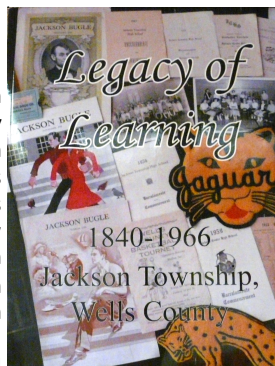

### SWNS DEADLINE

Small World Nursery School in Warren is a non-profit preschool, which has been serving the families of Warren and the surrounding area for over thirty years. Small World is still registering students for the 2011-2012 school year.

### FORM 11'S

The Huntington County Assessor's Office will be sending out Form 11's on Monday, June 20, 2011. The Form 11, notice of assessment of land and structures, is the taxpayer's formal notice of their assessment for 2011 pay 2012. The Assessor's Office chose to send the form to all property owners this year. The assessments for 2011 pay 2012 have increased for one of the following reasons:

Ag Land Base Rate. The base rate for 2010 was \$1290/acre and increased to \$1500 for 2011.

New Construction or completion since March 2, 2010.

Annual Adjustment (Trending).

We encourage all taxpayers to inquire about their assessments. You may access the current property record cards at [gis.huntington.in.us](http://gis.huntington.in.us). Please feel free to contact the County Assessor's Office Monday thru Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for any questions or concerns. The deadline to protest the 2011 pay 2012 is August 4, 2011. Protesting may be done by a Form 130 or a written letter indicating the taxpayer's name, address, parcel, contact phone number, and reasons for protesting. The Form 130 is available online at <http://www.in.gov/dlgf/8516.htm> in the Assessor's Office. We appreciate the taxpayers' interest and involvement in the assessment of their property.

### MY TOWN and Yours BY DENNIS STROUD

Before the coming of the oil men, people visiting Warren had no problem finding a room, but after 1890 it was a different story. Some of the wealthier men of the town began thinking about building hotels. William Perdue bought the lots on which the Masonic building stands and let a contract for the large brick structure. It took the better part of the summer to get the building finished. In the fall, the place was opened for business. It was not long before Hotel Warren was known all over this part of the county as an unusually good hotel for a town the size of Warren.

The large wood framed house, which stood on the lot before Hotel Warren was built, had formally been the home of Samuel Good, the banker, before he built his home on the corner of Main and Second Streets. This building was moved a few rods across the block to the corner of Second and Matilda Streets and then was torn down later to make room for the brick house where Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Herring lives now.

A year or two before the Warren Hotel was built; the Good business block was built to take the place of a big wood framed structure that had been occupied by a general store. That framed building was moved to the east side of the lot and used as a storage building until it was torn down in the 1940s.

The Salamonie Valley Museum will be open during the festival. The times will be; Saturday July 2, 10:00 to 4:00 and Sunday July 3, 1:00 to 4:00.

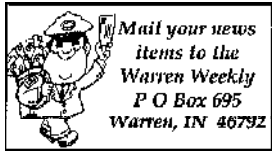

### MANURE/FERTILIZER

#### TRAINING

Category 14 Agricultural Fertilizer Applicator Certification training and exam dates have been scheduled for this summer. There are nine locations in Indiana. Registration is required in advance of the program.

Northern Indiana locations for the Category 14 training and exam include the following (an additional 3 locations are in southern Indiana):

- West Lafayette—July 26 (a.m.)
- Rensselaer—July 26 (p.m.)
- Wabash—August 5 (a.m.)
- Winchester—August 5 (p.m.)
- New Carlisle—September 9 (a.m.)
- Goshen—September 9 (p.m.)

These workshops are hosted by Purdue Cooperative Extension and Indiana Farm Bureau. Purdue Extension

specialists and educators will be the trainers for the program. Note that there will be no fee for the training and testing for these dates, however, no walk-ins will be accepted. There will be a limit of 100 registered individuals at each site.

Those who wish to sign up for the program can find a complete list of contact information for the exam sites at the following Web site: <http://www.ppp.purdue.edu>. A draft manual for Category 14 can also be found at this site.

The new rule called "Certification for Distributors and Users of Fertilizer Materials" takes effect on January 1, 2012. The Category 14 certification was initiated by the Office of the Indiana State Chemist (OSIC) to license individuals who must comply with the new rule.

There are two basic parts to the rule:

1. Those hired to apply, handle or transport fertilizer for agricultural purposes within Indiana must become certified through the OSIC by Jan. 1, 2012.
2. Anyone applying manure from confined feeding operations must become certified through the OSIC by Jan. 1, 2012.

A state law in 2009 was passed by the Indiana General Assembly to create the rule. It will be administered through the Office of the Indiana State Chemist (OSIC). Note that for the purposes of this rule "fertilizer material" is defined to mean both commercial fertilizer and manure from a confined feeding operation (CFO).

CFOs are livestock facilities that house at least 300 cattle or 600 swine or sheep or 30,000 fowl, such as chickens, turkeys or other poultry. There are about 1,500 CFOs in Indiana.

The Category 14 exam consists of about 70 questions. As noted earlier, the exam is free, although remote testing sites operated by a contracted vendor of H&R Block charge a fee. Passing the exam qualifies participants to be licensed. A five-year private applicator license is \$20, while a fertilizer business license is \$45 and good for one year. A one-year fertilizer distributor license is \$45 and requires no certification

exam. No extra license fees will be charged to those holding pesticide licenses.
