On Monday evening, January 26, 2009 the Warren Town Council met in Assembly Hall. President Bill Cartwright opened the meeting at 6:30 p.m. and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

A citizen in attendance wanted names of people to contact with the railroad directly concerning the repair of railroad tracks in Warren.

They also brought up the subject of sidewalks at Langton Estates. A total of \$7,650 is expected to replace LED bulbs and wiring for Christmas lights. This is a combined project of Council and Chamber of Commerce.

Heartland Aluminum expects to install two new ovens. Curtis Day discussed needs to upgrade the electric service for the project. Council voted to renew benefit insurance with a 9% increase in



SUGGESTIONS NEEDED

The Indiana Natural Resources Commission is seeking public suggestions as part of an ongoing comprehensive review and enhancement of fish and wildlife rules for the Department of Natural Resources.

Substantive rule change suggestions can be made through a Web-based interactive form by going to IN.gov/nrc/ and clicking on the "Submit a Suggestion" link. The introduction of the online suggestion form marks the beginning of the third stage of a four-stage process recommended last year by a steering committee composed of Natural Resources Commission chairman Bryan Poynter; DNR deputy director John Davis; Col. Mike Crider, head of the DNR Division of Law Enforcement; Sandra Jensen, NRC administrative law judge; Patrick Early, chair of the DNR Advisory Council; and John Goss, executive director of the Indiana Wildlife Federation.

The suggestion form will be available until April 1. An advisory group will review the suggestions and conduct public hearings to determine the merit of suggestions received. The advisory group will report its findings and recommendations to the NRC in late 2009. Actual proposal of substantive rule amendments are not expected to be presented to the NRC until early 2010.

The first stage of the project was to readopt all Fish and Wildlife Rules (312 IAC 9) without change to ensure the rules did not expire while the remainder of the project is in progress. The readopted rules became effective on Dec. 24, 2008.

The Stage 2 goal is to provide clarity and consistency of interpretation and to improve enforceability with only minor amendments to the rules in three

segments. The NRC granted preliminary adoption Tuesday to the first segment of amendments on deer hunting and hunter education rules. Additional segments will address rules associated with wild animals (except deer), mammals and game birds (March 2009), and rules associated with reptiles, amphibians, fish, invertebrates, commercial licenses and permits (May 2009). It is hoped Stage 2 will be completed and approved by October or November.

"Our intent is to take what we have and organize it, update it, and develop a more user-friendly product that encourages people to hunt and fish rather than discourage them because they don't understand the rules,' Poyntersaid. "We want to unravel any language barriers by employing public input to help point us in that direction."

The fourth stage provides an option to work with the state legislature to enact necessary amendments to existing statutes.

HEALTH **T**IPS

Wintertemperatures are dropping rapidly, so staying warm and dry can be a challenge. Extremely cold weather is expected for the days ahead and the Indiana State Department of Health recommends Hoosiers take steps to plan for the cold.

Health officials say serious health problems can result from prolonged exposure to the cold. The most common cold-related problems are hypothermia and frostbite.

Hypothermia occurs when a person's body begins to lose heat faster than it can be produced. Prolonged exposure to the cold will ultimately use up a body's stored energy. This results in hypothermia, or abnormally low body temperature. Body temperature that is too low affects



the brain, making the victim unable to think clearly or move well.

Frostbite causes a loss of feeling and color in affected areas. It most often affects the nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers or toes. Frostbite can permanently damage the body, and severe cases can lead to amputation. The risk of frostbite is increased in people with reduced blood circulation and among people who are not dressed properly for extremely cold temperatures. Seek care from a health care professional immediately if you detect symptoms of frostbite such as numbness, waxy-feeling skin or a white or gray colored area of skin.

"Longtime exposure to extreme cold can result in a medical emergency," Joan Duwve, M.D., Medical Director, Injury Prevention said. "It is important to be aware of the symptoms of hypothermia and frostbite. If possible, stay inside during extremely cold weather. There are safety steps to follow to heat your home and stay warm if you must go outside."

Dr. Duwve recommends wearing the following items when outdoors in extreme cold:

A hat or hood as most heat is lost through the head;

A scarf or knit mask to cover face and mouth;

Sleeves that are snug at the wrist

Mittens (they are warmer than gloves);

Water-resistant coat and boots;

Several layers of loose-fitting

Health officials offer the following tips for staying warm and safe while at home:

Use fireplace, wood stoves, or other combustion heaters only if they are properly vented to the outside;

Never use a charcoal or gas grill indoors—the fumes are deadly;

Never leave lit candles unattended;

Keep as much heat as possible inside your home; and

Eat well-balanced meals to help you stay warmer.

Dr. Duwve would also like to remind Hoosiers that the misuse of portable heating equipment can lead to fire or dangerous levels of carbon monoxide. Take precautions to ensure you are heating your home safely and that you have a working carbon monoxide detector.

The cost of the photo vision screening is paid in full by the Lions Club of Huntington County.

The vision screening provides instant photographs of each child's eyes to determine the presence of possible eye disorders, and is approximately 85-90% effective in detecting significant factors that can cause a decrease in vision. Photo screening is a vision screening device- it is not a diagnostic tool. It is part of a comprehensive vision care program including regular eye exams by an eye care professional.

"The goal of the project is that we want all of the two to five-yearolds in Huntington County to participate in Operation Kid Sight," said Herb Mills, Chairman of the "Operation Kid Sight" program for the Lion's Club of Huntington County. MATH/SCIENCE AWARDS

Governor Mitch Daniels has announced that applications are now being accepted for the 2009 Hoosier High School Math and Science Awards. The governor created the award last year to recognize the state's top high school talent in math and science.

"Our best math and science students are vastly more important to Indiana's future than our best athletes, and I say that as a fervent sports fan," said Daniels. "It's time they got the applause they have earned."

All Indiana high school students are eligible to receive the award and can apply online. Nominations from teachers. principals and other school staff members will also be accepted. Application criteria will include such information as SAT, ACT and Advanced Placement scores, awards and prizes as well as grades received in math and science courses. Winners, who will be acknowledged as Mr. or Miss Math or Science, respectively, will be selected by a committee of high school math and science teachers, curriculum experts from the Indiana Department of Education, and representatives from the Governor's Office. Each winner also will receive a \$2,000 academic scholarship from McGraw-Hill Education.

"We must create a culture in Indiana education that instills our students with the same passion for academics that our society currently has for athletics, and that begins with programs like this that reward our academic achievers with the same recognition we give to our athletic

achievers," said Superintendent of Public Instruction Dr. Tony Bennett.

The award was developed with input from the Indiana Science Technology Engineering Mathematics Network, the Hoosier Association of Science Teachers, Inc., the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the Science Education Foundation of Indiana, Inc. and the Indiana Department of Education.





nation's roadways due to impaired drivers.

"No matter which team you're rooting for in Super Bowl XLIII, if you choose to drink, make a play for safety by giving your keys to a soberdriver. By working together, we can reduce the number of alcohol-related crashes and fatalities on Indiana roadways this year," said ICJI Executive Director, T. Neil Moore. "Designating a sober driver should be on the top of everyone's Super Bowl party list."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 48 percent of the fatalities that occurred nationwide on Super Bowl Sunday in 2007 (12:01 a.m. Sunday to 5:59 a.m. Monday) were in crashes involving a driver or motorcycle rider with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) level of .08 or higher.

Thirty-three percent of the fatalities that occurred in Indiana crashes on Super Bowl Sunday 2007 involved a driver or motorcycle rider under the influence of alcohol or drugs. For 2007, fatalities occurring in alcohol-related crashes accounted for 28.9 percent of all motor vehicle traffic fatalities statewide.

No matter how you plan to spend game day, follow these safe celebrating tips. If you are hosting a Super Bowl party:

You can be held liable and prosecuted if someone you served ends up in an impaired-driving

crash.

Make sure all of your guests designate their sober drivers in advance, or help arrange ridesharing with other sober drivers.

Serve non-alcoholic beverages at your party. Remember, you and your guests can enjoy the game without drinking alcohol.

Be a friend. Give guests the option to stay over if they've had too much to drink.

Collect keys at the door for guests who plan to drink before the party begins.

Keep the numbers for local cab companies handy, and take the keys away from anyone who is thinking of driving while impaired. If you are attending a Super Bowl party orwatching at a sports bar or restaurant:


Designate your soberdriver before the party begins and give that person your car keys.

If you don't have a designated driver, ask a sober friend for a ride home; call a cab, friend, or family member to come and get you; or just stay where you are and sleep it off until you are sober.

Never let a friend leave your sight if you think they are about to drive while impaired. Remember, Fans Don't Let Fans Drive Drunk.

Always buckle up – it's still your best defense against other impaired drivers.

If you suspect you have spotted an impaired driver on the roadway call 911.
