#### **BLOOD DRIVE**

Summer means sun, fun and sometimes, a drop in blood donations. That's because school's out, and donors who regularly give throughout the academic year might wait until fall before donating blood again.

High school and college students donate about 20 percent of the blood collected

through the American Red Cross. Many give at scheduled drives at their high schools and colleges, typically held two to three times during the traditional school year. And when those drives stop, most students probably won't think about going to a summer drive, or hosting a blood drive of their own.

"We encourage everyone who can to connect with friends and family, then pick a date to donate blood and help keep the blood supply strong," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "You'll find Red Cross blood drives at churches.communitycenters. businesses and even at some schools with summer sessions. Perhaps there's a drive in a town you've never visited, or there's a special occasion you want to honor by hosting a drive of your own."

Current and potential blood donors will also find a wealth of opportunity to build a virtual community through the growing Red Cross presence on Facebook, You Tube, Twitter, Flickr and foursquare.

"Just because summer is here, it doesn't mean donating blood is on vacation, too," said Whitman. "You might find there's a lot of fun to be had in donating blood, or even sponsoring a blood drive of your own."

### 4-H FOOD DRIVE

Huntington County has the same economic issues as other cities and communities. In an effort to help the people of Huntington County, 4-H clubs and members will be hosting a can/non-perishable food drive from June 1 until June 26. Each club will have 25 days to collect food items and cleaning supplies which may include canned fruits & vegetables, boxed foods, paper products, cleaning supplies, laundry detergent, bar soap and dishwashing detergent, and shampoo. No fresh foods or glass items will be accepted for safety reasons. This is an countywide 4-H effort to challenge the youth to cross the poverty bridge and strengthen others with their charity and creativity.

In addition to collecting food pantry items, each club is encouraged to build something with the food collected within their 4-H club. On Sunday June 26, 2011, at 2 PM in the "H" building at Hier's Park the designs will come alive for all to see. There will be a judging of the creations and after the event all food collected will be donated to the food pantries within Huntington County.

Four-H Clubs are encouraged togetcommunityinvolvement in this project. Some clubs might be collecting door-todoor while others might place collection containers in community businesses.

## FREE FISHING

Outdoor fun only started with Memorial Day weekend.

Free Fishing Weekend, June 4-5, provides a chance for kids and adults to participate at recreation areas located across Indiana that are planning fun fishing derbies, casting clinics, fish-cleaning demonstrations and cooking classes.

Free Fishing Weekend also is a great chance for Hoosier adults who don't fish or haven't for a while to take a child fishing. That's because Indiana's adult residents do not need a license or a trout/ salmon stamp to fish Indiana waters during Free Fishing

Weekend. With children age 17 and vounger not needing a fishing license at any time, it's a perfect match. All other fishing regulations are still in effect during Free Fishing Weekend.

Adults who decide they want to buy a license for the rest of the year can do so any time at http://www.in.gov/dnr/ fishwild/5330.htm.

Individuals who need reasonable modifications for effective participation in Free Fishing Weekend events at DNR properties should contact the property at least 72 hours before the event or call the DNR ADACoordinator at (317) 232-4145.

Want a better way to find the fish? Several new lake bathymetry (depth) maps have been added to DNR's website iust in time for Free Fishing Weekend. This brings the number of such maps to 63 now available for free download in digital format.

The additions include two in Warrick County (Blue Grass and Otter), as well as Shipshewana and Nauvoo in LaGrange County, and Mud Lake in Noble County, and Indian Lake in DeKalb County.

Armed with these maps. Hoosier anglers of all experience levels can hit the water knowing the location of the deep holes and shallow areas fish love.

### WILD ANIMAL RESCUE

By "rescuing" an injured or apparently abandoned baby wild animal, you may doing the opposite of what you seek to accomplish, and break the law.

This time of year, thousands of animals are born in the wild. With the spread of suburban areas into their natural habitats, young animals are increasingly born near humans, who are more apt to discover them without an adult animal nearby. When this happens, a few reminders are

especially pertinent.

While some baby animals may be orphaned or abandoned, that's not always true.

Picking up a baby animal that is not orphaned or abandoned is not only usually unnecessary, it can be bad for the animal. It's also illegal if you don't have the proper permit or take the animal straight to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

Such animals also pose safety and health risks for humans. They may look helpless, cute and cuddly, but they can bite orscratch people who attempt to handle them. Some wild animals carry parasites and infectious diseases, some of which can be transmitted to humans.

"The apparent lack of an adult does not mean a young animal is or phaned," said Linnea Petercheff, operations staff specialist for the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife. "Adults often leave their young alone, safe in nests or dens while they forage for food, but rarely do they abandon their young."

If a bird has fallen out of a nest, it is OK to gently return it to the nest. The best way to make sure an animal is truly orphaned is to wait and check it periodically. If you are unsure, place some strings or sticks across the nest. Place some grass across the top of a rabbit nest that is found with young in it.

If such items are later disturbed, the mother has probably returned. In such a situation, leave the young animal alone. The adult will returnafter you leave the area. As an example, rabbits often come to the nest to feed their young only a couple of times a day.

The best way to make sure that a fawn that appears to be alone is truly orphaned is to wait and check it periodically. Before taking any action, remember the following:

-If the fawn is not injured, the mother is likely nearby.

-Leave the fawn alone and its mother will probably come andget it. Deer cantake better care of their young than a human can.

-Human scent on the fawn will not prevent the mother from taking care of it.

—If you do not see any deer nearby, have someone watch the fawn without being seen by the mother. In most cases, the mother will come backand get the fawn after you leave the area.

If you believe the mother has not returned to a nest or a deer has not come back to feed her fawn, or you know that the mother is no longer alive, call a licensed wildlife rehabilitator listed at: www.wildlife.in.gov.

Remember, state laws prohibit keeping protected wildanimals without apermit. Most species of wildlife are protected by law and cannot be kept as a pet. Federal laws also prohibit possession of migratory birds, including songbirds, raptors and waterfowl. It is even illegal to treat wild animals for sickness or injury without a permit.

Wild animal rehabilitation permits are issued to qualified

individuals who take in sick, injured, or orphaned wild animals with the intent of releasing them back into the wild.

If you encounter an injured, truly abandoned or sick wild animal, do one of the following for assistance:

- Check the DNR website.

- www.wildlife.in.gov and click on "Wildlife Rehabilitation" - Call the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife in Indianapolis, (317) 232-4080.
- Call your DNR law enforcement district headquarters or regional headquarters; contact information is at: <a href="http://www.in.gov/dnr/lawenfor/2755.htm">http://www.in.gov/dnr/lawenfor/2755.htm</a>
- Call a licensed veterinarian for immediate assistance with a sick or severely injured wild animal.


