## Kudos, Kicks & Karats

### REDUCING THE STRESS OF THAT COLLEGE APPLICATION

from the American Counseling Association

Yes, it's college application season, which means lots of stress for many teens and their parents. But taking the time, early in the application process, to consider and address the many questions and issues related to applying to college can help reduce those stress levels.

One important issue to address early is finances. College is expensive and for most families, this requires discussion and planning. You want to sit down with your student and realistically talk about how a college education will be paid for and what schools are affordable.

If there will be college loans, who will be paying them back? Are scholarships a possibility? Might the student consider a work-study program, or getting and on or off-campus job?

Remember to allow for room and food expenses if the college isn't local. Miscellaneous expenses can include that required math calculator and being able to socialize with friends. How often will there be trips home? Will the student need a new laptop or cell phone? Visiting the websites of colleges under consideration will provide a wealth of information on each school's costs and related expenses.

Stress can also be reduced by doing things early. Don't delay that ACT or SAT testing, especially if a retest might be needed. If you haven't already met with your child's high school guidance counselor, it should happen now. He or she can provide advice on college choices that would be appropriate to your student's grades, abilities and interests.

With answers to these questions, sit down with your student and help narrow down the list of possible schools. Now is the time to be

patients, or you may send your bill in to your Insurance Plan for reimbursement. Please bring your current Insurance, Medicaid and Medicare cards. For uninsured patients there is a fund to subsidize them for only an \$8 copay.

Residents of neighboring counties are welcome! You do not need to be a Huntington County resident.

## FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Indiana's fire marshal is encouraging Hoosier families to take fire safety seriously by planning evacuation routes for their homes as part of Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14.

This year's theme, "Every Second Counts: Plan Two Ways Out," reminds Hoosiers that seconds can mean the difference between safety and a tragedy.

"Smoke alarms save lives, but equally important is when Hoosiers are ready to act when those alarms sound," said Indiana State Fire Marshal, Jim Greeson.

Marshal Greeson recommends that Hoosiers sit down with their households and complete the following:

Draw a map of the home, and as a household mark two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.

Practice home fire drills twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with all residents. Practice using different routes to safety.

Teach children how to escape on their own in case help isn't available.

Make sure the number of the home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.

Practice closing doors while evacuating the home. This may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.

Once outside, stay at the established meeting point.

Never go back inside a burning building.

Practicing escape routes can be a good time for households to also verify that their home is free of fire hazards.

"Most fires are preventable," Greeson said. "It's up to all of us to prevent fires where we live, where we work, everywhere."

Greeson suggests looking for the following hazards in a home:

Electric cords that are worn, frayed or covered with clothing, blankets or furniture

Candles that are closer than 12 inches away from anything that can burn, and/or that are in unstable holders that can

accidentally be jostled by adults, children or pets

Coffee makers or similar appliances that are too close to napkins, towels or paper, or that are that are operated under cabinets (the heat generated by a coffee maker can set wooden cabinets on fire)

Built-up dryer lint (clean lint out after every dryer use)

Blocked doors, windows and pathways that can prevent or slow down an escape

Flammable items closer than three feet from fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or portable heaters;

Extension cords permanently in use (they are for temporary use only)

Extension cords connected to heat-producing appliances such as freezers, refrigerators, coffeemakers, microwaves or portable heaters (never use extensions with such appliances)

Also, make sure smoke alarms are installed and working on every level of a home, and inside and outside bedrooms. Every bedroom should have a smoke alarm in it.

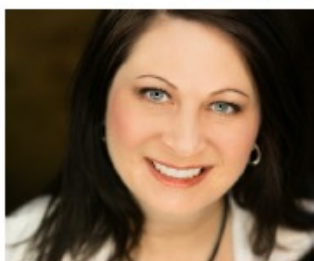
