

BAYVIEW MEMORIES

For many years this newspaper has reported the monthly activities and programs of the Bayview Reading Club of Warren. These reports have been read and appreciated by literally generations of women, and possibly a few men, too!

At the closing of the Club in 2008, a final article was printed in the paper. A collection of materials about the Club - its members, programs and celebrations, representing its history from 1921 through 2008 - was researched and organized by the last Secretary-Treasurer Margaret Bell, with a committee of two members, Rosalie Walter and Martha Rumple. These materials have been placed in the Warren Public Library, where they may be read and enjoyed by the public. There are minutes of meetings, alphabetical listings of members, and records of special events in the long history from 1921 forward.

Unfortunately, for whatever reason, no records or writings dating back to the date of origin of the Bayview Reading Club in Warren - 1897 - are available, but the materials from 1921 are very interesting. They represent the efforts of many women, who found their lives enriched by reading and sharing both knowledge and friendship in a world increasingly open to women's talents and capabilities beyond the kitchen and nursery!

The Warren Public Library must be thanked for its offering of a safe place for both the storage and availability of the Bayview Reading Club's community contribution. The Library, the development of which was strongly supported in 1916 by the Bayview Reading Club, will assist anyone wishing to review this historical collection.





LAUNCH INSTITUTE

Huntington University will launch a new initiative this summer designed to prepare educators for the Teaching of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). Curriculum development, staffing, and the acquisition of equipment and library resources will begin this

The Institute for TESOL Studies and related academic courses are an outgrowth of long-term relationships between Huntington University faculty and educators in China. Dr. Luke Fetters, who formerly worked 11 years in Macau, is under contract to provide teacher training in Zhuhai City, China. By the end of this summer, Fetters and his team of Huntington faculty, local teachers and volunteers will have trained nearly 400 Chinese educators in English-teaching skills.

The university's new Institute for TESOL Studies will build upon this foundation and extend new learning opportunities to HU students. Fetters will serve as the director of the institute.

"We anticipate tremendous benefits for Huntington University students, especially those planning careers in education or other professional service in an intercultural setting," said Fetters. "Future teachers will be better prepared to teach students for whom English is not their first language. Ministry students, social workers and others also may have interest in TESOL training as they prepare to serve various non-English-speaking populations."

Dr. Terrell Peace, chair of HU's Department of Education, agrees. "There is growing demand for teachers and other professionals who have the ability to bridge cultural and language barriers," he said. "In our local school corporation, for example, the number of students for whom English is a second language has increased tenfold in the past eight years."

Pending state approval, the Institute for TESOL Studies will offer English as a New Language (ENL) certification for HU education students and area teachers. Huntington University also will offer a TESOL minor to HU students pursuing a degree in any discipline. Additional formal training and informal consulting ENL and TESOL methodologies will be available to local, regional and international schools, agencies and social service organizations.





DIGITAL TELEVISION TRANSITION NOTICE

The nationwide switch to digital television broadcasting will be complete on June 12, 2009, but your local television stations may switch sooner. After the switch, analogonly television sets that receive TV programming through an antenna will need a converter box to continue to receive overthe-air TV. Watch your local stations to find out when they will turn off their analog signal and switch to digital-only broadcasting. Analog-only TVs should

continue to work as before to receive low power, Class A or translator television stations and with cable and satellite TV services, gaming consoles, VCRs, DVD players, and similar products.
