Continues at the Pulse Opera House

Do you long for the days of corny jokes, audience involvement, toe tapping songs, dancing, comedy acts and good old fashioned entertainment? "Under the Lamplight" just might be the show for you! In addition to the melodrama (complete with TWO villains) there are comedy and music acts between the acts. While the set is being changed behind the painted curtains, singers, dancers and comedians entertain you using material from the late 1800's - the early 1900's. (Warren residents might recognize some of the material from the early Pink Slipper shows.) Times may have changed, but a corny joke is still a corny joke!

The original roll drop was painted when the Pulse was originally restored 20 years ago. The painting was done by Archie Maxwell and Martha Roberts. Other roll drops for this production were created by Ron Wartzok and painted by Bart Willard. The costumes were built for this show by local seamstresses including Cynthia Smyth-Wartzok, Ruth Herring, Rita Hecht and Jan Carnes.

This melodrama has special effects recreated in the style of the late 1800's. You will feel as though you have been transported back to a time when downtown Warren was new. A time when the front streets of town had hitching posts for the horses. When women wore layers upon layers of clothing and made grand entrances to show it off. When the town glowed under the soft light from the gas lamplights.

GROWING GROCERIES

The Blackford County Extension Service will be hosting the program Growing Groceries beginning August 8th.

This educational program series will explore the basics of gardening and producing food for home use. Participants will plant a variety of cool-season seeds such as carrots and lettuce and learn how to preserve the harvest by canning, freezing, and pickling. Other topics include reading the food labels, food safety basics, container gardening, and how to get more vegetables in your diet. The other sessions are scheduled for August 22nd, September 6th, and September 13th at 10 AM at the Blackford Co. Fairgrounds. Participants do not need to have a garden to participate and there is no cost for the program, but registration is required no later than August 3rd to (765)348-3213.

FARMERS' MARKET

Beginning July 21st, Main Street, in Roanoke will be filled with an array of fresh, locally grown produce, breads, and flowers at the 2007 Roanoke Farmers' Market. Family entertainment will also be provided during the Market hours from 8

a.m. to noon. Main Street, between First and Second Streets, will be closed to traffic during the Market, but will re-open promptly at noon. The Market will continue through September 8th.

The Roanoke Chamber of Commerce is again sponsoring this year's Market. Main Street will become a temporary plaza for family and friends to enjoy Roanoke's beautiful downtown. Roanoke is easily located on U.S.-24, just eight miles southwest of Fort Wayne.

DINING WITH DIABETES

The Purdue University Huntington County Extension Office will be offering a Dining with Diabetes Class beginning Tuesday, August 14, 2007 at 6:00 pm at the Victory Noll Ministry Center in Huntington. Dining with Diabetes is a two hour class that runs twice a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, for two weeks. Class dates are August 14, 16, 21 & 23, 2007. The first hour of class is instructional with the second hour giving participants a chance to taste the simple, but tasty recipes. This class is open to those with diabetes, their family members and caretakers, and anyone who would like to learn more about healthy cooking. The classes are \$40 per person and pre-registration is required. Some scholarships may be available for those over the age of 60. Please register for classes by August 1, 2007.

You will learn how to prepare meals that are healthy, easy to prepare and taste good. Recipes will be demonstrated, and participants will have the opportunity to taste each one. Participants will also learn up to date information on nutrition, meal planning, exercise and how to understand common diabetes related medical tests. Recipes and handouts will be given to each participant.

Diabetes is a very serious and costly disease, but research has shown that those who learn to manage their blood glucose (sugar) levels, eat a healthy diet and exercise regularly can lower their risks of complications and lead a healthier and more productive life.

TRACTOR CONTEST

Area Tractor Operators' Contest to be held in Huntington County.

The Area XI Tractor Operators' Contest will be held at the Huntington County 4-H Fairgrounds, Hier's Park on Saturday, July 28. The location is a change from earlier information printed about this area event. Registration for this event will be in the 4-H Community Building from 8:30 – 9:00 am and the contest will officially begin at 9:00 am.

The Area contest will involve 4-H youth from northeastern Indiana competing in one of the four divisions – Lawn & Garden, Junior division for youth who have completed grades 3 through 7 and Senior division for those completing grades 8 through 12 and Ag Tractor, Junior division for youth completing grades 3-7 and Senior division for those completing grades 8 through 12. Each contestant, regardless of their division, will be involved in three different aspects of tractor knowledge and operation including a written test, identification of parts and tools and driving a designated course for their division competition.

The top two individuals in each of the four divisions will be eligible to participate in the State Fair Petroleum Power Contest on Saturday, August 18 at the state fairgrounds in Indianapolis.

DOG AGILITY

On Saturday, July 21 the 4-H Dog Agility Show will begin at 5 pm in the Show Arena at Hier's Park. This time is one hour later than the previously printed time of 4 pm. This change of time allows for the agility course to be set in the show arena following the 4-H Dairy Show.

Ginger Mustard Chicken

- 2 boneless skinless chicken breast halves
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1/3 cup chicken broth

- 1 teaspoon grainy mustard
- 2 green onions — minced

Salt and freshly ground pepper — to taste

Dust chicken lightly with flour. Melt butter in a skillet and sauté chicken over medium heat until brown on both sides, about 2-3 minutes per side. Remove chicken and keep warm. Pour broth into the skillet, increase heat and deglaze skillet by boiling and scraping loose browned bits on bottom of pan using a wire whisk. Add ginger and cook, stirring frequently, for 2 minutes. Stir in mustards and green onions. Season with salt and pepper. Spoon sauce over chicken.

* Sports massage: To help prevent athletic injury, keep the body flexible and heal the body should injury occur.

* Chair massage: Massage of the upper body, while fully clothed and seated in a special portable chair.

Finding a qualified massage therapist is also important. Ask your massage therapist about his or her credentials. And remember, each massage and bodywork modality requires specialized training.

AMTA, which requires members meet education standards, recommends asking the following questions:

* Did you graduate from a program accredited by the Commission on Massage Therapy Accreditation or from an AMTA member school?

* Are you licensed or registered as a massage therapist in this state? Not all states license massage therapists.

* Are you a member of AMTA?

* Are you certified by the National Certification Board of Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork?

* Do you have training in any specific massage modalities?

GIVING CHILDREN THE TOOLS TO LISTEN

(NewsUSA) - Having a child who doesn't listen is one of the primary sources of frustration for most parents. It is not uncommon to see parents constantly asking their kids, "Can you hear me? Are you listening to what I'm saying?"

"I think the real question is not whether they listen, but do they retain the information that is thrown at them, and the answer to that is no," said Dr. Mary Manz Simon, an early childhood educator in Odenton, Md. "Kids today are immersed in many different messages, and it is causing selective listening to rapidly become a defining characteristic of our current generation."

So then, how can parents effectively communicate to this new generation of listeners? Simon has several suggestions you may want to add to your parental toolbox:

* Make eye contact with your child before you begin speaking. This will avoid an across-the-house yell that your child may simply tune out.

* Have developmentally appropriate expectations. If you say, "Make your bed," be sure your child knows how to make his bed.

* Talk to your kids with words they understand. If you don't think they understand, ask them to explain what you have just said. This is a great test to see how well you're getting your message across.

* Capture teachable moments. For example, when watching a new

DVD with your kids, mention the way one of their favorite characters follows directions. Then compliment your children when they listen attentively.

Lisa Whelchel, former star of "The Facts of Life," best-selling author of the parenting book "Creative Correction" and mother of three, agrees with this approach.

"Some of the television shows or DVDs children watch have powerful messages in them," Whelchel said. "I feel it is important to include the senses, so capturing teachable moments through certain DVDs is certainly something I recommend."

Both Simon and Whelchel recommend the animated series "VeggieTales." The show can be seen on Saturday mornings on NBC and has a new DVD in stores now called "Moe and the Big Exit" that includes a lesson on following directions.

"I love 'VeggieTales,'" said Whelchel. "There is always such a positive lesson behind each episode."

"It's very easy to relate 'VeggieTales' back to actions you want your children to do, such as listening or following directions, which helps you when trying to capture those teachable moments," added Simon.

TIPS FOR KEEPING KIDS

OCCUPIED ON ROAD TRIPS

(NewsUSA) - On the road, drivers must deal with constant traffic concerns, including glaring sunlight, blinding rain, traffic jams, street signs and other drivers. But one distraction you might not have thought about is your kids.


VITILIGO Q&A
