Indiana Tourism welcomes 59 million visitors to the state each year, generating nearly \$9 billion dollars annually toward the state's economy.

The U.S. Travel Association projects nearly 2 billion Americans will take a domestic trip this year, up about 2 percent over last year. International arrivals are expected to total 63 million in 2011, a 6 percent increase over 2010, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce.

insights that can help them improve their customer service quality.

"There's a lot of information out there and consumers can get overwhelmed in trying to sort through it all," said Hicks, who opposes anonymous reviews because they lack accountability.

BPA issued its 2011 report on Angie's List after conducting fieldwork and analysis in February and March. BPA has conducted audits on the company's data since 2007. The 2011 audit included examination of member feedback for service providers who advertise with Angie's List, as well as those that don't, to determine if the reviews are treated differently. The audit found all data was treated the same.

"We put significant resources into making our information as reliable and fair as it can be, and we have an outside auditor go over our work every year as another check and balance. That review is in, and we're happy with the results," Hicks said.

The Angie's List accountability structure is designed to maximize fairness and reliability by:

* Prohibiting anonymous

reporting;

* Limiting members to reporting only once on each, specific hiring experience;

* Prohibiting companies from grading themselves or their competitors;

* Alerting companies (free of charge) to reports so they know what's being said about them;

* Encouraging companies to respond (free of charge) to give their side of the story;



With spring in the air, opening windows and doors to enjoy the fresh air can also cause the stirring of pollen which can bring allergens inside your house. Allergies to pollen, known as hay fever, affect over 35 million Americans a year.

You can't avoid going outside all spring and summer, so do your best to prepare for allergies. But you can do some simple research and try over-the-counter remedies for this time of year. Or a doctor can run blood or skin tests to find out exactly what you're allergic to and can recommend whether an oral medicine or an allergy shot is best for you.

As temperatures rise, humidity can as well, which leads to mold and other bacterial contaminants that can affect your allergies. The EPA suggests that for most small mold contaminations, you can take care of the problem yourself. COLLARS VS HARNESES

Dog collars have good advantages and disadvantages. A few good advantages would be dog collars are ideal for training the dog for tricks; or drills. Or even to attach the dog tags which are mandatory in some states. However, couple of disadvantages would be if collars that are not fitted correctly. A dog collar could slide right over the dog's head. Another disadvantage would be the size of the little dog. Little dogs can get hurt by dog collars because of accidental jerks by the handler. It can cause neck injuries or maybe damage to their little spines.

Then on the other hand is the harness. The advantage of a harness is maybe for health reasons, protection, and comfort. Harness is always the best for little dogs. For instance it can relieve neck strains because little dogs like to move or run around to fast when handler is trying to control dog. Another advantage point is that harnesses are comfortable to wear because the materials are usually soft. For instance, they are made of soft mesh; nylon, or suede for the little dogs. A disadvantage for the harness type would be for the larger breed dogs that like to pull on the lash or untrained dogs that don't want to obey his or her master. I would replace that harness with another type of collar such as halter type dog collar. This type is used for training a dog or for that particular bad habit for control.

For advantages of safety purposes, please remember two guide lines:

- 1) Always if you are using and fitting a collar, it should be snug but enough room for two fingers between the dog's neck and the collar.
- 2) Then check the dog collar frequently on growing puppies and weight gain dogs to see if it's not too tight to be

uncomfortable or to cause pain to the dog.

The first that comes to mind was when it came time to put fertilizer on the flower beds out back. Everybody knows when you go to Amish country, they have these wonderful hanging baskets and their flower beds are always beautiful. Being a little naive about gardening, I asked mom what they use to make their flowers so nice and she said good ole horse manure. Now I am no country girl, but I knew that was a cheap and very readily available type of fertilizer that I could get a hold of. So off I went to the local horse barn with 5 gallon buckets in tow to collect the goods. Taco Salad

add: 1 pkg of grated cheddar cheese, 1 can red beans, rinsed and drained, mix all together with vegetables and pour a dressing made with the following 1 c. buttermilk, 1 c. mayo, 1 pkg hidden valley ranch dressing mix or just add 1-16oz. bottle of ranch dressing, add cooled meat and toss all together chill before serving add 1 pkg of Dorito taco flavored chips, crushed. We like to just crush our chip over our individual bowls of salad, so if there is any of the salad left the chips are not soggy when you go to eat leftovers.
