HOLIDAY MAILING TIPS

About 150 million cards, letters and parcels are mailed every day during the holiday mailing season. To ensure your presents and greetings get to their destination as quickly and safely and possible, follow these guidelines:

MAIL EARLY; mail volume backs up in the last days before Christmas so be among the smartest mailers who send early and then relax! Speed up your transactions at the post office by having all packages ready to mail before bringing them to the counter—securely packaged, properly addressed, with insurance or customs or delivery confirmation forms filled out. Cartons, tape, padded mailers, etc. can be purchased at your local post office. Express Mail and Priority Mail supplies are free.

ADDRESSING: Type or print the complete address neatly, preferably in capital letters. Computer labels are excellent for addressing cards. Include complete information, such as AVE or ST, the apartment number, directionals such as NE or SW, PO Box numbers and a correct zip code. Call 1-800-ASK-USPS or go to www.usps.com for zip codes and other mailing information.

ALWAYS include your correct, complete return address—this is especially important this year with increased concerns about mail safety.

Use dark blue or black ink or use a white label with dark printing. Avoid fancy colored inks, as they are difficult to read. White or light colored envelopes are also easier to read.

PACKAGING: Use a box that is strong enough to protect contents and large enough to allow room for plenty of cushioning. Use Styrofoam peanuts, bubble wrap, shredded paper, or plain popcorn to cushion contents. Pack glass and fragile items in another carton before cushioning and placing in the mailing box. Remove glass from photo frames and wrap separately from photographs to prevent damage to them. Remove batteries from toys so they aren't mistaken for prohibited items and delayed or returned if they accidentally get turned on.

Use tape that is designed for shipping such as pressure-sensitive packaging tape or reinforced tape. Never use scotch tape, string or twine. Write addresses directly on the carton with black permanent marker if possible. If the package must be wrapped, make sure the wrapping is secure enough that it won't be torn off in handling. Place the mailing address and return address on one side of the package only. It's a good idea to include a label with addresses inside the parcel also. Be sure to black out any other markings on the carton, especially those that could indicate hazardous or restricted matter inside, such as "ORM-D."

Packages that weigh one-pound or more must be brought to the post office for mailing.

MAILING DEADLINES: Always mail as soon as possible, but when short on time, use Priority Mail or Express Mail to ensure your parcels arrive as quickly as possible. International mail should be sent at least

by the first week of December, by Air-Mail. This year, APO and FPO mail should be sent IMMEDIATELY as armed forces mail undergoes extra security by the military, which may delay it. Domestic parcels should be mailed no later than December 10, cards by December 15. Priority Parcels can be mailed later, but remember there is no guarantee for this service. Express Mail is guaranteed for Christmas delivery when mailed on December 24 to most locations and by December 22 to all others.

The American Heart Association suggests updating all CPR skills every two years.

REMEMBRANCE QUILT

All schools everywhere, kindergarten through grade 12, are encouraged to participate by sending one patch only. Patch material must be made of a cotton-polyester blend or other durable, easily sewn material. Decorations may be sewn on applique's, embroidery, painted (permanent, non-smudging, non-water base paint), or any method as long as it is durable and permanent when handled.

Finished patches from schools in Western New York are due at Holy Angels by December 14. All other schools are asked to send their patches by February 1, 2002 to : Holy Angels Academy, 24 Shoshone Drive, Buffalo, NY 14214.

HOW TO WRITE A BETTER HOLIDAY LETTER

If you will write a holiday letter for Christmas, it's time to begin. Will you make it in the same style or change the format this year?

The family story is the most common and the easiest to organize. You just start with the youngest or the oldest and work in the opposite direction. One problem: since people want to tell only the good things, they tend to boast. One can only wonder how every member of the family was so outstanding.

The personal essay requires a little more thought and tells what has been meaningful in the last year. It is more intimate. Don't write anything that is very personal. If you want to share that, make a phone call.

The entertaining letter is good. The best writers are masters at describing ironic and insignificant incidents. They can playfully exaggerate the accomplishments and failures of family members. Unfortunately, some people don't get it and are not entertained.

The creative letter is entertaining. It could be a rewrite of "Twas the Night Before Christmas" or Christmas from the view of the dog, or naming the 10 funniest things that happened or the 20 secrets we're telling you and nobody else.

Teacher and author Jim Heynen has some suggestions. Heynen, quoted in Better Homes and Gardens, says:

- Add a handwritten note to each one and be sure to sign it personally.
- Consider writing two letters, one for pals and one for distant acquaintances and relatives.
- Avoid boasting and giving bad news. Holiday wishes include good news only.
- Instead of a letter, consider sending a recent family photo and a personal note.
- If you give your e-mail address, be sure to give your telephone number as well. Not everyone has joined the computer age.

TIPS ON PLANNING A CHRISTMAS PARTY AT WORK

It's hard enough to buy the right gift for your loved ones. Buying gifts for coworkers, the boss, and clients is even worse.

One easy and charitable idea is to start an angel tree. The names and ages of needy children are provided by a church or charitable organization. SAVE YOUR HOLIDAY CHEER

Don't let the spirit of the season lull you into giving burglars, muggers or pickpockets chances to do their duty work. Criminals love the holidays as much as everyone else, chiefly because of all the cash, credit cards, valuables - and distracted people. says Col. Scott Minier of the Indiana Crime Prevention Coalition.

Minier, who adds economic times may make matters worse this year, encourages unsuspecting seasonal shoppers to keep these tips in mind:

If You're Traveling...

- Set an automatic timer for your lights.

- Ask your neighbor to watch your home, shovel the walks, pick up newspapers, collect mail and park in the driveway from time-to-time.

Be sure to hide any gifts and secure any valuables and firearms that may be left in the house while you're gone.

If You're Out for the Evening...

- Turn on lights and a radio or the TV, so that it appears that someone is home.

- Lock all doors and windows while you're out, even if you'll be gone for just a few minutes.

- Do not place packages or gifts near windows or in other high-visibility sites.

If You're Shopping...

- Don't let your guard down just because you are rushing.

- Stay alert and be aware of things around you at all times.

- Park in well-lighted spaces and as close to the store as possible. Lock your car doors, and hide packages in the trunk or out-of-sight.

- Do not carry large amounts of cash; pay with a check, debit or credit card if possible.

- Make sure that you do not carry all your packages at the same time.

- Carry your purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside jacket or front pants pocket

- If you take your children shopping, teach them to go to a police officer or a security guard if they get separated or lost.

If a Stranger Comes to the Door...

- Stay alert to couriers delivering packages to you or your neighbors.

- Many con artists take advantage of holiday giving by going door-to-door. Ask for identification from the charity and get specifics to how and where the donations will be used.

- If you feel uncomfortable, just say 'no thank you' and shut the door.

If You're at home...

- Turn on outside lights to deter burglars.

- Report any suspicious behavior to the police and local community watch groups.

- Make sure your homeowner's or renter's insurance is up-to-date and everything is inventoried properly.

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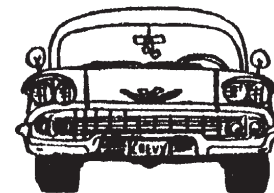
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
