MASTER GARDENER

If you want to sharpen your gardening skills and you have an interest in sharing your knowledge with others, Purdue University has the ideal program for you.

Beginning February 21, 2017, a Purdue Master Gardener Program training series will be offered for residents of Grant County and surrounding areas. The Purdue Master Gardener Program is a volunteer training program that provides a learning framework for participants to increase their knowledge on a wide variety of

horticultural subjects. In turn, participants volunteer, representing Purdue University. As volunteers, participants grow by sharing knowledge while providing leadership and service in educational gardening activities within their communities.

Training will be held from 9:30 am - 4:15 pm every other Tuesday beginning February 21 through May 16 (7 sessions total). Participants will be exposed to a wide range of subjects including soil and plant science, diagnosis of plant problems, pesticide safety, and culture of vegetable, flower, and landscape plants.

Materials and expenses for the series of classes cost \$125.00 per participant. This expense fee covers such items as reference notebooks, mailings, and name badges. These materials all become part of the Master Gardener's personal collection.

While the class will be encouraged to create new educational outreach programs, there are already plenty of opportunities for which volunteers are needed.

Some of these projects include staffing information booths at gardening events, teaching public education classes, speaking to local clubs and organizations, and hands-on demonstration gardens.

SEEKING PROPOSALS

Huntington University is seeking proposals for a public art commission for the inner lobby wall of the Merillat Centre for the Arts (MCA). Regional artists within 150 miles of Huntington University's home campus and HU alumni nationwide are encouraged to submit proposals.

"We are looking specifically for a work of art that reflects the creative vitality and artistic expression of Huntington University's visual and performing arts programs," stated Rebecca Coffman, professor of art.

The MCA is the center for the visual and performing arts, housing the Robert E. Wilson Gallery, Zurcher Auditorium as well as the Department of Visual Arts, Theater, Music and Broadcast Media, and it serves as a hub for regional art, performance, music and other year-round campus and community

events. The MCA lobby also serves as the entrance to the university's Welcome Center and hosts more than 6,000 visitors to campus each year.

The MCA's architectural design affords a spacious, open lobby with a large wall space on its east side. This inner façade is brick covered and measures 35' wide x 10' high. The façade offers the artist an exceptional space for the creation of art that reflects the life, vitality and spirit of Huntington University and the MCA.

The "call for public art" is the first phase of the application process. Submissions will be judged on their use of space, material, color, scale, proportion and other aesthetics, as well as their ability to creatively and accurately convey the artistic life that resides within the MCA. Applications must have; 1) letter of interest, 2) artist resume or CV, and 3) three to five examples of work. All applications must be in a single, small-file PDF format. The deadline for the first phase is January 17, 2017.

In phase two, three selected applicants will be awarded \$500 to develop two concept proposals containing; 1) a written description detailing their art, 2) a set of finished

drawings depicting the art, 3) a production timeline, 4) a budget, and 5) a material list. An all-inclusive award of \$8,500 will be awarded to execute one of the approved concepts.

The award includes artist fees, and all costs associated with the engineering and fabrication of the art work, delivery and installation.

GET SMART ABOUT ANTIBIOTICS

State health officials are raising awareness of antibiotic resistance and promoting the responsible use of antibiotics during the week of Nov. 14-20, which Governor Mike Pence has

proclaimed Get Smart About Antibiotics Week.

The campaign, now in its seventh year, is a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) initiative. The effort coordinates work of CDC's Get Smart: Know When Antibiotics Work campaign and enlists states, nonprofit groups and for-profit partners to improve antibiotic stewardship in communities, in healthcare facilities and on the farm.

"Antibiotic resistance is a more pervasive threat than many people know," said State Health Commissioner Jerome Adams, M.D., M.P.H. "By prescribing antibiotics responsibly, healthcare providers can help ensure that patients with serious bacterial infections have access to effective, life-saving medications."

At least 2 million people in the United States become infected each year with bacteria that are resistant to antibiotics, and an estimated 23,000 people die as a direct result of these infections.

Many others die from conditions that were complicated by an antibiotic-resistant infection.

The CDC has deemed antibiotic resistance an urgent public health threat. According to the CDC, antibiotic use is the single most important factor leading to antibiotic resistance around the world. Antibiotics are among the most commonly prescribed

 medications, yet up to 50 percent of the antibiotics prescribed are for people for whom they aren't appropriate or effective.

Antibiotics treat bacteria, not viruses. Taking antibiotics for viral infections, such as a cold, the flu or most types of bronchitis, will not cure the infections, keep other individuals from catching the illness or help you feel better. Taking antibiotics when they are not needed increases the risk of getting an infection later that resists antibiotic treatment.

If you are ill, a few days of rest may be all you need to take care of your illness. Before you take antibiotics for an infection, make sure you ask your healthcare provider if an antibiotic is necessary. If so, remember these important tips:

- When you are prescribed an antibiotic, take it exactly as the doctor tells you.
- Complete the prescribed course, even if you are feeling better. If treatment stops too soon, some bacteria may survive and re-infect you.
- Get rid of any unused medication. Many pharmacies offer prescription take-back days or provide envelopes that can be used to mail unused medications to environmentally safe disposal facilities.
- Do not share your antibiotics with others or take other people's

antibiotics. Antibiotics can cause serious, and even life-threatening allergic reactions in some people.

State health officials are collaborating with several partners, including the Indiana Hospital Association, Indiana University Hospitals and Butler University, on a project to educate healthcare providers and their patients about the dangers of overprescribing and overusing antibiotics. The project includes an education booth at the Indianapolis Colts game against the Tennessee Titans on Nov. 20.

"I think the booth is a great way to get out there and educate the public about what antibiotic resistance is and the harm it can cause," said Kristen Nichols, an assistant professor of pharmacy practice at Butler University's College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences and an infectious disease pharmacist at Riley Hospital for Children. "It is crucial to have this conversation, and not just when patients feel they need an antibiotic. Outreach like this allows us to inform people proactively."

Combine butter and sugars, add egg and orange peel, mix alternately with flour and liquids, add nuts and cranberries by folding them in. Bake in oiled loaf pan 50-60 minutes at 350.
