RELAX: DAYCARE WON'T RUIN THE KIDS

The Early Child Care Study, sponsored by the National Institute of Child Health & Human Development, has been following 1,300 children at 10 locales around the U.S. since 1991.

The good news gleaned from their research is these children are no more likely to behave aggressively than kids in the general population, according to researcher Susan B. Campbell of the University of

According to mothers and teachers doing the assessments, 17 percent of kids in daycare show aggressive behavior. But that included speaking out of turn, demanding attention, pushing, teasing, and fighting.

Only 6 percent of kids in maternal care behaved aggressively, which is far below the average. Researchers say that, when these children enter school, their percentages rise to the same percentage as in the general population. Their conclusion: These children have no other kids around, and they are much less likely to be aggressive with their

About 75 percent of U.S. children are in child care, and that isn't going to change any time soon. The best thing a parent can focus on is seeking high-quality care, say the researchers.

· Get kids to go to bed 15 minutes earlier, and another 15 minutes earlier every other day.

· Get a month-at-a-glance calendar so you and your children can see how your activities and responsibilities fit together.

- Stock a cleaning supply caddy with homework necessities: pens, pencils, glue, scissors, and more.
- Get together with the family and decide on your 20 favorite dinners for a month's worth of weeknight meals. Eliminate the hassle of making new menus.

QUARTER TO CROSS SPEEDWAY

Governor Frank O'Rannon, joined by federal, state and local officials, will unveil Indiana's commemorative quarter at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

The first 2,000 children under age 18 who attend will receive a free commemorative quarter fresh off the U.S. Mint press, and collectible coin and stamp memorabilia will be sold at the event, which begins at 10:30 a.m., Thursday, Aug 8. Until then, the coin is available only through the U.S. Mint in proof sets.

The coin design, based on a concept submitted by Josh Harvey of Centerville, features an Indy car against the outline DC the state, a circle of 19 stars and the state's motto, "crossroads of America."

There isn't a better location to make this coin available to the world than at the Speedway," OBannon said.

The ceremony will take place near the start-finish line adjacent to the pagoda. The coin will be escorted to the staging area after a quick spin on the 2.5 mile Indianapolis Motor Speedway track following a pace car, and one of the Brinks armored cars that will deliver the coins to Indiana from Mint facilities in Denver and Philadelphia.

During the event, the coins will he available only at the Indianapo-



lis Motor Speedway. Starting at noon, the coins also will be available at the Indiana State Fair and at 13 state parks throughout the state. They will be available for their face value of a quarter, both individually and in rolls of \$10. Sales at the state parks will end at 3 p.m. Purchasers will be limited to two rolls of quarters only as part of the first-clay sales.

Tony George, president of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, said he was delighted to host the unveiling and to offer the coins for sale in the Speedway gift shop.

"It's a huge honor to have an Indy car represent our state on coins that will be in the pockets and the private collections of people across the world," George said. "I'm sure that, if you come to the Speedway for events after the unveiling and you receive 25 cents in change, you'll take home an Indy car."

Vendors at the State Fair wifl begin giving Indiana commemorative quarters in change at noon, said Fair Director Bill Stinson. Additionally, sales of rolls and individual coins will be available at the DNR Building, also beginning at noon. (The 2002 Indiana Star Fair opens Aug. 7 and runs until Aug. 18.)

"We think our visitors will be as interested in getting the quarters





Select "New | Shortcut"

XP COMPUTER TIPS

Create a Keyboard Shortcut to Open a Folder

Do you have a folder to which you want instant access from anywhere on your computer? For example, if you want the My Music folder to pop up while Internet Explorer or Word is maximized, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the folder in Windows Explorer.
- 2. Create a shortcut, and place it on the desktop. (You create a shortcut by opening the folder, pointing to New on the File menu, then clicking Shortcut. Drag the shortcut to your desktop.)
- 3. Right-click the new shortcut, and then click Properties.
- 4. In the Properties dialog box, click the Shortcut tab, and in the Shortcut key box, enter a Control key combination or a Control–Shift key combination, (that is, CTRL+ALT+M or CTRL+SHIFT+M (when M is for music), and then click OK.

Anytime you hit the key combination you specified, your folder will open, even when other programs are maximized! This tip can be applied to folders, programs, and text file shortcuts that are placed on the desktop.

FUN FACTS

Thomas Edison invented the electronic bug zapper in 135 years ago, in 1867, while battling cockroaches in Memphis, TN. A dog - not a man - was the world's first skydiver. And the same genius who dreamed up the yo-yo also gave us parking meters and ice cream on a stick.

That's just a sample of the fascinating trivia I've uncovered while scouring books, magazines,

newspapers and the Internet. Here's more:

Levi Hutchins of Concord, New Hampshire, developed the first alarm clock in 1787, but the darn thing only rang at 4 a.m. — because that's when HE liked to got

Way back when, mattresses were stuffed with straw and supported by ropes stretched across the bed frame. If the ropes were nice and tight, you got a good night's sleep. And that's why to this day people tell one another to, "Sleep tight!"

Lunchmeat king Oscar Mayer's introduced his "Wienermobile" to America as an advertising gimmick on July 18, 1936. Regarded by many automobile aficionados as the most "provocatively elegant" specialty car in automotive history, the Wienermobile was manufactured by Chicago's General Body Company — and the weird vehicles still tour the United States today.

Son-of-slaves genius George Washington Carver developed peanut-based shaving cream, face cream, soap — and sham-

Believe it or not, in 1967, the American Typers Association invented a new punctuation mark that was a combination of the question mark and an exclamation point called an "interrobang." It was intended to be used to express disbelief — but it never caught on and like all bad punctuation, it just faded away.

The first lightweight luggage designed for air travel was dreamed up by none other than lady aviation great, Amelia Earhart.

TV's Mr. Whipple couldn't "squeeze the Charmin" if not for hero and super-genius Joseph C. Gayetty. Why? New Yorker Gayetty invented toilet paper in 1857. Before that, baby, you were on your own!

Good digital and film cameras cost an arm and a leg today, but in 1900, Eastman Kodak sold its legendary Brownie for a mere \$1.00!

Bet you didn't know that Ivory Soap was originally named Procter & Gamble White Soap. In 1879, big boss Harley Proctor switched it to Ivory after reading the 45th Psalm of the Bible: "All thy garments smell of myrrh, and aloes, and cassia, out of ivory palaces, whereby they have made thee glad." For the record, Ivory is STILL the world's only floating soap!

Fed up tavern boss James J. Ritty, of Dayton, Ohio, invented the cash register in 1879, not to help manage his money, but to keep patrons and drinking buddies from stealing all his profits!

Yo-yo king and marketing genius Donald F. Duncan — of Duncan Yo-Yo fame — also is

credited with inventing the parking meter and Good Humor "ice cream on a stick"!

French designer and businesswoman Gabrielle "Coco" Chanel introduced her first perfume in 1921 — the legendary and unforgettable Chanel No. 5. There were no Chanel No.'s 1, 2, 3 or 4 -Gabrielle jumped straight to No. 5 because it was her lucky number. To take even more advantage of her lucky number, she introduced her perfume on the fifth day of the fifth month, May 5. Chanel No. 5 went on to became the world's best-selling perfume.

Parachute pioneer J.P Blanchard helped kick off the sport of skydiving in 1795 when he ascended several thousand feet into the sky in a hot air balloon — and tossed a parachute-equipped dog overboard!

Here's a mind-boggler for you: Camel's-hair brushes are NOT made of camel's hair. They were invented by a man named Mr. Camel!

Cans for holding food might very well have been developed for the British Navy in 1813 — but the first can opener that actually worked wasn't invented until 1870!

Before the advent of storebought shampoos and rinses, people cleaned their hair any way they could. Check out this recipe for beautiful hair that was published in The New England Economical Housekeeper and Family Receipt Book in 1847: "Perhaps the best of all shampoos is the yolk of an egg beaten up with a pint of soft warm water. Apply at once and rinse off with castille or other hard white soap."
