The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, July 20. The meeting was held in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Tony Manry opened the meeting at 7 p.m. All in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

The Engineer was in attendance at the meeting and reported on progress of building the new fire station.

The foundation was almost completed. He submitted the first claim to the contractor.

There were a few citizens in attendance at the meeting. One commented the Police Department is doing a good job.

Officer Donnie Bosley gave the Police report. He had sent four Ordinance violations to clean up their

properties. They were given an additional ten days to complete the project. If it has not been completed by then the Attorney will be notified. Bosley also reported that those in town with chickens have apparently gotten rid of them. Chickens are not allowed in town.

Donnie Plummer gave the Utility report. They had installed a four inch water line for the new fire station.

Raffle tickets for the Popcorn Festival are on sale at the Town Hall. They are on sale for chance to win \$100.00.

It has been decided that there will no longer be adjustments to water bills for water leaks or letting water run in winter to prevent frozen pipes.

The next Council meeting will be August 3. It will be a public meeting. There will be no local business, only Blight Clearance Grant application.



ATTEND DKG CONVENTION

Alpha Zeta Chapter members Karen Kinney, Carol Herzog, Carol Winterholter and Barb Buroker from Huntington County and Roxanne Thomas from Whitley County attended the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International (DKG) Convention and joined with women educators from around the world in Nashville, Tennessee, July 5-9, 2016. DKG is a professional honor society for women educators with more than 77,000 members. Established in 17 member countries around the world, the Society defines its mission as promoting professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education. The Society held its first convention in May, 1930, at the Driskill Hotel in Austin, TX.

The five-day event included keynote speaker Mike Figliuolo, found of thought LEADERS and author of One Piece of Paper: The Simple Approach to Powerful, Personal Leadership and other books. Figliuolo offered DKG members effective steps in Leading the Thinking: Setting Direction and Driving Action for Your Team. He later held a special session for state organization presidents.

Other DKG convention speakers included classical violinist turned innovative composer, Kai Kight, who inspired attendees to compose unique ideas in a world that celebrates conformity; author of the well-known children's book

Alexander and the Terrible No Good, Very Bad Day, Judith Viorst, gave the members her Life Lessons from Under Eight Till over Eighty: What we've learned or need to learn to help us develop and grow over the decades; and Natalye Paquin, who leads Girl Scouts of the USA's (GSUSA) Office of Strategy and Advancement and is the Chief Transformation Officer, helped us to celebrate the DKG-Girl Scouts collaboration.

On Wednesday, July 6th and Thursday, July 7th more than 100 breakout sessions provided participants with cutting-edge knowledge on communications/technology, educational excellence, empowering women, legislative advocacy, leadership, and much more.

New to the convention this year were Hot Topics mini-sessions and Cyber Center tech trainings using one's own device.

Friday July 8th, the election of International Officers and Committees was held; Carol Herzog was elected and installed as the Northeast Representative (2016-2020) to the Nominations Committee.

A Celebration of Life memorial service was held Saturday morning, July 9th.

Numerous scholarships were awarded, and recent doctoral graduates were recognized.

The County Music Hall of Fame was lauded as a Friend of Education.

Karen Kinney won free meals and registration to

attend the 2018 DKG International Convention in Austin, TX.

Alpha Zeta Chapter members are women educators who live and/or work in Grant, Huntington, Wabash and Whitley Counties.

The honor organization of key women educators was formed in Austin TX on May 11, 1929, by Dr Annie Webb Blanton from a nucleus of 12 founders representing all levels of education, kindergarten through university. Professor of rural education at the University of Texas, Dr Blanton was elected president of the Texas State Teachers' Association in 1916, the first woman to hold that office.

Blanton was also the first woman to serve Texas as State Superintendent of Public Instruction, having been elected in 1918.

TAKE YOUR STRESS FOR A WALK IN THE WOODS

Yes, today's world is a very hectic place. Our cities and towns are crowded with more people and traffic. Constantly-changing technology is always seeking our attention, and daily living has become more stressful. We are over-stimulated and often overwhelmed.

Most of us have learned to cope with our busy lives, but there is a price we are paying for the almost constant stress we face. We may appear to ignore a lot of the

stimulation coming at us each day, but doing so takes almost constant unconscious effort. Studies have found that stressful environments can lead to anxiety and depression, and may also be at least part of the reason for headaches, drinking problems, and various other serious health issues.

So how do we deal with a world that is constantly making demands upon us? The simplest answer, according to many experts, is simply to get away from it all, even if just for a short time. While most of us don't want to move to some remote cabin, experts advise adding just a little nature to our daily lives can make an important difference.

Studies find that even small, simple changes help reduce stress. People who have

worked in an office with no windows or just a view of a blank wall, report finding their work environment much more pleasant if they are able to look out and simply see a tree or two.

Something as easy as adding a potted plant or two to the area where you spend a good part of your day can also help reduce daily stress.

The biggest benefit appears to come from actually getting outdoors and into nature.

Yes, a walk in the woods really can help sooth you and give you a break from a busy life. But there are also benefits from just taking a lunch time stroll through a nearby park or down a tree-lined street.

This time with nature isn't an opportunity to worry about the day's problems or upcoming issues, but rather a chance to actually listen to the quiet of nature, to admire the beauty of an old tree, or just to smile at those squirrels chasing one another.

No, a walk in the woods is not going to be a miracle cure for all of life's stresses, but it does give your mind a chance to relax and regroup, and that's a positive thing.

plan. You have to make the decision to have a peaceful, less stressful life AND you have to commit to it FOR THE RIGHT REASON. The best reason is so that you can enjoy life more. In iron skillet very hot place 4 tablespoon butter(ours was home churned) and 1` 1/2 cup brown sugar stir to caramelize, remove from heat and in separate bowl beat 2 eggs and add 2 cups milk, very slowly add to the sugar mixture and place back on stove and stir constantly till thickened add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract. Pour into bakes pie shell and top with meringue. Was good eating.


