LOCAL BLOOD DRIVES

"Maximize me" could be a new mantra for people giving the gift of life through the American Red Cross.

"It's human nature to want to make the most of things," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "At the American Red Cross, we want to help our blood donors maximize their donation by recommending donation options that best meet hospital and patient needs."

Whole blood donations typically yield three main components: red cells, platelets and plasma. Medical professionals may prescribe transfusions of particular blood components to treat specific patient needs. Patients experiencing chronic blood loss, surgeries, anemia or trauma may need red cells. Cancer patients frequently need platelets. Patients in shock, with serious burns, or with some blood or immune disorders may need plasma.

Blood type can play an important role in meeting patient demand for certain blood products. For instance, most patients can receive red cells from type O donors, while most patients can receive plasma from type AB donors.

"Whole blood is rarely transfused as an individual unit," said Whitman. "Collecting blood components based on blood type can be extremely helpful in meeting hospital demand."

Donors can give whole blood, double red cells, and platelets and plasma through particular donation procedures. Since type O and B red cells are in high

demand, donors with those blood types may be asked to give double red cells. And since demand is high for type A and AB platelets and plasma, type A and AB donors may be asked to give these components.

"Our goal is to find the donation procedure that's the best fit for you and for hospital patients," said Whitman. "The main point to remember is this: whatever your blood type and whatever way you chose to give, someone needs you."

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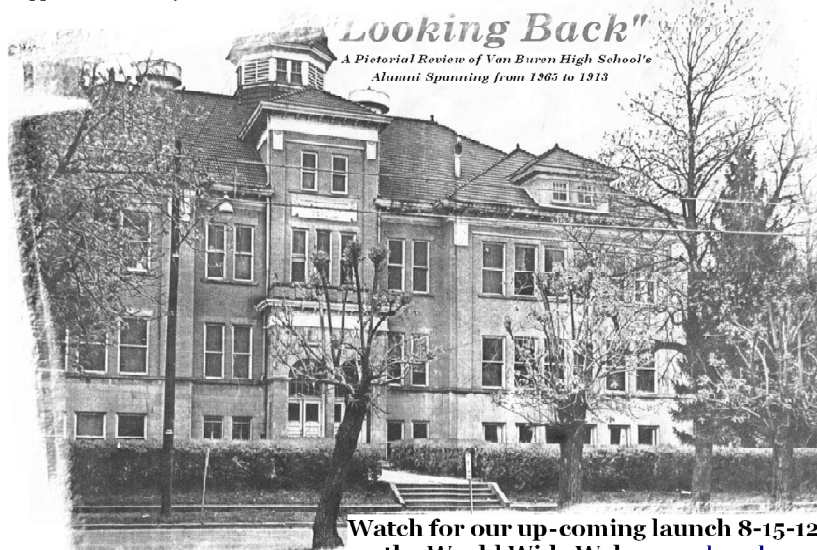

How to Donate Blood

To schedule an appointment to donate please call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or visit redcrossblood.org for more information. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental permission in Indiana and Ohio), meet weight and height requirements (110 pounds or more, depending on their height) and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. Please bring your Red Cross blood donor card or other form of positive ID when you come to donate.

COUNCIL NOTES

The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, July 18. The meeting was held in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Marvin Surber called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.

While a few local citizens had been to meetings concerning clean-up of some local properties, one citizen had attended many meetings complaining about the problem. Council asked Bob Highley, a representative of Area Plan, to attend the meeting on Wednesday evening and explain the situation. He explained that while Council is responsible to issue a notice to the homeowner to clean up the outside of their property, owners must be allowed a certain amount of time to comply. The same law applies when more than one notice is issued. Council is no way responsible to do the cleanup.

The major complaint was that Weaver Popcorn should clean up their building downtown, which is no longer in use. Even though there are many items inside the building in front of windows, Council cannot govern the situation inside.

Linda Long presented more information to Council about a water pad at the local park.

After discussion Council decided to go ahead and meet with the company in the near future to get full information about construction and cost to

operate.

Inmates from the Grant County Jail were to be in Van Buren on Monday and Tuesday to clean the streets for the Popcorn Festival.

In his report, Officer Pat Collins, said he had sent out notices concerning vehicles not in compliance with town code. Many had complied.

Superintendent Rob Reeder reported two water mains had been repaired last week. There had been five residential water leaks reported.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for August 15.

EAR ROT

Corn growers should be on the lookout for ear rot developing in their fields during hot and dry weather. The disease is called Aspergillus ear rot, and it may appear in the coming weeks in corn ears harvested for grain or chopped for silage. This is a different type of ear rot as compared to the ear molds found in 2009 (Diplodia and Gibberella), which were brought on by damp and cool conditions during that growing season.

Aspergillus ear rot is caused by a fungus that produces aflatoxin, a toxic carcinogen for livestock that consume contaminated grain or silage. It normally shows up near the end of the corn growing season as the crop reaches the dent phase. Growers can identify the disease by peeling back the husks and looking for stunted ears with an olive-green dusty mold.

"This year presents a unique challenge for producers since

corn may be cut for silage and many fields have poorly pollinated plants and limited kernel set," said Kiersten Wise, Purdue Extension plant pathologist. "Growers have asked questions about assessing the potential for Aspergillus ear rot and aflatoxin to occur in these fields."

The fungus that causes ear rot needs kernels on an ear to develop. Without ears or kernels, Aspergillus ear rot and aflatoxin won't be a problem.

If ears with kernels are present in a field, Wise said it's important to determine if aflatoxin is present. Both corn silage and grain can be submitted for analysis by a professional laboratory, such as Purdue's Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (<https://www.addl.purdue.edu/>).

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has set thresholds for the amount of aflatoxin tolerated in grain, depending on the end use.

The bad news for both grain and livestock producers is that at this point in the season there is little they can do to manage Aspergillus ear rot or aflatoxin. The best they can do now, according to Wise, is scout prior to harvest and determine if there is a problem and, if so, its severity.

"If any Aspergillus ear rot is observed in a field, affected areas should be harvested early and

grain segregated to avoid aflatoxin contamination of non-infected grain," she said. "Grain harvested with suspected Aspergillus ear rot should be dried to below 15 percent moisture."

Aflatoxin can continue to accumulate in grain or silage with kernels kept above 15 percent moisture.

"All grain contaminated by ear rot fungus should be stored separately from good grain and stored below 13 percent moisture to prevent further growth of fungi," Wise said.

WATERFOWL WORKSHOP

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources is offering three free waterfowl hunting workshops, two this month and one in October.

All are on Saturdays. The first will be at Farmland Conservation Club (Winchester), Aug. 18, from 1:30 p.m.—4 p.m. The second is at Glens Valley Conservation Club (Martinsville), Aug. 25, from 10 a.m.—2 p.m. The third is at Goose Pond Fish & Wildlife Area (Linton), Oct. 13, from 9 a.m.—1 p.m. The same material will be covered at all events—there is no need to attend more than one.

The workshops are for novice waterfowl hunters and those who want to try waterfowl hunting for the first time. All ages are welcome.

"We have had a wide range of ages, from 8 to 73," said DNR waterfowl biologist Adam Phelps. "All beginners are welcome."

Parents who already hunt waterfowl are welcome to bring children, but the material is tailored for beginners; experienced waterfowl hunters are unlikely to learn much from the workshops.

"We have had well over 100 people at previous events," Phelps said. "Feedback from

participants has been excellent and helped us fine-tune the presentations for this year."

Partly because of such feedback, this year's workshops will include some information on duck hunting but focus on goose hunting.

"Canada geese are definitely the easiest place to start hunting waterfowl, because they are abundant, they frequently use private land, and they are easy to identify," Phelps said.

Presentation topics will include waterfowl hunting regulations; goose and duck identification; and equipment and techniques, including a show-and-tell segment. Waterfowl hunting equipment, including blinds, waders, clothing, decoys and gadgets, will be displayed and discussed.

"Despite all the equipment you can use, we stress that you can hunt geese and ducks with a minimum outlay, so we focus on what you must have," Phelps said.

All workshops are free, but registration is required. To register for or get more information for the Winchester site, which is at 1464 N 500 W, call Wilbur Wright FWA at (765) 529-9581. Workshops will vary, but all will occur at least partially outdoors. Participants should consider bringing a lawn chair and weather-appropriate clothing (a jacket or raincoat).
