



## GRANT TO HTGN COUNTY RESCUE

Huntington County Rescue is getting closer to its goal of purchasing a new state-of-the-art rescue truck with a grant award in the amount of \$25,000 from Parkview Huntington Hospital's Community Health Improvement Program. The 2005 grant award follows a 2004 grant of \$50,000 to Huntington County Rescue from Parkview Huntington.

The grant was presented to Sgt. Tom Tallman of the Huntington County Sheriff's Department on Wednesday, Feb. 8, during a luncheon meeting of the Huntington County Safety Council at Huntington University's Habecker Dining Commons.

The total cost of the rescue vehicle amounts to \$285,000, of which \$172,000 has been raised. The Huntington County Commissioners have earmarked \$25,000 a year over three years to help with purchase of the truck.

"We expect that by acquiring a new rescue truck we will be able to respond to emergency calls more quickly," said Tallman, "and, we will be able to carry on board all of our rescue equipment, which we are presently not able to do."

"The bottom line is that this vehicle is really needed by the community," added Tallman. Members of Huntington County Rescue, who participate in extensive training, rescue services and certification education, are all volunteers. There are currently 15 volunteer members of Huntington County Rescue. The volunteers are equipped with tools that allow them to rescue victims from entrapment in auto-accidents, farm-related incidents and industrial accidents, to name a few. HCR volunteers also train with Parkview Huntington Hospital EMS personnel in various emergency-response scenarios, including medical emergencies.

"It is our privilege to join with businesses and individuals in Huntington County who financially support this worthwhile program," said Darlene Garret, Parkview Huntington Hospital COO. "The community is fortunate to have this emergency service, which has been uniquely instrumental in saving lives. We hope the grant will help to ensure that Huntington County Rescue will continue to maintain its valuable presence in the county."

Greg Schnepf, Parkview Huntington Community Health Improvement Committee member, said, "Parkview Huntington Hospital's Community Health Improvement Program is pleased to be able to partner with the Huntington County Sheriff's Department to assist in purchasing a new rescue unit. This strong partnership will allow the Huntington County Rescue Unit to better meet the needs of this area in saving lives and expanding its free service throughout our area. This service, which was created 34 years ago, has been a life-saving force in our communities, and clearly falls within the mission of Parkview Huntington Hospital of providing quality health services to Huntington County."

The Huntington County Rescue program is operated under the direction of the Huntington County Sheriff's Department. Unlike most rescue squads, which operate through fire departments, the Huntington County Sheriff's Department is the only sheriff's department in the state of Indiana that operates such a unit.

## RESERVED TURKEY HUNT

The DNR's reserved turkey hunt drawing will be held in Indianapolis on March 20. Public drawings will not be held at the individual DNR properties, as printed in the 2005-2006 Indiana Hunting and Trapping Guide.

"Last fall, the DNR decided to allow hunters the convenience of applying for reserved hunts through the DNR's Website as well as by mail." said DNR wildlife biologist Mark Reiter. "The

hunting guide was published before we centralized and improved the application methods."

The DNR offers reserved turkey hunting dates at 16 DNR proper-

hunting dates at 16 DNR properties, one military property and two national wildlife refuge areas during the 2006 spring turkey season. Selected DNR property hunters cannot bring a reserved-hunt partner this year.

The 2006 spring turkey season runs April 26 to May 14.

DNR turkey hunt reservations can now be made online at www.wildlife.IN.gov.

Mail-in turkey hunt reservation cards are in the 2005-2006 Indiana Hunting and Trapping Guide, available at most sport license vendors and DNR property offices. The DNR reserved turkey hunt reservation deadline is March 15, 2006. All applicants will be notified of the results by mail.

Jasper-Pulaski, Kingsbury, LaSalle, Pigeon River, Tri-County, Willow Slough, Winamac, Crosley and Splinter Ridge Fish and Wildlife areas and Roush, Mississinewa and Salamonie lakes will conduct five, three-day reserved hunts and two, two-day reserved hunts. Hunting dates for these areas are: -April 26, 27, 28 -April 29, 30 -May 1, 2, 3 -May 4, 5, 6 -May 7, 8, 9 -May 10, 11, 12 -May 13, 14

Atterbury, Glendale, Hovey Lake, Hillenbrand, Fairbanks Landing and Minnehaha Fish and Wildlife areas and Big Oaks National Wildlife Refuge, will hold two, three-day reserved hunts. The hunting dates for these areas are: -April 26, 27, 28 -April 29, 30, May 1

After the reserved hunts, Atterbury, Fairbanks Landing, Glendale, Hovey Lake, Hillenbrand and Minnehaha Fish and Wildlife areas will be open for turkey hunting from May 2 to the

end of the season, May 14.

A daily drawing may be held each morning at the property, if necessary, to allocate hunting locations. A hunter must obtain a daily hunting permit at the property's check station to legally hunt on these fish and wildlife areas.

Kankakee and Sugar Ridge Fish and Wildlife areas and several reservoirs will offer self-service check-in hunting for the entire spring wild turkey season, April 26 to May 14, 2006.

Atterbury Fish and Wildlife Area conducts five, two-day hunts at Atterbury Military Maneuver and Training Center. Atterbury Military Maneuver and Training Center reserved hunts take place on the following dates: -April 26, 27 -May 1, 2 -May 3, 4 -May 8, 9 -May 10, 11

Hunter Education certification is required to hunt at Atterbury MMTC.

Muscatatuck National Wildlife Refuge will be open to special permit turkey hunting for 13 days during the 2006 regular spring turkey season. Ten permits per day will be issued for the refuge hunting area. Hunting will be permitted on weekdays from 1/2 hour before sunrise to 12 noon. Successful hunters are required to check their turkeys at the refuge office. Hunters selected in the random drawing will be randomly assigned only one day. There is no choice of hunting dates.

Only selected individuals will be permitted to hunt on most properties. Selected hunters will not be allowed to bring a partner. However, hunters drawn to hunt Big Oaks National Wildlife Refuge will still be required to bring a partner to hunt.

Selected hunters must be checked in at the property check station by 4:30 a.m. each morning of their hunt. Hunting spots

that are not claimed by 4:30 a.m. will be filled with stand-by hunters. Roush Lake, Fairbanks Landing, Hillenbrand, Splinter Ridge Fish and Wildlife areas, Mississinewa and Salamonie reservoirs will not conduct noshow drawings.

Reservation hunts are non-transferable, except when a selected hunterwishes to transfer his/her reservation to a hunter 16 years old or younger and takes that hunter hunting on the reserved days. If the selected hunter harvests a turkey prior to his/her reserved hunt, or on one of his/ her reserved hunt dates, the selected hunter forfeits the remainder of the reserved hunt dates.

# Soup for Whatever Ails

What is it about chicken soup that is so wonderful? This is the stuff that your mother made for you, the stuff that makes a cold go away and grants instantaneous health if we all believed our grandmothers.

There is, believe it or not, some science behind the goodness of chicken soup. Seriously! Researchers at the Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha found this out via the kitchen first, not the laboratory. Here's how it played out: they made up a big batch of chicken soup, gathered up some volunteers, collected the neutrophils from their blood (neutrophils are a type of white blood cell important to the immune system for fighting infection; neutrophils actually seek out germs and kill them) and mixed them together with the chicken soup. No eating allowed; this was science in action.

Guess what? The experiment was a success and they found that the soup does help stop inflammation-even when chicken soup is in a test tube! Grandma was right all along; soup is good for whatever ails you.

Here's a chicken soup recipe that is as good for the soul as it is forwhatever ails you. The liquid is chicken broth and that is the "medicinal" part of this recipe; the veggies and their phytochemical properties will help boost your immune system as well.

BASIC VEGGIE SOUP Serves 12

2 cans diced tomatoes undrained

1 large onion — chopped 4 cloves garlic - pressed 2 T olive oil — divided 2 large carrots — chopped 2 small celery stalks — chopped

1 medium turnip — chopped 2 cups green beans - cut in 1" pieces

6 cups chicken broth 1/4 head cabbage — chopped ½ teaspoon thyme salt and pepper to taste

2 small russet potatoes peeled and chopped

In a large soup pot, heat the one tablespoon of the olive oil over medium high heat. Add the onion and cook till nearly translucent, now add the garlic. Don't let the garlic brown and saute another couple of minutes.

Add the rest of the chopped veggies, sauteing for just a minute or two. You're not cooking them just sauteing for the wonderful flavorthis quick step will infuse in your soup. Add the thyme and salt and pepper while sauteing. Now put the veggies in the crockpot, add the tomatoes and broth. Cook on low 7-9 hours (depending on your crock-pot) or high 4-6 hours (but all crock-pots are different, depending on size, age, brand etc. Remember, your mileage may vary). Just before serving, gently mash some of the potato chunks against the side of the crock-pot to thicken the soup, give it a stir and serve.
