# Don't Let Tests Overwhelm Your Child

from the American Counseling Association Testing is a fact of life for students from elementary through high school. Whether it's a school system required standardized test, or simply an exam or quiz from the teacher to measure progress and understanding, tests can be a major source of stress and anxiety for many students.

There is no magic cure to remove all the anxiety from testing, but there are strategies to reduce stress levels and to maximize test performance.

A great starting point is being physically prepared. That can help with not only test-taking, but with all aspects of the school day. And all being physically prepared means is that your child should be well-rested and eating healthy foods.

Studies find that the average teen should be getting eight to ten hours of sleep per night, especially on school nights. Those studies, however, find that only about 15% of teens actually get at least 8 hours of sleep on most school nights. 2nd Worship......11:00 a.m. That doesn't make for a well-rested brain when that algebra pop quiz appears in the morning.

Similarly, good nutrition plays a very important role in brain function. Skipping breakfast will always impair brain function. Junk and high-sugar foods almost always guarantee a sugar high that will be followed by a crash during the school day. Drinks high in caffeine, like coffee, soda and energy drinks, Sunday Morning Worship ..... 9:30 a.m. may help a student feel alert but can also make him or her feel jittery and nervous and then concentrating is much more

While getting enough sleep and eating well are important, another critical key to reducing test anxiety is to be prepared. This means staying on top of the subject, keeping up with assigned readings, and being aware of when tests are coming up. By maintaining a more constant understanding of the subject matter your student can avoid having to do lastminute "cramming," which almost always raises anxiety levels and doesn't improve grades much.





Indiana's Fire Marshal encourages Hoosiers to take fire safety seriously by creating a household evacuation plan and resolving potential fire hazards as part of Fire Prevention Week, October 7-

This year's theme, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware - fire anywhere,' happen Hoosiers that reminds following a few simple steps can reduce the chances of a and help everyone evacuate safely.

"In most situations, it doesn't take long to make safety changes in the home, but those quick fixes can have a lasting impact," said Indiana State Fire Marshal Jim Greeson.

Tragically, Indiana is on track for an increase in the number of fire-related deaths over the calendar year. The state has already recorded 67 firerelated deaths to date. In 2017, 70 fire-related deaths occurred.

Marshal Greeson suggests looking for the following

> "Smoke alarms are a vital 124. Great job guys and good component for fire safety," Greeson said. "Households with properly placed, working and maintained smoke alarms are 50 percent more likely to escape a fire safely."

> > Alarms should be replaced every eight to 10 years. Over time their sensors become less sensitive.

Smoke alarms should be tested every month to make sure they are still working.

Alarms should be placed at least 10 feet from a stove, as everyday cooking may be a trigger.

An established escape plan is an essential component of keeping the household safe. They help save time in a situation where seconds count and establish if individuals are in the burning trapped building.

Marshal Greeson recommends that Hoosiers sit down with their households and complete the following:

Practice home fire drills twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with all residents. Practice different routes to safety.

If smoke, heat or flames block all established escape routes, stay in the room and call the fire department.

Once outside, stay at the established meeting point. Never go back inside a burning building.
