### HOW TO TELL WHEN A MARRIAGE IS IN TROUBLE

from the American Counseling Association

Divorce is a fairly common reality in the U.S. While the most-often cited statistic is that 50 percent of marriages will end in divorce, current estimates are that the number is actually in the range of 42 to 45.

That's still a very large number of divorces and it's a figure that is growing even higher among those aged 55 to 64 where divorce rates have quadrupled over the past three decades.

One would think that it's fairly easy to spot when a marriage is in trouble, but, in fact, marriage problems often tend to grow slowly over time rather than suddenly seeming to burst out of nowhere. It's important to be aware of the potential problems facing any marriage, since early intervention and the seeking of assistance can often help avoid divorce as a final outcome.

While there will always be small trouble spots and disagreements in even the best of relationships, it's when the disagreements become almost constant that there are real problems underlying the marriage.

One sign that serious troubles are brewing is when one partner feels he or she is giving more than is being received over an extended period of time. It can be a job, outside family, the children or any of numerous other issues that has one partner feeling he or she is unfairly carrying the bulk of the load.

When a couple is experiencing severe disagreements that are happening frequently and are coupled with an unwillingness or inability to resolve those disagreements, there's a good chance that permanent damage is being done to the relationship.

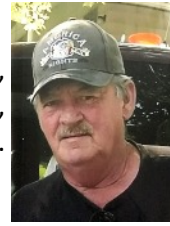

desperately need the government to act.

These high prices often force people to choose between buying their medications and paying for gas, food or even their mortgage. Many people are either skipping doses, splitting pills or forgoing medications completely, which creates a potentially dangerous situation as these medications are used to control everything from asthma to high cholesterol to arthritis.

Despite years of public debate and empty promises from lawmakers to take action, little has been done to lower pharmaceutical costs in the U.S.

In fact, the U.S. government has repeatedly shown it is incapable of fixing this country's prescription drug pricing problem. Lawmakers face intense resistance from pharmaceutical manufacturers who regularly contribute to political campaigns and who aim to maintain their high profits at the expense of patients. Congress and state legislatures have put forth options to address our country's absurdly high drug prices, but most proposals will take years to implement ... if they move forward at all.

In fact, the U.S. doesn't have any laws or regulations in place to prevent or control the amount of money a pharmaceutical company can charge for its medications. This is shocking because Americans already pay more for prescription medications compared to patients in any other country in the world, despite the global market nature of the pharmaceutical industry.

Many "American-made" brand name prescription drugs are manufactured in other countries and then imported into the U.S. Even when drugs are produced in America, most of their active ingredients come from factories in other countries.

Regardless of where and when a medication is manufactured, safe and

affordable access to that medication is a right, not a privilege.

For years, the Internet has made it possible for Americans to fill their prescription medications at significantly lower cost through licensed, legitimate Canadian pharmacies. These online pharmacies prioritize both safety and affordability, and millions of Americans have successfully turned to Canada to buy their daily medications. In fact, the Food and Drug Administration and its Canadian counterpart, Health Canada, have equivalent standards when it comes to prescription medications.

As with all industries, there are "rogue" players and other bad actors on the Internet. For this reason, it is critical that consumers find a licensed, legitimate online pharmacy that can be trusted. Licensed, legitimate pharmacies have safety protocols in place, including requiring a signed prescription from a patient's doctor, and they don't sell opioids or other controlled substances via the Internet.

## BUT MANY DON'T BREATHE A WORD TO THEIR DOCTORS

(BPT) - Candyce Norris clearly remembers her wakeup call. In 1996 she was diagnosed with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or COPD, a common respiratory disease that makes breathing difficult.

Yet despite her diagnosis, she downplayed her symptoms and how COPD was affecting her everyday life to her doctors for years. "I felt nervous and ashamed to share details about my condition. I didn't want to be judged because I had smoked for so long," she said.

"The wakeup call," Norris said, "was when I realized that no one was judging me. My caregiver and support system, my doctor, everyone wanted to help me manage my symptoms so that I could feel better."

Norris' reluctance to share information isn't unusual for people with COPD. About 27 million people in the U.S. have the condition. Nearly half wait months or years before receiving a proper diagnosis, because many don't realize the severity of their symptoms - being out of breath, wheezing, chest infections - and attribute

them to aging or being out of shape.


In fact, a quarter of patients who experienced common COPD symptoms say they did not mention these symptoms to their healthcare provider. Even after diagnosis, many still downplay their symptoms. In a recent survey, as many as nine out of 10 patients with COPD admitted they are generally not honest with their doctor about their condition.

Dr. David Mannino, pulmonologist and respiratory medical expert at GSK says by the time most people with COPD get a diagnosis, they already have moderate to severe symptoms, and have lost significant lung function. "Without the full picture, a doctor may have trouble

helping patients and recommending the right treatment plan. It may also lead to improper care."

Mannino says being open with your doctor and caregiver is a key to successfully managing COPD.
