DON'T LET TESTS OVERWHELM YOUR CHILD

Testing is a fact of life for students from elementary through high school. Whether it's a school system required standardized test, or simply an exam or quiz from the teacher to measure progress and understanding, tests can be a major source of stress and anxiety for many students.

There is no magic cure to remove all the anxiety from testing, but there are strategies to reduce stress levels and to maximize test performance.

A great starting point is being physically prepared. That can help with not only test-taking, but with all aspects of the school day. And all being physically prepared means is that your child should be well-rested and eating healthy foods.

Studies find that the average teen should be getting eight to ten hours of sleep per night, especially on school nights. Those studies, however, find that only about 15% of teens actually get at least 8 hours of sleep on most school nights. That doesn't make for a well-rested brain when that algebra pop quiz appears in the morning.

Similarly, good nutrition plays a very important role in brain function. Skipping breakfast will always impair brain function. Junk and high-sugar foods almost always guarantee a sugar high that will be followed by a crash during the school day. Drinks high in caffeine, like coffee, soda and energy drinks, may help a student feel alert but can also make him or her feel jittery and nervous and then concentrating is much more difficult.

While getting enough sleep and eating well are important, another critical key to reducing test anxiety is to be prepared. This means staying on top of the subject, keeping up with assigned readings, and being aware of when tests are coming up. By maintaining a more constant understanding of the subject matter your student can avoid having to do last-minute "cramming," which almost always raises anxiety levels and doesn't improve grades much.

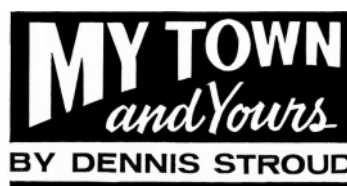
Veteran's Homecoming Celebration on Sunday, November 4th!

In order for the school board to sell the building and property to a group, the group had to be a not-for-profit organization. In July 1982 the committee

became W.A.R.R.E.N., Inc.. By the end of Sept. the community had pledged \$125,000. Then along came Mr. Clifford Knight, owner and chairman of Addison Products Company of Addison, Michigan. They manufactured refrigeration, heating and air conditioning, the maker of Weatherking products. Mr. Knight was a former graduate of Warren High School.

Mr. Knight pledged \$125,000 to match what the community had pledged with \$80,000 of it coming for the first payment. A total of \$250,000 was pledged with a total of \$177,000 in the bank at that time.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK, OCT. 7-13

Indiana's Fire Marshal encourages Hoosiers to take fire safety seriously by creating a household evacuation plan and resolving potential fire hazards as part of Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13.

This year's theme, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware – fire can happen anywhere," reminds Hoosiers that following a few simple steps can reduce the chances of a fire and help everyone evacuate safely.

"In most situations, it doesn't take long to make safety changes in the home, but those quick fixes can have a lasting impact," said Indiana State Fire Marshal Jim Greeson.

Tragically, Indiana is on track for an increase in the number of fire-related deaths over the calendar year. The state has already recorded 67 fire-related deaths to date. In 2017, 70 fire-related deaths occurred.

Marshal Greeson suggests looking for the following hazards in a home:

Replace electric cords that are worn, frayed or covered with clothing, blankets or furniture. Clean dryer lint traps out after every use.

Flammable items should not be closer than three feet from

fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or portable heaters.

When looking for potential fire hazards check on the household's smoke alarms, which provides an early warning sign of a fire.

"Smoke alarms are a vital component for fire safety," Greeson said. "Households with properly placed, working and maintained smoke alarms are 50 percent more likely to escape a fire safely."

Alarms should be replaced every eight to 10 years. Over time their sensors become less sensitive.

Smoke alarms should be tested every month to make sure they are still working.

Alarms should be placed at least 10 feet from a stove, as everyday cooking may be a trigger.

An established escape plan is an essential component of keeping the household safe. They help save time in a situation where seconds count and establish if individuals are trapped in the burning building.

Marshal Greeson recommends that Hoosiers sit down with their households and complete the following:

Practice home fire drills twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with all residents. Practice using different routes to safety.

If smoke, heat or flames block all established escape routes, stay in the room and call the fire department.

Once outside, stay at the established meeting point. Never go back inside a burning building.

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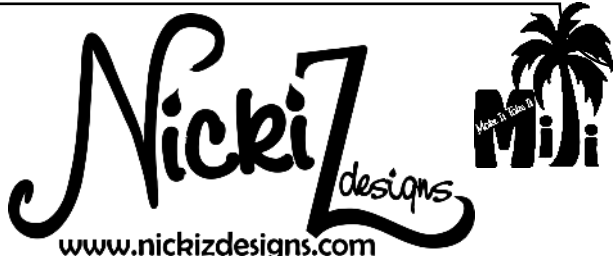

Unused opioids can also pose a risk to kids. Even child-resistant containers cannot completely prevent a child from taking medicines prescribed to someone else. Emergency departments see thousands of patients for opioid overdose and addiction each year, according to the Nationwide Emergency Department Sample. As more opioids are being prescribed to adults, the risk of accidental and intentional exposure increases for children and

adolescents. Grandparents, neighbors and others who take care of children should make sure they have disposed of any unused medicines. Opioids also can be harmful to pets. "In the last two decades, the FDA has received reports of accidental exposure to powerful prescription pain medicines such as fentanyl patches - most of them in children under 2 years old," said FDA Center for Drug Evaluation and Research Director Dr. Janet Woodcock.
