

### RED CROSS READY

"Giving blood is another way you can help your community be Red Cross Ready," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "Blood must always be therefor everyday medical needs, as well as for needs related to disasters."

Every day, regardless of the season, hospital patients need blood products like red cells, platelets and plasma for ongoing and emergency medical care. The Red Cross considers a three-day supply of blood safe and adequate for meeting the needs of hospital patients, with five to seven days optimal for emergency preparedness.

People with type O-negative blood are particularly in demand. Currently, there is less than a half-day supply of type O-negative blood. Only 7 percent of the population is O-negative, but it is the "universal donor," meaning people of all blood types can receive it. Because a single trauma patient can use dozens of type O-negative blood products in just the first few hours of treatment, a strong type Onegative inventory is vitally important. In addition, blood types A-negative and B-negative are urgently needed. Both supplies are at a half-day supply or less.

"Your blood donation helps ensure the blood supply is strong enough to withstand most any disaster-natural or man-made," said Whitman. "It's the blood on the shelf today that helps save lives."


