

WANTED

Work on a video history to commemorate the 100th birthday of Indiana state parks and reservoirs, which will be celebrated in 2016, has started. To connect that video with Hoosiers from all around the state, the DNR Division of State Parks and Reservoirs is seeking stories and videos from those who have visited the properties over the years.

The video, which will air in fall 2009, is being developed in partnership with WTIU, the public television station in Bloomington.

Items sought vary from old still photos to slides, film, videotape, and souvenirs from visits to any of Indiana's 24 state parks. Examples include scenic blackand-white photos from the 1930s, 8mm film of family camping trips in the 1960s, postcards, buttons, pins or banners. Written descriptions of the items and any stories or memories associated with the object are encouraged.

Items may be loaned or donated. WTIU will create digital copies of loaned items, then return the originals to the owner. Items donated will be archived or curated for future use in a State Parks and Reservoirs Centennial collection.

Photos, film and other memorabilia submitted may also be used on the Web, in Outdoor Indiana magazine, and in exhibits, brochures and other interpretive media over the next few years, as the Indiana State Parks Centennial celebration starts to move into full swing.

IMMUNIZATION AWARENESS

Governor Daniels has declared September 21-27 as Adult Immunization Awareness Week according to Roland Grieb, M.D., chair of the Indiana Adult Immunization Coalition.

In his proclamation, the Governor called for Hoosiers to increase their knowledge, acceptance and use of vaccines to protect adolescents and adults against serious, life-threatening disease.

"Each year tens of thousands of adolescents and adults die from vaccine-preventable diseases of their complications across the U.S.," Grieb said. He continued that the deaths are spread among all ages, cultures, races, ethnic and societal groups.

"Safe and effective vaccines are readily available to protect against disease, disability and death from communicable disease," Grieb said. He explained that communicable diseases are those diseases that are transmitted from one person to another directly by contact with any bodily discharge or indirectly from contaminated objects like door handles or telephone handsets.

Communicable diseases are those that are caused by bacteria, fungi, parasites and viruses.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that older adults get the following vaccines:

Influenza (flu) vaccine - Adults should get the flu vaccine every year to avoid getting the flu and spreading it to loved ones. Every year in the U.S., an average of 36,000 people die from the flu. Most of these deaths are among adults 65 years old and older.

Pneumococcal vaccine - One shot reduces the risk of pneumococcal disease. Pneumococcal disease can cause serious infections of the lungs (pneumonia), the bloodstream (bacteremia), and the covering of the brain (meningitis). Pneumococcal disease is one of the most common causes of vaccine-preventable death in the U.S. and is particularly dangerous for older adults.

Shingles vaccine - One shot reduces the risk of shingles and long-term pain after shingles in adults 60 years old and older. Shingles is a disease that causes a painful, blistering rash. One in five people with shingles will have severe, long-term pain after the rash heals. Shingles is more common and more serious in older adults. Nearly 1 million Americans get shingles every year and about half of them are 60 years old and older. Shingles shares the same virus as chickenpox.

The Indiana Adult Immunization Coalition is a voluntary group of health and older adult focused organizations dedicated to eradicating vaccine preventable deaths and disease among adults. The Coalition promotes education and outreach activities to increase awareness of and participation in adult immunizations.

PROPER LEAF DISPOSAL

Along with children returning to school, autumn brings with it the bounty of summer's harvest, crisp evening air and the changing color of fall foliage. While nature's beauty provides a glorious visual display, what Hoosiers do with fallen leaves can affect the environment.

Historically, many Hoosiers have been quick to reach for their matches to rid their vards of fallen leaves and other yard wastes, such as grass clippings, branches and weeds. While burning gets rid of the wastes, the smoke from these fires affects air quality, so setting fire to yard debris is not advised. Smoke from all fires releases carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides, fine particles and ozone-forming chemicals and can cause a number of negative impacts for Hoosiers and our environment. Unlike dry, seasoned fire wood, fallen leaves have high moisture content and tend to smolder, releasing thick, unhealthy smoke that can affect family members, neighbors and our environment.

Why should we be concerned about finding alternatives to open burning leaves and other vard waste? Anyone can be affected from the unhealthy smoke from burning piles of leaves. Elderly, young children and individuals with respiratory or heart ailments are particularly vulnerable to ill health effects from fine particle emissions. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) revised the threshold for both particulate matter and ozone, holding all communities accountable for ensuring concentrations lower than ever before. As a result, all of us should work together to prevent unhealthy emissions from unnecessary open burning of leaves and other yard waste.

The good news is there are simple things every one of us can do to improve air quality, starting

with the disposal of yard debris. The best way to get rid of leaves, branches and other yard wastes is by composting, chipping and mulching. These options can be done in your own yard or through a program set up with your city, township or county. Composting returns nutrients to the soil instead of releasing harmful chemicals into the air. Chipped wood can be used around trees and in flower beds to retain soil moisture and control weeds. Mulching leaves on the lawn with a lawn mower returns nutrients to the grass, fertilizing your yard. Raking leaves into a pile and composting them over the winter creates a fertile soil amendment that can be used for flower beds, gardens and potted plants in the spring. Food scraps can be added to an active compost pile yearround to reduce the amount of kitchen waste being sent to landfills.

Since burning leaves, twigs and other yard waste is bad for the environment, I strongly considering recommend alternative ways of ridding your yard of waste. Smoke is unhealthy to breathe, it's a hazard, and there are safer, cleaner and more environmentally-friendly ways of disposal.
