take action and don't let the winter blues take the fun out of your life.
