COLEUS TO DES MOINES IA

Bernard Gebhart of Gebhart Floral Barn has donated his collection of approximately 600 Coleus plants to the Botanical Gardens on Des Moines IA.

Leanna Culver, pictured with Bernard, was in Warren on Tuesday to pick up the precious cargo and transport it to Iowa.

Over the years Bernard has raised at least 600 different varieties of Coleus at one time or another. He has also created a few new varieties of his own such as the Hiram and the Brazilian Carnival. The Hiram plant was named after Hiram Brown, who many of you know from Warren history. The majority of his plants were vegetative propagated (meaning they were from a cutting, not a seed) but some were created from seed.

Five or six years ago Bernard began offering cuttings for sale on the internet. Mrs Culver contacted him and purchased some for her garden club. She is a member of the Polk Co Master Gardeners and a volunteer at the Botanical Gardens. This past summer Bernard contacted her about donating all of them to the Gardens. It was time to pass on his labor of love.

Mrs Culver reports that the Botanical Gardens wants to create a Coleus garden in their facility, that will be on display year-round. All of the plants being donated were pruned, tagged and prepped for travel and ready to go when Mrs Culver arrived. Eventually it is planned to put up pictures of each variety on the internet. Since it was first published in 1885, Robert Louis Stevenson's novella *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* has defied description. Was it a mystery? A detective story? A study of mental illness? A gothic novel? During the late 19th century there was a fascination with the inner conflict between good and evil. Studies had begun on the mental condition which was known as "split personality." What would happen if a man was able to unleash the dark spirits that inhabit his soul?

Shortly after its publication the story hit the stage. There are dozens of stage and radio plays and 123 movies based on the classic tale. In the late 1800's at the Pulse Opera House, traveling theatrical companies and home talent groups performed the show often

I am getting ready to start some renovations in my flower beds and deciding where to plant some spring bulbs. I have really enjoyed the flowers here at Heritage Pointe and those who have had flowers around their houses.

I had my first scare with my car since I have had the lone responsibility of it. I was on my way to Bluffton a few days back and half way there the low pressure light came on with all the bells and dings that nearly gave me heart failure. Sure enough He did and the service person took good care of me and had me back on the road and my blood pressure back to normal. When it comes to an automobile I just drive not fix it.

This week I was given tomatoes and some pears which I made good use of it all. Did some juice and also tomato soup which will taste good on a cool winter day. Also made some applesauce and mixed a few pears in with it, gives it a nice flavor also made a pear pie and pear bread. Never had made or tasted a pear pie but I think I will make a couple more to put in the freezer it was quite good which I will share the recipe.

This past week a group of us widow ladies made a trip to Warsaw to the Warsaw Biblical Garden which consist of plants that are mentioned in the bible we were amazed at different vegetables, fruits and herbs there were. It was a most interesting time we spent there. We stopped for a nice lunch on the way home and had a most enjoyable day.

Recipe for the pear pie is: 1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoon flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 5 cups of sliced pears, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix the sugar, flour, cinnamon, salt and add the pears and vanilla and lemon juice, blend it together and let set for about 10 minutes, turn into an unbaked pie shell and top with the butter cut in small pieces bake for 20 minutes take from oven and top with a crumb topping made of 1/2 cup brown sugar 4 tablespoon flour 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup rolled oats 1 stick butter mix till like coarse meal and spread over the pie and return to oven and bake at 350 for about 20 minutes. Enjoy!

DEADLINE LOOMS

Up to 2,000 northeast Indiana residents in 11 counties face the prospect of losing the work they've already done toward passing a General Educational Development (GED) test if they don't successfully complete that work by mid-December, an official with the Northeast Indiana Regional Workforce Investment Board said.

That's because the state intends to have a new high school equivalency assessment in place by the first of year. That test, said workforce development board Executive Vice President of Strategic Initiatives Gary Gatman, will be much more rigorous than the current one.

At the high end, according to the Indiana Department of Workforce Development and the Indiana Business Research Center, more than 60,000 residents in the 11 counties between the ages of 18 and 64 would be required to take the new test if they don't achieve high school equivalency before Dec. 13.

Those counties are: Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Grant, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

The percentage of adults without a high school diploma or GED range from an estimated 44.1 percent in LaGrange County to 8.9 percent in Whitley County.

The workforce investment board, through the WorkOne centers it manages and with the assistance of community partners, offers free GED preparation classes at locations across northeast Indiana. The board and its partners have set up a GED hotline to field questions about the new test or the free GED services. People can call 260.469.4411.

The new test, called the Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC) and offered by CTB/McGraw-Hill, will be aligned more closely with college and career readiness and industry needs, Gatman said.

LEAVING

He received his Bachelor of Arts from Huntington University, his Masters of Education from Indiana University at Ft. Wayne cam-

pus, and his library services certification from Ball State University. He has been a life-long resident of Huntington County having attended Banquo, Jefferson/South Upper, Salamonie, and Huntington North schools.

He is currently enjoying life with his wife of 36 years, Marcia, his three daughters, their husbands, and his nine grandchildren.

DEER SEASON COMING

Hunters in Indiana can expect another productive deer season in 2013, but probably not as productive as last year's record setter.

Hoosier deer hunters in 2012 harvested 136,248 deer. The deer harvest record has been broken in four of the last five seasons, a trend that DNR deer research biologist Chad Stewart doesn't expect to continue in 2013.

"It wouldn't surprise me if it was down a little this year," Stewart said. "But I don't expect the harvest numbers to fall off a cliff. There will still be plenty of deer out there."

The 2013 overall deer hunting season began Sunday with the opening of the urban deer zone season. Archery season starts Oct. 1. Firearms season starts Nov. 16. For more information

on seasons and regulations, visit Hunting.IN.gov.

The main reason Stewart thinks a dip in the harvest might happen is because hunters in 2012 harvested a record number of does. As a result, reproduction was likely down this year compared to previous years.

Stewart emphasized that reducing the deer population to a more balanced level has been the DNR's goal in recent years. Changes to hunting regulations that went into effect in 2012 were geared toward that goal. The changes included extending archery season, allowing crossbows for all archery hunters and creating a "license bundle" that saved hunters money.

"A reduced deer harvest would mean we are making progress," Stewart said.

The 2013 license bundles give the additional option of harvesting either two antlerless deer and a buck or three antlerless deer.

Last year's record deer harvest happened even as epizootic hemorrhagic disease was reported in 67 of 92 Indiana counties. The outbreak killed many deer before hunting season began, especially in northern Indiana. This year 15 counties have reported EHD.

Neighbors, friends and relatives can also assist one another by creating a "pet care buddy system" to ensure pets will be looked after without worry. In the event you need to evacuate the home, do not leave pets behind as they most likely cannot survive alone.

Preparedness is a shared responsibility and it takes a whole community. This year's National Preparedness Month focuses on turning awareness into action by encouraging all individuals and all communities nationwide to make an emergency preparedness plan. BE PREPARED

Hoosiers can take some simple and inexpensive steps now to be more prepared, according to the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS).

A disaster or emergency -- such as a winter storm, tornado or flooding -- may leave households without electricity, heat, or even clean running water, and cut off from local groceries and services or even from immediate response from police, fire or rescue personnel.

September is National Preparedness Month and officials from IDHS recommend Hoosiers turn awareness into action and adopt the goal of being self-reliant for at least three days, in the event of a disaster or other type of emergency.

"Being ready for a major disaster or emergency is very important. The basics of a kit can be put together without a lot of effort or money," said IDHS Senior Public Information Officer John Erickson.

Getting prepared doesn't have to cost a lot of money if you incorporate some of these easy emergency preparedness tips:

- Make a Plan: Work with family and neighbors to make an emergency plan -- such as where to go, how and where to meet and what to do in case of an emergency. Go to ready.gov/ make-a-plan for free downloadable Family Emergency Plan templates.

- Make a Ready List: All the items in a ready-made preparedness kit may not be the right fit for all families. Each person should choose the essentials that

fit the household's needs and budget. Sample Ready Lists can be found at ready.gov/build-a-kit.

- **Plan Purchases:** Getting ready doesn't have to be done in one day. Think ahead and try to accumulate extra items, with coupons and sales. Buying supplies right before a storm can be quite expensive. Buy supplies at the end of a season when there are good deals.

- **Request a Gift:** Suggest preparedness supplies as gifts from family and friends.

- **Make Sure it Keeps:** Water can be stored in safe containers, with no need to buy expensive bottled water. Just make sure water containers are disinfected and airtight.

- **Start Now:** By taking small steps now toward preparedness, it's less expensive to get ready! Statewide Online Survey IDHS is gauging Indiana citizens' readiness for emergencies and disasters through a brief online survey. The outcomes of the survey will help the public safety community gain a greater understanding of how prepared Indiana residents are and how to help increase that preparedness.

"We hope that this survey will remind Hoosiers of the importance of being prepared and what they can do to improve their level of preparedness," said Erickson.

All who participate can enter a contest to win a free all hazards/ weather radio. The survey is open today and will stay open until at least Friday, September 20, 2013. Individual responses will only be seen by IDHS staff, who will gather the data from the statewide survey.

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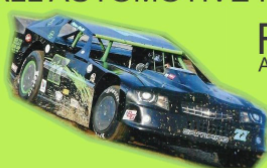
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
