Do you think spring is in the making or are we going to go straightinto summer from this cold windy weather. I was at a garden center this week and many plants they had

out were totally ruined from the cold. I thought what a waste. I went there to get some pansies for the planter at my front door, so far they survived which they are a cold weather plant but not deep cold.

I am waiting on help for the flower beds I want here at my new home. I could hardly wait to see if anything had been planted around the house by previous owners, not much just a clump of tulips and a lily of some sort. So I think I have free range to do some things. I already have lettuce and spinach in a container planted and should be popping up very soon if it didn't get washed away in the down pours we got.

This weekend was a nice time at my home. The granddaughter from Florida was here with their new baby and was especially nice for Great grandma and Grandma Gayle to see the little guy for the first time. He was guite a traveler for 3 weeks old. All of us had a very $nice weekend other than the Floridians\ not thinking to bring some$ winter clothes and freezing.

So-on if we are lucky we can start thinking of those nice warm days and get the grills running. For me I sold mine so will make do some other way. My dad would clean off the gardens, we had 2 of them so we would rake off the remains and all the brush and yard stufffrom the winter and we had our annual hot dog roast and Mom made usually potato salad and either pie or cake. When the fire died down it was roasting just marshmallows (not s'mores). We always had a funtime and, the best part was having 2 gardens we got to do it twice.

I found a recipe you might like to try this summer using salmon. Dill Salmon On the Grill

Mixtogether1cup mustard, 2/3cup chicken broth, 1/2cup brown sugar, 1/4 white vinegar, 3 tablespoon soy sauce, 3/4 cup vegetable oil, 1/2 cup fresh dill chopped fine, 1/2 cup black pepper. Place about 3 pounds salmon in a large baking dish pour about 1/2 the marinade over the salmon, and refrigerate 2 hours. Coat the grill rack with non-stick spray drain the liquid off the salmon and discard the liquid, place skin side down on grill and grill on medium heat for about 5 minutes baste with remaining marinade and grilling on low heat for 7-9 minutes basting several times while grilling.





Use this moving checklist from the U.S. Department of Transportation so you won't miss anything important like checking out your movers with the Better Business Bureau and making an inventory of what's in your boxes, so you make sure everythinggets delivered.

Know your rights before you select a mover and understand any documentation you might be asked to sign. That way you'll know what to do if there's a problem like your possessions gettinglost or damaged. If you're moving between states, you may be eligible for liability options from your movers to ensure that your property stays safe.

Find all the forms in one place on USA.gov that you'll need to report your change of address $to \, continue \, getting \, your \, mail \, and \,$ any government benefits you receive. You'll find the post office change of address form, along with additional forms you might need for the Social Security Administration, Veteran's Administration, the IRS and your state's voter registration office.

Learn if you can claim your moving expenses on your tax forms. If you moved for a job or because you started a new business, you may be able to deduct some of your moving expenses. Find out if you meet the qualifications from the IRS.
