AG ESTATE PLANNING

Registration is now open for the Indiana Agricultural Law Foundation's (INAgLaw) 2020 Estate & Succession Planning for the Family Farm event. Due to safety concerns surrounding COVID-19, this year's event will be hosted virtually, via video conferencing, and will be free of charge for all attendees. Family farmers and attorneys are encouraged to join in July 21-23 for 60 minute presentations each day from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

The event is open to anyone interested in understanding the importance of estate and succession planning to their business and walking away with valuable tips for getting started.

The 2020 virtual workshop will allow for more participants to attend the sessions. Virtual attendees

will have time to ask questions after each daily session. The change in format for the event also allows participants to choose which sessions they wish to attend.

"While we hadn't initially planned for this event to be virtual, we're excited about the opportunities that a virtual event brings," said John Shoup, director of INAgLaw. "Holding the training as shorter, virtual sessions across three days means even more farm families and attorneys can join to learn how to best communicate with one another about the future of the farm. With attendees tuning in from their home or office, we hope to see many new faces around the state."

Speakers will be covering topics such as farm succession planning, succession trends and how to protect a family's inheritance. More importantly, the event is designed to encourage family members to begin to communicate about the future of their farm operation.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION

TAX DAY COMING

Tax Day is exactly one month away, July 15, and an estimated 500,000 Hoosiers still need to file their individual income taxes, according to the Indiana Department of Revenue (DOR).

"We always advise individuals to avoid waiting until the last minute, especially if they are expecting a refund," suggested DOR Commissioner Bob Grennes. "For the fastest service, customers should file electronically—not only are returns processed faster, but they are more accurate and secure."

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the individual income tax season was extended from the traditional April 15 deadline to July 15 to allow customers more time to file and pay taxes owed. If an individual owes taxes, penalties and interest can be avoided by paying 90% of the tax owed by the July 15 deadline.

Additionally, individual estimated payments with deadlines of April 15 or June 15, 2020, are due on July 15.

Still need to file? The Indiana free file (INfreefile) program is still available to qualifying individuals to file their individual income taxes for free. If an individual's adjusted gross income was \$69,000 or less in 2019, they may be eligible to use the free online software from DOR-certified vendors.

DOR offers several tax tips to assist individuals when filing their returns to avoid delaying their refund, including:

Print all information in blue or black ink, if filing by paper.

Do not staple any checks or returns.

Don't duplicate your filing (electronically and by paper), as this will cause processing delays.

Be sure to send all W-2s and 1099s along with your return.

If you receive any correspondence from DOR, respond quickly and accordingly.

FRAUD ALERT

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development (DWD) is issuing a fraud alert to notify those who have filed for unemployment insurance benefits in 2020 that they need to protect their personal information from potential scammers.

The U.S. Department of Labor Office of Inspector General has discovered that scammers are sending emails in an effort to steal claimants' passwords, account numbers, and/or Social Security numbers. With this information they can gain access to email, bank, or other accounts.

The scammers are sending emails using the names of companies or individuals familiar to claimants. They use familiar icons, folder names, and programs to trick

claimants into providing their personal information to them.

Claimants can protect themselves by hovering over the links scammers include in the emails, but not clicking on it, to see where it will take them. Most scammers will use a URL shortened to hide the website's true identity. You can also call the sender to inquire if the email is legitimate.

The links send the victim to a webpage, which looks like a Microsoft SharePoint website. It further requires the user to sign-in using a Google, Microsoft, Apple, Yahoo! or other user account.

Once you have signed into a personal account, the scammers will obtain your username and password. They will have access to the files you have stored online and your contact lists. They may use this contact list to send the same scam email to your friends and family.

The scammers may use your personal information to collect unemployment insurance in your name or change your bank account number to one of their own.

DWD does NOT require claimants to use a secondary account to sign into its online filing system (Uplink).

AN ALASKAN AND YUKON TRIP DAYS # 1 & 2

Three years ago, on June 25th we departed for an in-depth journey to our most northern state. We left Indianapolis International Airport, stopped over at Denver and finally, after ten hours in the air, the plane touched down in Anchorage, AK.

Alaska's huge land mass was originally called, "Seward's Folly," or "Seward's Ice Box!" It was purchased in 1867 during that U. S. Secretary of State's tenure while President Andrew Johnson was in office. Russia decided not to expand its land holdings and sold it to the U.S. Senate ratified the sale by a margin of one vote!

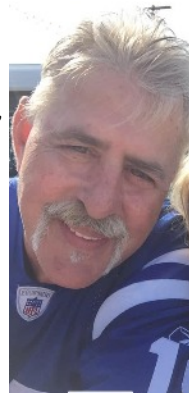

Anchorage is home to 45% of Alaska's population. Four high schools exist with approximately 1800 students in each. The low and high ocean tide difference is 39 feet! Only one cruise ship can be accommodated at a time. Constant dredging is mandatory in the harbor.

Other local information of importance is that Anchorage is only the ceremonial, not actual, start of the Iditarod Trail Dog Sled Race. This is difficult to believe since the city receives 75 inches of snow yearly. The state average snowfall is 120 inches and the state record is 158 inches!

In Anchorage the average temperatures range from 60 degrees in summer to 20 degrees in winter. On June 21, there are 22 hours of daylight and only 5 ½ hours on December 21 each year. In Barrow, AK, 80 days of sun exist in the summer and 80 days of darkness in winter. Sunglasses and bears go into hibernation then.

There are three million lakes in Alaska. Lakes Hood and Spaniard cling to Anchorage where 1100 airplanes, many with pontoon landing gear, call home. It is not unusual to have "Airplane Crossing" signs on some roadways. Many aircraft have large, "Tundra tires."

Alaska residents can humorously be known as "Sourdoughs." After two years of adjusting to life here, many people are sour and they have no dough. The first trains in the state were called, "Moose Goosers." A moose can weigh 900 pounds and eat his body weight every 48 hours. Wow!

Watch out, Golden Corral. These animals grow new antlers every year. And here is the biggie: It is illegal to ride a moose or give alcohol to a
