GARDENING RESOURCES

So, how popular is gardening today? The Garden Writers Association website (http:// www.gardenwriters.org/) mentions an increasing trend of vegetable gardening in the U.S. Per an August 2009 survey, almost half of American households with a yard or garden added or expanded a vegetable garden last year.

Home vegetable gardeners can find advice on planting vegetables, protecting gardens against pests and more from Purdue Extension. Folks can either contact the Huntington County Extension office directly or find university extension publications by searching the internet.

In Huntington County both Purdue Extension staff and volunteers are providing gardening education to the public. Master Gardeners from Huntington County hosted a free workshop at the library last winter which was called, "Planning Your Own Vegetable Garden." Two volunteers led this interactive program. Additionally there were two rain barrel workshops held recently at Hier's Park led by a group of **Huntington County Master** Gardeners. Inexpensive barrels were made available to participants at these sessions. They were then taught how to make modifications to the barrels to conserve water for use on their home gardens. All of these sessions were well attended.

It is important to mention that Master Gardeners Extension Staff are working together with youth gardening activities in the county this spring. This involves planting seeds and growing plants at schools and other venues. These activities coincide with other Extension youth programs focused on healthy eating.

Demonstration gardens are planted and tended by Master Gardeners at the Forks of the Wabash and the Salamonie Reservoir Interpretive Center each year. Spending time in these gardens is worthwhile for individuals who have the "gardening bug." The experiences help them better understand and appreciate a wide variety of plants.

Many resources pertaining to gardening can be found on-line. A new Web site called "Vegetable Tips: Resources for Easy Gardening" was launched last year. The site is organized chronologically and walks visitors through the steps in growing vegetables. The site includes sections on "Getting Started," "Planning," "Planting" and "Growing." New gardeners can find information on tools to use, crops to grow and budgets for a vegetable garden.

Rosie Lerner, Purdue Extension Horticulture Specialist, said the site combines resources from several College of Agriculture departments, including Horticulture and Landscape Architecture, Entomology, Agronomy, and Botany and Plant Pathology, as well as Purdue's Plant and Pest Diagnostic Laboratory. The vegetable gardening Web site can be accessed at http:// www.extension.purdue.edu/ gardentips/vegetables.




The Afghan visitors were very

The group studied the Indiana model of County Extension **Educational Programming** which is focused on four key areas: Agriculture and Natural Resources, Consumer and Family Sciences, 4-H Youth Development, and Economic & Community Development. They asked many questions to get ideas for garnering community support for educational programs in their country.

The visitors were appreciative of the interactions with Extension educators and clientele. They mentioned the many challenges that lie ahead of them. Much of the Afghan population is unable to read and Educational presentations in Afghan communities are mostly faceto-face with some diagrams to

explain modern farming methods.

Purdue University has had a presence in Afghanistan to assist farmers since 2002. The group mentioned the important work being done by Kevin McNamara from the Purdue Agricultural **Economics** department who has been involved with training the National Guard Agricultural Development teams from the U.S. (http:// www.agecon.purdue.edu/ extension/programs/ afghanistan.asp). Other Purdue professors including Rick Foster, Extension Horticulturalist, have traveled to Afghanistan to provide training to educators.

In Afghanistan approximately three out of every four people are involved with farming. The majority of the cultivated land in the country is devoted to growing wheat. This crop is mostly harvested by hand. Afghan farmers also raise a variety of fruits. Prior to the Soviet Union invasion of their country in the late 70's, Afghanistan was a large exporter of dried fruit. Presently the country is not self-sufficient in terms of food production. Agricultural imports are necessary to feed the Afghan people.

As one of the Afghan professors mentioned, "We started from zero after the fall of the Taliban in 2002. Stability is important and we have not had it in our country." There was clearly excitement in the eyes of the Afghan visitors to build a foundation of community support to educate their people.

ARE YOU PUTTING FACEBOOK OVER FACE TIME?

By Dr. Matthew B. James For NewsUSA (NewsUSA) - Today's technology allows us to stay in touch with extended networks of people but it comes with a downside. The more time we spend surfing the Web, tweeting or updating Facebook, the less time we

spend with those closest to us.

Among the thousands of people I've taught, I often hear people complain they have a hard time connecting with their spouses and kids. Yet, I'll bet many of them are well connected in Internet chat groups.

It is important to recognize whether technology is keeping you away from your family and friends. If you really have a problem regulating your use of technology, it helps to understand why you might turn to technology for fulfillment.

Do you feel like you are automatically turning on whatever electronic medium soothes you? This may be a sign that you have succumbed to what is known as the "iago trance" - a naturally occurring state of mind that lulls you into unconsciousness.

Huna, the ancient Hawaiian system of consciousness that I teach and practice, gives us tools to stay connected with the moment and the world around us. If technology is interfering your real-world relationships, cut out screen time and do activities that keep you out of the trance. Here are some tips:

- * Ask yourself whether technology is stopping you from meeting goals. At the end of the day, do you say, "I wish I had more time to work out, meditate, play with my kids or connect with my spouse"?
- * Make a list of things that prevent you from being connected to your friends, family and loved ones, and pick one that you're going to cut out.
- * If a particular technology has you hooked, try cutting it out for a week to see what difference it makes in your life. Ask yourself whether you're using it the way you originally intended, or is it keeping you in iago trance?
- * Lay down boundaries for yourself and your family. For instance, try keeping your Facebook page very private and not just "friending" anyone.
- * Find other "unplugged" ways to reduce stress, such as spending a few minutes outdoors in the fresh air or quietly in meditation or prayer.
