DISASTER TRAINING

The Huntington County Chapter of the American Red Cross recently held a disaster training exercise in the parking lot of the Courthouse Annex. Members of the American Red Cross Disaster Action Team (DAT) held this mock in an effort to raise awareness of the services offered by the American Red Cross.

At this disaster exercise, Disaster Action Team members pretended a disaster had occurred and the clients we fed were the American Red Cross Board of Directors. This exercise was excellent practice for the Disaster Action Team members and it was a good experience for the Board of Directors to see how things could work in a large disaster.

In an effort to better serve victims of disasters, the Huntington American Red Cross is raising funds for a disaster trailer and supplies. The trailer and supplies would be set up at the scene of a large disaster and would house everything needed to begin a disaster response. Items in the trailer could include: generator, cots, blankets, family service forms (forms for direct assistance to client), mass care forms (for bulk distribution, feeding from fixed sites and mobile sites), worker ID, eating utensils and other small items. With the Huntington Chapter increasing service capabilities, we are in need of additional companies and organizations to assist in supporting this endeavor. HOW TO KEEP THOSE INSECTS AT BAY

The bugs of summertime can do some very nasty things like, bite, sting, and make you sick. Here's how to put bugs in their place.

First, all bugs dislike DEET, so look for products that are up to 30 percent DEET for adults and 10 percent for kids. It's a chemical in sprays like OFF!. Put it on your clothes and your skin before going outside, and wash it off when you come back in. Put the clothes into the washing machine. Watch for these dangerous symptoms which can develop immediately or within weeks of a bite:

Ticks. If you develop a rash, fever, fatigue, aches, headaches, joint pain or any mysterious symptom within a month of any bite, see your doctor. These could be signs of tick-borne infections such as Lyme disease or Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

- . Fire Ants. If you get hives, wheezing, or throat swelling, see a doctor immediately for treatment of an allergic reaction.
- Bees and yellow jackets. The honey bee can sting only once, but the yellow jacket, a kind of wasp, can sting you many times.

If there are any symptoms of an allergy attack, get to the ER and do it

Mosquitoes. The mosquito is the No.1 insect carrier of disease worldwide, according to Jerome Goddard, author of the Physician's Guide to Arthropods of Medical Importance. Fortunately diseases such as malaria and dengue fever are rare in the U.S. But the West Nile virus sickened many Americans last year, and is likely to spread further.

Mosquitoes carry this virus and those for various types of encephalitis. Symptoms all include high fever, bad headache at the base of the skull and neck, stiff neck and possibly vomiting and muscle weakness.

TREATING A BITE OR STING

If you are bitten or stung by any insect including a mosquito, bee, or fire ant, wash the area of skin with soap and water to get rid of bacteria and any trace of venom.

Pain-numbing salves such as Sting Eze and After Bite can help. If it really hurts, take aspirin or ibuprofen. A single pill of antihistamine can minimize itchiness, say allergists at the University of Mississippi Medical

Some picnickers set a plate of food scraps and a cup of soda away from the table for yellow jackets to feast on. They like meat and sweet drinks. Whether it's a bee or a yellow jacket, it's important to remove the stinger as soon as possible. Either scrape it out or pull it out. Either method is OK say wasp experts at the University of California in Riverside.

IMPAIRED DRIVERS

Huntington, IN - With more people expected to be on the highways during this long 4th of July holiday, this could be one of the deadliest periods ever for impaired driving fatalities.

Between June 27 and July 13. Huntington Police Department will be out in Huntington targeting impaired drivers. During this enforcement period, Indiana law enforcement departments will intensify the fight against impaired driving and remind motorists sobriety checkpoints are on Hoosier roadways. Indiana's enforcement period supports the national "You Drink & Drive. You Lose." crackdown.

"Impaired driving is no accident-It's a crime that kills too many people," said John Kreiger. "Many people still don't understand it's a crime to mix alcohol and driving. Drunk drivers are a threat to everyone's safety. There will be no warnings issued. Our message is a simple one - You Drink and Drive. You Lose."

Recent impaired driving statistics released by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration show an alarming trend. Nationally impaired driving related deaths have significantly increased from 15,786 in 1999 to 17,970 in 2002.

Hoosiers should always remember their best defense in a crash involving an impaired driver is to be wearing their seat belt. Wearing a seat belt reduces the chance of death or injury by nearly 50 percent. Don't forget - wearing your seat belt is also the law.

The Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving, a division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute, supports efforts of Indiana Law enforcement departments to further reduce alcohol-related crashes and fatalities in Indiana. DUI Taskforce Indiana participants will conduct multi-jurisdictional sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols in areas where alcohol related crashes are frequent in an effort to help deter drunk driving. There are currently nearly 200 Law enforcement agencies and Indiana State Police participating in DUI Taskforce Indiana during this cam-

JULY 1 DEADLINE

Wells County 4-H members are busy finishing their project manuals and records (what can be completed) so that they can be checked (reviewed) by their 4-H Club Leader on or before July 1.

The new rule is part of an effort by the Wells County 4-H Council to encourage members to complete



their manual and records.

Once a member has their manual and record checked, the 4-H Club Leader will issue them a signed certificate stating they have completed the required activities. This certificate will be shown upon check in at the 4-H Fair Expo Hall (nonlivestock projects) and at the 4-H Park West Road (livestock projects) before the health certificate check.

Dog and cat exhibits will be checked at your June workshop or club meeting.

Members who do not have a signed certificate from their leader will not be able to check their 4-H projects in at the 4-H Fair.

Mini 4-H member rules remain the same. They simply complete their project exhibit and bring it to the 4-H Fair.

Livestock members should complete as much of the feed record sheet as they can. Once the 4-H auction is finished you will be able to finish your record.

The Wells County 4-H Council along with the 4-H Association and 4-H Leaders all endorse the new rule which helps encourage youth to complete their entire project.

POULTRY BLOOD TESTING

Wells County 4-H members are reminded of the health requirements for poultry which includes proof (certificate) that the bird originated from a National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) approved flock or a negative blood test for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days of the Fair.

Members should plan to bring their birds to the blood testing, Monday, June 30, 6:30 - 8:30 PM at the 4-H Park Cookhouse Patio. To arrange a special time, contact the blood tester, Nadine Rudy at 824-1803.

Only birds not from a NPIP flock need to be tested. Waterfowl, turkeys, and quail do not need to be tested.

Local veterinarians can also do

the blood testing.

Salmonella pullorum and gallinarum (pullorum and typhoid) are bacterial diseases that can produce heavy losses in chickens, turkeys, and sometimes other poultry. Losses are greatest in very young birds, but can be seen at almost any age.

Survivors of these infections remain carriers for life and can become sources of infections for other birds. As breeders, they produce hatching eggs that contain these bacteria. As a result, chicks are hatched with the infection and frequently die.

These diseases can be prevented by purchasing stock from hatcheries and breeder sources listed as participants of the NPIP.


Consumer Clothing participants should drop off their notebooks by Monday, June 30th by 4:30 PM so that the judge can read the books before the judging event.

PROPERTY TAX DEADLINE

Huntington County will only have one yearly tax bill due November 10th, 2003. A recent meeting held between Don Schoeff, Auditor, Terri Boone, County Assessor, Joan Stoffel, Township Assessor, John Miller, Computer Manager and Cindy Yeiter, County Treasurer determined that the timeline previously set has not been met. Therefore, it is necessary to go to one tax deadline with two installments due at the same time. We hope to have the bills out early Fall to give taxpayers ample time for meeting the payment deadline.

The tax bill will serve as your notification of assessment and you will still have 45 days to appeal your assessment at the County Assessor' Office (Room 102) or Huntington Township Assessor (Room 206). Even though you appeal the assessment you must still pay the tax bill, then thru the appeal process: if a refund is determined the result, that would be issued at the Auditor's Office.


This extension of deadline can be a financial hardship on everyone. The Treasurer's Office will accept Advance Tax Payments and give receipts of payment. That means you can pay whatever amount you would like, then once taxes are

calculated we run a process to apply those advance payments to the individual tax bills. The total of all payments shows on the tax bill as a payment, therefore reducing the amount owed. You must come in or send your payment to the Treasurer's Office; banks cannot take your payment since there is no

For those who do not make an Advance Payment, there is not a penalty, however, you will have 2 (two) installments due on Nov. 10, 2003. If you miss the November 10th deadline, 10% penalty applies to any installment balances left delinquent.



Your wife has Alzheimer's disease and cannot be left alone, but you need to visit your elderly mother in Muncie for the day. No one is available to help. What do you do?

Your husband has been diagnosed with Parkinson's disease and you want to learn everything you can as quickly as you can. Where do you go?

In each case, the staff of the Family Caregiver Program, administered by Aging and In-Home Services of Northeast Indiana Inc., stands ready to lend a hand to caregivers in Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells and Whitley Coun-

Funded primarily by the federal government, the Family Caregiver Program was established on a nationwide basis by the Older Americans Act Amendments of 2000 to give family caregivers access to the resources and services that make their jobs a little easier. It is, essentially, a clearinghouse that connects people caring for family members older than 60 with information and community assistance, like peer support, adult day care, and home health assistance.

The program also offers a respite care fund to provide temporary relief for family caregivers who must take a break to tend to their own medical needs or family issues. Finally, it offers supplemental services, on a limited basis, to complement the care provided by caregivers. A supplemental service might be legal assistance in drawing up essential documents, setting up family counseling, purchasing a shower chair, or paying for an emergency response system.

The Family Caregiver legislation was enacted largely as a result of the Census of 2000, which showed just how rapidly the American population is aging and what its needs are. Family caregivers, tradition-

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ally, have been the mainstay in long-term care for older Americans. Research indicates that only 5 percent of non-institutionalized people needing assistance rely exclusively on paid services. The rest depend on family and friends to some de-

The experts on services for the elderly with the Family Caregiver Program are in tune with the needs of family caregivers. Whether the need is big or small, they can provide a wealth of assistance and support to make life just a little easier for family caregivers in northeastern Indiana.



RAQ WAR MAKES BLOGGERS INTO STARS

If the Internet made everyone a publisher, blogging Web sites have made everyone columnists and the Iraq war has made them stars.

A blog (short for Web log) is a type of Web site on which the owner (the blogger) writes thoughts or reports on topics of interest, usually daily. Sites like blogger.com and blogspot.com have taken the technology out of commentary and, today, everyone with a daily opinion can post it on their own Web site in a few seconds

As you might expect, blogs can be silly and insipid but certain bloggers are also becoming respected, even famous for their instant opinions and reporting.

Nowhere has this been most obvious as during the Iraq war.

Before the lights went out in Iraq, a young, anonymous blogger, an architect, was making worldwide headlines reporting from Bagdad. The dear raed.blogspot.com site is still online, but there were no new posts since March 24 when electricity and internet service began to

Certain war blogs have earned reputations for their thorough international war news digests. These include agonist.org and commandpost.org. Other bloggers have even raised issues of blog ethics after one was discovered to have presented materials as new that were rewritten from military magazines.

Famed media pundit Andrew Sullivan recently announced his blog, one of the first, has made a few dollars, but most bloggers work alone and for free, something that is quickly obvious since their materials are rarely edited or fact checked.

WARREN'S RADIOS IN WWII

With the advent of TV, war coverage has become more immediate and sometimes personal. With its start in the Vietnam War coverage, television now brings us live, real time coverage of hostilities as shown during the Iraq War. But during WII, we got our coverage by listening to our radios. We saw the war only in the Newsreels in the theater, the newspapers, or magazines. Our grandchildren have difficulty understanding a world without TV-but that's progress.

I remember we had only one radio, and it was on most of the time. I'm told that some of the farm families didn't get electricity until 1943 (due to a shortage of copper wiring), so they had limited listening time on their battery-powered sets.

And what did we listen to? We got the local news, weather, and farm prices from the Ft. Wayne and Marion stations. With good weather, we could pick up Indianapolis, Cincinatti, and even Chicago (remember WLS and the Morris B. Saks Amateur Hour?). As now, each station had its hourly news broadcast on the war. But it interrupted its regular programming for important events.

For our Senior Citizens, do you recall where you were, and what you were doing, when Pearl Harbor was announced? Or when D-Day was announced? And do you remember the day they dropped the first Atomic Bomb? Like a younger generation, we also had a President die in office-do you remember where you were and what you were doing when you heard that the President was dead?

Besides the news, we used our radios for entertainment. I searched my memory for some of the radio programs that we listened to during those four years. Below is a list of those that I can recall-some of you will remember them, and probably add many to my list.

The Bob Hope Pepsodent Show ("you'll wonder where the yellow went when you brush your teeth with Pepsodent") was just as much a classic as it was fifty years later. Remember Jerry Calona as his side-kick. Francis Langford as his singer, and his shows with guest Bing Crosby? The Fibber McGee and Molly Show with Fibber's messy closet and the Great Gildersleeve's laugh was another classic comedy show that will be long remembered.

The Whistler, was an evening mystery show, and was opened with this man whistling—real scary to the youngsters. Also in the evening were Inner Sanctum, Suspense, The Adventures of Ellery Queen, and I Love a Mystery. All were well-written mystery shows whose use of sound-effects (like the squeaky door in Inner Sanctum) often kept us on the edge of our seats

* And for the young people, there were shows like Jack Winslow of the Navy, the Adventures of Superman, Captain Midnight, Jack Armstrong, and of course The Lone Ranger and Tonto. I also remember the Green Hornet with his sidekick, Cato, and the carthat sounded like a hornet! And what young person of those days doesn't remember Sergeant Preston of The Yukon, with his lead dog King — (on, you huskies!!). I do recall often hurrying home from school so I wouldn't miss a single episode of a continuing story.

* With all of the game shows that now are on TV, one has to reach back to recall the game shows of the early 40's. One that I listened to was called The Quiz Kids. I believe they got groups of young people to compete against each other by answering questions. Also, there were Information Please and You Bet Your Life where contestants were asked questions for prizes.

* The younger reader should not assume that there wasn't

any culture on radio in those days. We had shows like First Nighter. The Silver Theater, The Lux Radio Theater, The Screen Guild Theater, and The Johnson Wax Program. Death Valley Days, was hosted by Death Valley Scotty and sponsored by 40-Mule Team Borax. And I remember my mother and grandmother not missing a single episode of One Man's Family. I think it ran as long as some of our present-day "soaps"! I believe that many of the adults followed these evening shows much as we younger people followed our radio heroes.

* I mentioned the Bob Hope Show above, because he was a master of comedy. But we had others to listen to, such as The Jack Benny Show and Jack's old car, fiddle playing, and his home vault where he kept his money. I believe that Dennis Day was also on the program. The Red Skelton Show was on once a week—and he was just as funny as he was forty years later. It's just that we couldn't see his use of facial gestures and movements like we could when he was on TV. Other comedy shows that were on included The Jimmy Durante Show (with his singing!), Lum and Abner, The Eddie Cantor Show, The Fred Allen Show (with Gracie), and The Great Gildersleeve (after he graduated from Fibber McGee's show.)

Our music came to us through shows such as Paul Whiteman Presents, The Nelson Eddy Show, The Lucky Strike Program (remember "Lucky Strike Green Has Gone To War"?), and Kaye Keyser and his College of Musical Knowledge.

I'm sure there are many favorites that I have not listed, but these came to mind as I was recalling those days. Radio was an integral part of our everyday life. It brought us both good news and sad news. It brought us our weather and our entertainment. It became our outlet to the world and our everyday companion as we followed our favorite serials. And we didn't have to set in front of the "Tube" to enjoy it!

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TANTH TIPS

By: Dr. Kevin J Deakyne DDS, PC Q. WHAT IS ORAL CANCER? A. This potentially deadly disease affects more than 30,000 Ameri-

cans and claims more than 9,000 lives each year. That is more deaths than skin cancer! Where, why and how does a person get oral cancer?

Oral cancer occurs most often in people who smoke or use chewing tobacco. Also, consumers of large amounts of alcohol are more susceptible. However, people with many different backgrounds and lifestyles are potentially a victim of this disease.

Areas of the mouth most affected are the tongue, cheek and floor of the mouth, but oral lesions can occur anywhere in the mouth.

The key is early detection. When diagnosed in later stages, radical facial surgeries with disfiguring results are very common. Only half of such patients survive more than five years.

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
