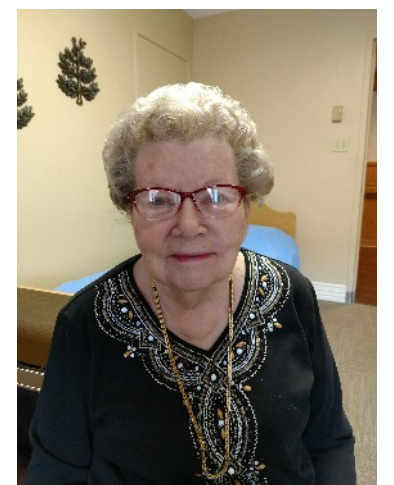

DRUG TAKE-BACK

Spring cleaning season is here. Time to dig into closets, garage, pantry – and yes, even your medicine cabinet. Medications that are expired or not needed shouldn't sit around your household.

So what to do? The best choice is to drop off unwanted medications at a

local disposal event, or at a permanent drop-off location. Huntington County disposal event at PHH

On Saturday, April 27, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Parkview Huntington Hospital will host a Prescription Drug Take-back Day in conjunction with the Huntington County Sheriff's Department, the Indiana Professional Licensing Agency and the Indiana State Board of Pharmacy.

"We are happy to be able to provide community residents with a safe, responsible and convenient way to dispose of their medications that are expired or no longer needed," said Bryan Hall, pharmacy manager, Parkview Huntington Hospital (PHH), who is coordinating the event. "Serving as a drop-off location is a way PHH can help prevent prescription medications from reaching our streets and schools, where they can be misused or abused. Encouraging the health and well-being of Huntington County residents is central to our mission, so this type of safety-oriented event is a natural for us, as it is for the Sheriff's Department."

On April 27, representatives of the state pharmacy board will join Sheriff's Department officers and PHH pharmacy team members at the hospital to collect discarded medications for later destruction. A drive-thru drop-off point will be located in the Emergency Department (ED) parking lot. A tent will mark the location not far from the ED entrance.

What to bring

Drop off unneeded and expired prescription and over-the-counter medications – in tablet, capsule, gel tab or other solid dosage form. All medications should be in their original bottles or packages. Illegal drugs, drugs in liquid form, and needles/sharps will not be accepted.

Tips for disposal -- Liquids

While liquids will NOT be accepted at this event, here are some tips for safely disposing of them:

- Add kitty litter, flour or sawdust to the original container.

- Remove labels from prescription bottles or completely obscure all patient information with dark permanent ink.

- Secure all containers with their lids on tightly and put them in a sealed, heavy-duty bag to keep medications from leaking.

- Put the sealed bag in your trash so that it is not visible, to avoid unintended use or accidental contact.

Tips for disposal -- Sharps

It is especially important to dispose of used sharps properly. While sharps will NOT be accepted at this event, here are some tips for diabetics and others on appropriate disposal measures for sharps:

- Any used sharp should immediately be placed in a sharps disposal container made of puncture-resistant plastic with leak-resistant sides and bottom and a tight, puncture-resistant lid.

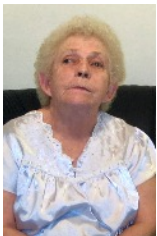

• A heavy-duty plastic household container, such as a thick-sided laundry detergent bottle, can be used to contain sharps if an FDA-approved container is not available.

• Once the sharps have been placed in the container, seal the lid firmly in place with duct tape to eliminate any chance that it will come open.

• After the sharps container is completely sealed and secured, place it in your trash can.

She was instrumental in the development of young women both in and out of the business school. She organized trips to the statehouse in Indianapolis for women to practice their stenography skills in a professional setting. She also served as a Girls State and Girls Nation lead volunteer and furthered the development of thousands of young women.

Her life was varied from politics to business to education, but her motive was the same: to encourage young women to aspire to achieve more with their lives than being a traditional domestic ideal of a woman.

Alice Cleo Crestinger Stuber was born in Grant County, Indiana. She married Roy G. Stuber in 1911 and they resided south and west of Lafontaine in Grant County. They lived on a farm and had two sons, Erle and Ervin. Having some dairy cows, Cleo came up with the idea of making butter selling it along with cream, cottage cheese and butter milk. She started a butter route in Marion, Indiana and ran a very profitable route.

They later purchased and moved to small farm in Jackson Township in Wells County four miles south of Warren. A business person in Warren ask her to bring her dairy products to Warren and she started a new route.

Her sons were older and could help her with delivery. Later in the 1920's when times were very rough, her money helped save the farm during the depression. She would also help sell World War II bonds in Wells County. President, Suellen Jones closed the meeting with a quote by William James "The deepest caring of human nature is the need to be appreciated."

TRASH BASH

The Indiana Department of Transportation today announced that the agency's annual Trash Bash! will take place April 15 through April 30. Trash Bash! brings INDOT crews together with volunteers to beautify the state's roadside areas by cleaning trash and debris.

INDOT urges individuals, organizations, businesses and active Adopt-a-Highway groups to join maintenance staff on two-lane roads with lower traffic volume anytime between Monday, April 15, and Tuesday, April 30, in an effort to beautify our roadside areas. During the first day, INDOT maintenance staff across the state will take a day away from their everyday tasks of maintaining the roads, bridges and roadsides to focus on litter collection.

In 2018, Trash Bash! took place April 13-15. That weekend, hundreds of INDOT employees joined forces

with active Adopt-a-Highway groups and other organizations and individuals to collect 3,457 bags of trash, or the equivalent of 874 cubic yards.

Beyond volunteer and INDOT maintenance efforts, the agency is increasing investment in annual roadside maintenance from \$19 million to \$57 million to put more resources to cleaning and mowing along the state's highways.

The Adopt-a-Highway and Sponsor-a-Highway programs are great opportunities for volunteering, community service projects, and offer a highly visible option for showcasing your business or non-profit group.

Motorists are reminded to look out for work crews and volunteers along Indiana highways. When drivers encounter a work crew, they should slow down, be alert for changing traffic patterns, and always avoid distractions such as cell phones while driving.
