KUDOS, KICKS & KARATS

THE UPTOWN GARDENER

Just when we are all thinking of lower heat bills our thoughts are changed drastically. I thought that when we were having all that great warm weather in March we would suffer when April came. I read today that the earth rotates more slowly on its axis in March than in September. Maybe that is the reason March seems to go so slow for me and fall and winter gets here too quick.

Several have asked if the peas were up I planted on St. Pats day. Yes they are doing very well. Before the cold spell I knew the row cover fabric I use would not be enough to protect them. So I hilled dirt up over them and they just keep on growing. They are tough little plants. The potatoes did not get planted and probably won't for a while as they are best planted as the moon is receding after being full. According to the almanac May 11 is a good day for root bearing crops.

Our fruit trees suffered some damage, hopefully they will be ok as not all was in bloom. Lilac bushes are really sick looking and I don't see how they will bloom this year. Many of the perennials I covered over were still frozen and some I didn't bother with are ok. Mother Nature has its own strange way of taking care of things.

My little greenhouse is still keeping plants warm and have some really nice tomato plants and other vegetables and flowers. I will be glad when it all goes outside as the sunroom looks rather like a jungle.

I have also been thinking of what I might plant extra to have for the farmers market this year. It will soon be time to open it again for the season. We are hoping for the first Saturday in June and will keep everyone posted on it. I will be glad to get it started again and meet and greet old and new friends.

The rhubarb, which I only have one plant, is looking nice, hope to have enough to make pie and some jams of which I will bring jams to the market. I remember my dad always giving the rhubarb a good covering of manure in the late fall and we always had nice plants. Guess I need to remember to do it this fall.

Here is a recipe for rhubarb pie with a different flare. Try it you might like it. Til next time enjoy the sunshine if we have any and happy spring.

Rhubarb-Raspberry Pie

- 1 double crust pie shell for 9 inch pie
- 3 cups diced rhubarb
- 1 cup raspberries
- 11/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup tapioca
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon butter

Mix dry ingredients and add to the rhubarb and raspberries blending, fill the pie shell and add the butter to the top of fruit. Seal with the top crust and bake 450 degrees for 10 minutes and reduce heat to 350 and continue baking for 45 minutes.

TICK BORNE DISEASES

Warm weather season means more Hoosiers will head outdoors and it could mean they may encounter disease-carrying ticks.

State health officials advise Hoosiers to take precautions when they plan outdoor activities in order to avoid contact with ticks. These tiny pests, may carry Lyme disease, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, or Ehrlichiosis.

"Once the weather warms up, ticks get active," said James Howell, D.V.M., veterinary epidemiologist, Indiana State Department of Health. "Ticks, like mosquitoes, are carriers of a number of diseases.

"Not all ticks are infected and capable of transmitting illnesses, but all should be considered infectious and capable of transmitting disease."

During the last five-year time period, Indiana has averaged 27 cases of Lyme Disease, three cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and 2.8 cases of Ehrlichiosis yearly. All cases were from disease reports and confirmed said Howell.

Howell said exposure to tickborne illnesses can be avoided, if people follow a few precautions.

"We know that in order to become ill, a person has to be bitten by an infected tick, and that means a tick must be able to reach exposed skin," Howell said. "A little care can prevent that from happening."

Health officials recommend that if individuals plan to enter a grassy or wooded area, where ticks are often present, the best way to prevent tick-transmitted diseases is to wear a long-sleeved shirt and light-colored pants, with the shirt tucked in at the waist and the pants tucked into socks. The use of repellents provides even more protection.

Insect repellents containing DEET or picaridin can be sprayed on both skin and clothing to repel ticks and other insects. People

time should use products containing permethrin on their clothing. Permethrin is an insecticide that kills ticks and other insects on contact.

Howell recommends that after leaving a grassy or wooded area, people should check for ticks on clothing and skin.

Ticks need to be attached from several hours to a couple of days before they can infect an individual.

"If a tick is attached to your skin, it can be removed with either tweezers or forceps by grasping the tick as close to the skin as possible," Howell said. "Ticks should not be removed with your bare fingers, but if tweezers or forceps are not available, you can use tissue paper or a paper towel to prevent the passing of any possible infection."

Lyme disease symptoms include a persistent, slowly expanding blotchy red rash that is paler at the center than at the edges. Other symptoms include joint pain or swelling, especially in the knees; fatigue; difficulty in concentrating; headache; stiff neck or weakness of the facial muscles; dizziness; and an irregular heartbeat.

The symptoms of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and Ehrlichiosis are similar. They include a moderate-to-high fever, coupled with fatigue; muscle aches and pains; severe headaches; and chills. A rash also

develops, which usually first appears on the arms, legs, palms of the hand and soles of the feet before spreading to other parts of the body.

If these diseases are diagnosed promptly, all three can be successfully treated with antibiot-



The Tourism Promotion Grant is a matching grant that awards up to \$1,100 and is available to non-profit organizations in Huntington County for the promotion and encouragement of events that have a viable attraction for out-ofcounty visitors. Non-profit organizations that can demonstrate how their project furthers the purpose of increasing visitors to Huntington County are eligible to Tourism apply. The Commission's goal is to increase the number of overnight visitors to the community. Festivals and events that are two days or longer are viewed as more viable than one day events.

Grant monies awarded to successful applicants shall not exceed 50% of the total costs for promotions. Monies are available for promotional brochures, radio advertising, increased participant registration, billboards, advertising in trade or specialty publications, or any related promotions that will encourage overnight visits.

MY TOWN and Yours

When marijuana was legal—During the early days of World War II, the nations supply of hemp was shut off because of the Japanese invasion in Indo-China, the Government encouraged area farmers to plant this variety of marijuana plant so that the fibrous stems could be used for the manufacture of hemp rope.

During WWII, the commodity credit corporation purchased 43 acres from Haskil Daugherty on state road 218 at the edge of Warren for the purpose of building a mill to process hemp for rope for the armed services. The building was constructed by a Chicago firm at a cost of \$100,000.00. The main building was of brick and mortar, 500 feet long [one floor]. The entire plan, ground, buildings and all, represented an investment of \$235,000.00 by War Hemp Industries. Over 3500 acres were contracted by farmers in five counties with the majority of the crop

being in Huntington and Wells County.

War Hemp Industries purchased 31 harvesters and 30 binders to be used by the 29 harvesting rings formed. After the hemp was cut in the fields to dry for two weeks, it was bound and taken to the mill for processing. The stalks were brought into the main building and fed into a machine whose large rollers crushed most of the outer coverings. Women, stationed at the other end, received the straw and threw long "hands" over spiked blocks, pulled it through, to clean out whatever chaff was left. These combed "hands" were stored in another building until it was shipped to the rope factories.

The museum will be open now every Sunday 1:00 -4:00. Stop in and check it out.


