Elwood is a mild-mannered, pleasant man who always has a kind word for everyone. His social-climbing sister and unmarried niece find him an embarrassment as he circulates among their society friends introducing Harvey. When they decide to have Elwood committed to a sanitarium, comic mayhem ensues.

Mary Chase's Pulitzer prize-winning play was the basis for a 1950's movie of the same name which starred Jimmy Stewart as Elwood. There have been many television and movie adaptations over the years, starring actors such as Harry Anderson and Art Carney as Elwood. In 2009 it was announced that Steven Spielberg was considering a remake of this comic masterpiece.

AREA NEWS

KBC ANALYZED

The Knight-Bergman Center has just completed a facility analysis through design Collaborative, Inc of Fort Wayne. An electrical engineer, a mechanical engineer and an architect carefully went over the entire building with a fine tooth comb. They gave the committee of the Knight-Bergman Center Board, responsible for this study, a very thorough report on the assets and deficiencies of the center.

Some of the items in their summary include the history of the Center. They mention it being a state-of-the-art building when built in 1925. This building has served this community very well. First, as a K-12 school building for 41 years, and then as an elementary school for the next 16 years.

After 1982 it was converted to what is now the Knight-Bergman Center to be available for use by the community, with thanks to the generosity of Clifford Knight and later George and Garnet Bergman. With the exception of one and one-half years in the early nineties, when it was used by Southern Wells as an elementary school, it has served as a very important facility as a hub of the community.

The Design Collaborators state the building is well-built and structurally sound, but age is creating several issues that need

to be addressed. Some of the challenges are with the electrical system. While the present system does not pose a life safety threat, it is badly in need of being updated. They determined that a great amount of the electrical system is probably original with the building.

New restrooms are needed – to save on water usage and to make the facilities handicap accessible. Other issues include roofing upgrades, code upgrades in others areas and much, much more.

Design Collaborative estimated the cost to replace the facility would be in the range of seven to nine million dollars. They estimated the cost of needed updating of the entire scope of their study to be in the 2.5 million range. The comprehensive scope of the recommended improvements will require significant community investment to achieve this goal.

Careful planning and future renovation will stabilize the building for many years. This should make the building suitable for a greater range of uses that support the citizens of Warren and the surrounding areas. The investment is well worth the effort.

There is a very costly price tag on all of this updating. The committee is hoping to be able to receive grants to help get started on these projects. If there is anyone with grant writing skills, or with pockets of money, the committee would greatly appreciate your input and assistance.

The Knight-Bergman Center is a tremendous asset to this area.

The Center Board is attempting to do all it can to update and preserve the facility for use by many generations to come.


Time to warm up your vocal chords. It's almost time for the Pulse Opera House auditions for the summer musical Fiddler on the Roof.

on nearby roofs. The shingles of the building across from the bank was soon ablaze. Fortunately, there were enough sober men to form a bucket brigade to put the fire out. The pine boards, in the log, weren't the only thing saturated that night.





In recognition of Arbor Day, people in all 50 states will plant trees on a specific day for the 139th consecutive year.

Then-president Theodore Roosevelt once said, "A people without children would face a hopeless future; a country without trees is almost as hopeless." With the world population's ever-growing demand for wood and fiber, the need for trees nearly 103 years later has only increased.

Originally conceived by J. Sterling Morton in 1872, the Arbor Day concept is intended to make people aware of the many benefits received from trees. Morton eventually served as President Grover Cleveland's secretary of agriculture.

Different places choose to celebrate on different days. This annual event is also observed in many European countries.

Indiana's Arbor Day is now celebrated on the last Friday of April but that was not always so. The first Arbor Day in Indiana was observed on April 11, 1884. The date of Arbor Day changed for several years at the discretion of the governor, until the current system was established in 1991 to correspond with the official date of National Arbor Day.

EXPANDED HOURS

Andy Miller, Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV), announced that BMV license branches will extend hours of operation on Monday, May 3 and on Tuesday, May 4 to issue state ID cards and driver's licenses that may be used for identification at a polling place.

Full service license branches, normally closed on Mondays and Election Days, will be open on Monday, May 3, from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Branches will be open on Tuesday, May 4, from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

To ensure voters have immediate access to services,

license branches will only process ID cards and driver's licenses and will not perform any other BMV services. Written test and driver tests will not be available.

The Indiana BMV provides free, state-issued ID cards for voting purposes to any unlicensed Hoosier, as long as he or she can provide proper documentation and is old enough to vote. The following documents are required to obtain a new state ID card or driver's license (a complete list can be found at www.mybmv.IN.gov.)

- Proof of Identity document, such as a birth certificate or passport.

- Proof of Social Security document, such as a Social Security card, pay stub or W-2.

- Proof of lawful status, such as a birth certificate or passport.

- Proof of residency, two documents such as a voter registration card, utility bill or bank statement.

Miller added, "The BMV has worked with the state Election Board to provide information to local election officials about the new interim driver's license and ID card documents issued by the BMV. We have also established a special Voter ID phone line on Election Day for election officials needing more information."

All license branches will resume regular business hours on Wednesday, May 5.



FOOD DRIVE

On the second Saturday in May – May 8, 2010 – letter carriers in more than 10,000 cities and towns across America will deliver much more than mail when they walk and drive along their postal routes. They also will collect the goodness and compassion of their postal customers participating in the 18th Annual National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC) National Food Drive – the largest one-day food drive in the world.

The Warren postal employees and other letter carriers all across Indiana will collect non-perishable food donations left by mailboxes and deliver them to local community food banks, pantries and shelters. Nearly 1,500 local NALC branches in all 50 states and the District of Columbia are involved in the drive. Timing of the drive is especially important as food bank donations tend to diminish after the winter holidays.

The success of this food drive is in its simplicity. All citizens need to do is to place a box or can of non-perishable food next to their mailbox before their letter carrier delivers mail on Saturday, May 8. (Please do not include items that have expired or those in glass containers.) The carrier will do the rest. The food is taken back to a postal station, sorted and then delivered to an area food bank or pantry. There, it is made available for needy families.

Donations by postal customers will be delivered to community food banks and pantries that serve the area where the donations are collected.
