To enable children to maintain their reading skills during summer vacation, the Warren Public Library is offering Get a Clue@ Your Library as its 2007 Summer Reading Program. Readers can set a goal, choose among the many wonderful books to read, record what they've read for the librarian and receive rewards for reaching their goal and completing the program.

AND the Library Summer Reading Program also offers a Read-to-Me program for preschoolers where a parent or caregiver reads aloud to the child and records what's been read, reports the reading done and receives the reward for the child.

THE UPTOWN GARDENER

Our first summer holiday has come and gone and I hope all of you had a nice long weekend. Ours was the pretty much normal stay at home that we do much of the time. I recall when we both worked it was a pleasure just to be home and not be concerned about going somewhere. As bad as we needed the rain I hope it didn't spoil your holiday plans.

This week I picked the first of the strawberries and had a nice fresh pie to enjoy. We are not fond of frozen strawberries so we really feast on them while in season. They are nice and juicy and not rock hard like you buy in the store. I had to put netting over them this week to keep the birds and the squirrels out of them. We have been feeding the squirrels and they have become quite spoiled. They have learned how to take the ear of corn off the spike holder and carry the ear of corn away. It is rather comical to watch. If you see the little critters about town with an ear of corn you can guess who they belong to. They can carry off the corn but better leave my strawberries alone. They were nice enough to carry some up on the deck and leave them. They could have at least picked ripe ones for me. This is when I decided to shut off their fun. We have one squirrel that is very unusual, he is black with a reddish brown tail, talk about a misfit! He sure looks strange and is not shy about getting his share of the corn we put out.

The rest of the garden is beginning to look good even the weeds are doing well. Potatoes are beginning to bloom and tomato plants are doing well. Can hardly wait until I can have some nice fresh sliced tomatoes. Soon I will have fresh lettuce. The rain we received was certainly blessing as I had been carrying water to the garden and also letting the hose run on the ground in the strawberry patch to keep the soil moist which helped a lot. This week I will be busy getting ready for the opening of the farmers market and Wayne and I are looking forward to meeting our friends from last year and new ones we will get to know. It is always a nice time visiting with all of you. I have been working on some new things to bring to the market, will see how it turns out.

Till next time have a great summer and hope to see you at the market. My recipe for this week is the glaze to put on your fresh fruit pies. This is what I had on the strawberry pie this week.

1 cup water 1/2 cup sugar 2 teaspoon clear jell 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and 2 tablespoon dry strawberry jello. Mix all together except the jello, bring to almost a boil stirring constantly this thickens quickly. Remove from the heat and add the strawberry jello. Let cool and pour over the fruit and add to the pie shell.

Clear jell is a refined cornstarch which I like much better. It can be purchased in most kitchen specialty stores.

This can be used for most any fresh fruit. I have made raspberry and blueberry pies using corresponding flavors of jello which was quite good. Clear jell can also be used in baked pies and also I use it to make fresh syrups for waffles or pancakes. Try it you might like it.

FOOD SAFETY TIPS

During the summer months, many Hoosiers will be celebrating with family and friends by sharing meals. As a result, state health officials are offering some timely food safety tips.

"The single best way to prepare and consume food safely is to wash your hands before cooking, serving, or eating," said Scott Gilliam, of the Indiana State Department of Health's Food Protection Program. "Make sure to wash your hands thoroughly after touching raw meat, like ground beef or poultry."

"Food temperature is also important," Gilliam said. "If a food is intended to be served hot, make sure to cook it fully before serving it. On the other hand, if a food is intended to be served cold, keep it cold. Never let cold food sit out for an extended period of time. If you're serving cold pasta salad, store it in a refrigerator or a cooler and put it out on the picnic table right before the food is served."

According to Gilliam, another effective technique to avoid food-

borne illness is to buy a good meat thermometer and use it to make sure that meat is cooked to its appropriate temperature.

"Ground beef should be cooked to an internal temperature of 155 degrees for at least 15 seconds, pork should be cooked to an internal temperature of 145 degrees for at least three minutes, and poultry should be cooked to an internal temperature of 165 degrees for at least 15 seconds," Gilliam said.

If you don't have a meat thermometer, cook meats until the juices run clear. Ground beef should be brown or at least brownish pink in the center before it is served.

Gilliam also warned people who are experiencing nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, or sore throat with fever or jaundice should not handle food or utensils.

"Try to minimize the direct handling of ready-to-eat foods with bare hands as much as possible," Gilliam said. "Use utensils whenever possible when handling salads, sandwiches, etc."

Health officials also recommend the following food safety tips:

Food safety begins with hand-washing even in outdoor settings. And it can be as simple as using a water jug, some soap and paper towels.

Keep all utensils and platters clean when preparing food.

When grocery shopping during hot weather, make perishables your last pick-up in the store. Never leave them in the car while you run other errands—it doesn't take long for bacteria to grow. Get perishables home and into the refrigerator immediately.

Thaw meat or poultry safely by leaving it overnight in the refrigerator. Don't leave meat or poultry out on the counter for an extended period of time before you prepare it.

Don't use the same platter and utensils that previously held raw

meat or seafood to serve cooked meats and seafood.

Marinate foods in the refrigerator, not on the counter or outdoors. If some of the marinade is to be used as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a portion separately before adding the raw meat, poultry, or seafood. Don't reuse marinade.

When it's time to cook the food, cook it thoroughly. Use a food thermometer to be sure. For additional information on proper food temperatures, visit the Indiana State Department of Health Web site at: www.in.gov/isdh/pdfs/fda_tips.pdf.

Cook chicken and seafood until the flesh is solid.

Don't leave leftovers on the picnic table or allow foods to cool on the kitchen counter. Put foods directly into the refrigerator within two hours of serving. If you divide large quantities of leftovers into smaller portions, they will chill more quickly to temperatures that inhibit the growth of bacteria.

Make sure to cook eggs until both the white and the yolk are firm.

Keep cold food cold. Place cold food in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs. Cold food should be held at or below 40 F.

Rinse fresh fruits and vegetables under running tap water, including those with skins and rinds that are not eaten. Packaged fruits and vegetables labeled "ready-to-eat," "washed," or "triple washed" need not be washed.
