The Town has received notification that the INDOT project to replace a culvert on SR 5 between 800 S and the I-69 area has been delayed until August. Signage will be put in place approximately one week prior to the start of construction. The project is scheduled for 35 days.

## RECEIVES GRANT

Solid Rock United Methodist Church Warren Indiana received a four thousand dollar grant from Huntington County Community Foundation. The matching grant funds will be used to help build a twenty by twenty five building. The new structure will replace the fifty year old concession booth located at Tower Park Warren Indiana. The new building will be handicapped accessible, energy efficient, minimal maintenance. Construction is planned to start the first of October 2018. Thanks to great community support the concession booth has generated over fifty thousand dollars in sales since Solid Rock United Methodist Church purchased the building seven years ago. After operation expenses are paid remaining revenue from concession sales is donated to Warren area non profit organizations.

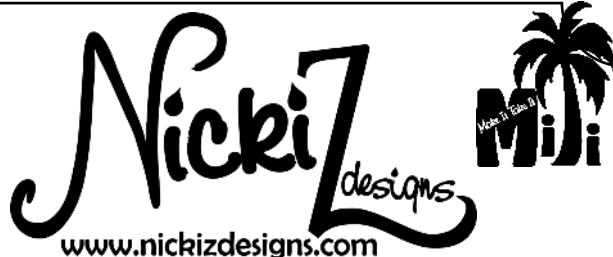

### A PARTIAL JOURNEY ON OLD ROUTE 66

In the quest to reach Phoenix, Arizona by Saturday to visit family and attend a graduation ceremony, my wife and I left home on a Tuesday. We decided at our ages that 350-400 miles traveling a day would be enough to keep our minds and bodies in check with reality.

Along the way we discovered some noteworthy sights. One of those was spending time traveling Old Route 66 for several miles. This historic road originated in Chicago to establish a route to the west coast with its terminus at Santa Monica, California near Los Angeles.

We first made connection with Route 66 just west of St. Louis at Sullivan, Missouri where we stayed overnight. Navigating this national landmark was not on our minds until just prior to departing Wednesday morning. We learned that Old Route 66 went right past the motel. Actually we exited I-44 onto it the previous day momentarily. So changed our minds and decided to turn left onto this historic road and stay off the busy interstate highway for a while. We quickly stopped for a photograph of a Route 66 road sign to authenticate the travel event. This road paralleled I-44 on one side or the other for miles.

After traveling through towns of Bourbon(without a sample), Cuba(no passport required), St. James(non-biblical?), and Rolla in Phelps County(without a billboard picture of the Olympic swimmer) in Missouri, we decided that 45 miles covered in one hour was not making suitable progress. So it was back on the interstate once again. However the famous Route 66 signs were frequently seen adjacent to our southwestward highway travels.

Occasionally we would exit the interstate and rejoin the famous highway to locate personal nourishment, selective refreshment, and an automobile requirement.

Once was in El Reno, Oklahoma at "Johnnies" restaurant and another was for a picnic lunch at a city park in Santa Rosa, New Mexico. Occasionally an ice cream necessity was planned or spontaneously accepted. The automobile had its own desire for attention. However it remained silent at the end of one day after my wife finished driving. The gas gauge waited to shout at me the next morning right after entering a desolate section of the interstate west of Gallup, New Mexico.

Luckily we found a Love's Service Plaza soon. My wife still has not apologized for leading me into the wilderness without a full tank of gasoline!

We would regularly see a few other vehicles using the historic byway as we sped onward on the newer, high-speed, four lane highway. Sometimes Route 66 was not paved but just a narrow, gravel road. At times it joined I-44 or I-40 for a while. Other times it was nonexistent.

Near Grants, New Mexico the Old Road traversed through an area called, Malpais, which is Spanish for "Badlands." The large region is composed of black basalt rock from a volcano that created the Carrizozo lava flow which occurred 3,000 years ago. The eruption originated from a once, in-land sea.

Also in New Mexico, long-stretches of railroad tracks paralleled the Old Road. Looking south across a slightly lower, five miles-wide valley, twin rail tracks carried train after train traveling east and west in opposite directions. A single passenger train was mixed in with the multiple freight entourages. One of the latter had many sidecars identified with Hyundai lettering. These obviously were heading to eastern markets.

At the Painted Desert in Arizona, an unexpected sign, present within the national park, indicated a west bound entrance onto Route 66. However, the nonexistent road area was blocked by a concrete barrier and an old,

rusting, vertically-planted automobile. History is vanishing but pieces still exist.

As a footnote to this journey, sometimes unusual road signage appeared. Two such signs caught our attention. In Missouri a sign warned, "Hitch Hikers May Be Escaped Convicts." Then in New Mexico a sign seemed to be recruiting someone for illegal activity when it read, "Wanted, Bank Robber!"

### ARE COLLEGE CAMPUS TOURS PART OF YOUR SUMMER VACATION?

Do your summer plans include one or more visits to campuses of schools being considered by that teen in your family? Such tours can be very positive and helpful experiences, if done right.

The best approach is to do some planning before any college visit. Try to evaluate whether the schools under consideration are really good options for your student.

Does a school offer the programs that meet your student's interests? Is it large enough, or small enough, to feel right for your student? Is it affordable for the family, and does your student have a realistic chance of being accepted based on high school performance?

For the schools that appear to meet your criteria, start with a visit to each school's website. You can find out about costs, academic programs, class sizes, enrollment and much more.

These websites also provide information about on-campus visits. Most schools require pre-registration for on-campus tours, while some offer opportunities to sit in on a class, or even to stay on campus overnight.

Campus tours, almost always led by an upper-classman in love with the school, can provide a lot of information, but it's important to remember that this is someone who has been paid and trained to make the school sound wonderful.

Beyond the formal tour, take time to visit the student union, campus coffee shop or dining hall to talk to current students. Prepare some questions ahead of time about the student's experiences or about special programs of interest. It's also a good idea to talk with staff or faculty in the area of study being considered. Check out the counseling services for personal growth that a school may offer its students, and sitting in on a class, if possible, is always a good learning experience.

Trying to visit too many schools can be frustrating and confusing for your teen and you. Often just visiting a few schools, taking notes and pictures about the good and bad seen, is often more productive. And linking a campus visit to planned family vacation travel can make the whole experience very positive.

Today you can also take virtual college tours online, especially helpful for schools too far away for an in-person visit.

Choosing the right schools can be a stressful decision for any family. But when doing some real investigating online

and on-campus can help provide lots of answers and reduce that stress.
