by the Indiana Beef Cattle Association (IBCA) and Purdue University Extension, will take place on January 4th. It will be held at 6:30 p.m. in Columbia City, IN at the Eagle's Nest on 125 S. Glen Trail.

The meeting will feature great food and valuable information on beef issues. IBCA will provide an update on policy and programs. There will also be a presentation titled "How do you know if you are feeding the right mineral?" by Ron Lemenager, Purdue Extension beef specialist.

If you would like to attend the 2011 area beef meeting, please RSVP by calling the Huntington County Extension Office by January 3. Note that the counties in Area XI include Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells and Whitley.

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Lemenager will discuss topics such as ways mineral requirements change with stage of production; ways mineral status of the cow affect subsequent calf health and performance; how to interpret mineral supplement feed tag's guaranteed analysis; how to evaluate the feed tag ingredient list to determine mineral availability; where inorganic versus organic, or chelated mineral forms fit; how to monitor and regulate mineral consumption; when medicated mineral supplements make sense; and which vitamins and how much are needed.

He will present several common feeding scenarios and evaluate which type of mineral supplement best fits each scenario.

"Historically, producers have fed hay to their beef herds. But as they've shifted to using alternative feeds such as cover crops, stockpiled forages, crop residues and grain byproducts, there is a need to re-evaluate our mineral supplementation strategies," Lemenager said. "Beef producers are now feeding things like corn stalks, distillers grains, corn gluten meal, soybean hulls and cover

crops such as rye, turnips and radishes. Each of these has a different mineral profile, so it can be challenging to know which supplements are needed."

Also included in the meetings will be a discussion of changing consumer demands and the growth opportunities for Indiana's beef industry.

"IBCA is excited about taking its programs and issues on the road again this year and hearing from its members and beef producers about their thoughts on the state of the beefindustry,"saidJoeMoore, executive vice IBCA's president. "We know that to be relevant for our business at this point in time, it is very important we hear about the issues and opportunities from our own producers."



The Earned Income Tax Credit or EITC, provides tax credits to working adults and families with low or moderate incomes. Money can be used to pay down debts, buy things families need, or can be saved for the future.

The maximum EITC for 2011 is:

- \$464 for families with NO qualifying children
- \$3,094 for families with 1 qualifying child
  - \$5,112 for families

with 2 qualifying children

• \$5,751 for families with 3 or more qualifying children

Families may qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit if they meet the following guidelines:

- If the family has no children and made under \$13,660 (\$6.56/hr.) in 2011, or if the family has no children and made under \$18,740 (\$9.01/hr.) if married filing jointly.
- If the family has 1 child and made under \$36,052 (\$17.33/hr.) in 2011, or if the family has 1 child and made under \$41,132 (\$19.77/hr.) if married filing jointly.
- If the family has 2 children and made under \$40,964 (\$19.69/hr.) in 2011, or has 2 children and made under \$46,044 (\$22.13/hr.) if

married filing jointly.

• If the family has 3 or more children and made under \$43,998 (\$21.15/hr.) in 2011, or has 3 or more children and made under \$49,078 (\$23.59/hr.) if married filing jointly.





Donors can track the progress of their tree(s) on the program's website. Donors

will be issued a unique Tree ID number that will allow them to track the planting date and location of their tree(s) using GPS coordinates.

The Indiana Tree Project is dedicated not only to planting and expanding Indiana's native forests, but also to supporting the state's largest agricultural industry.

"Hardwood trees are critical to the Indiana economy," said John Seifert, Indiana State Forester and director of the DNR Division of Forestry. Nearly 40,000 Hoosiers are employed in the hardwood forestry industry, and another 92,000 jobs are dependent on it."

I know you can do this! These simple 3 minute breaks are going to bring the joy back to the holidays!






