

The Indiana Department of Health announced today that Hoosiers age 60 and older are now eligible to receive a free COVID-19 vaccine. expansion of eligibility makes the vaccine available to an additional 432,000

Due to limited vaccine supplies nationally, Indiana has prioritized healthcare workers, first responders and those who are vulnerable in its vaccine rollout. Individuals age 60 and older account for more than 22 percent of the state's population but 64 percent of COVID-19 hospitalizations and 93.3 percent of the deaths.

Additional groups will be added as more vaccine becomes available.

Vaccine appointments for newly eligible population will be available over the next four to six weeks to align with the state receiving its expected weekly vaccine allocation. 


