non-profit organizations are available up to \$1.5 million to repair damage to real estate, machinery, equipment and inventory. Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) are also available to small businesses unable to pay bills or meet operating expenses.

Veteran and aspiring bird watchers alike have both Saturday morning and Tuesday afternoon options for organized outings at Ouabache State Park all summer long.

The Saturday programs, which start at 7 a.m., are scheduled for June 10, July 8, July 15, July 29, August 5, and August 26. Tuesday afternoon hikes with the Cardinal Bird Club are slated for June 20, July 18, and August 15. #### PREVENT IDENTITY THEFT

Tom Applegate, Director of the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs today offered tips to Indiana's 550,000 veterans on how to protect their privacy and credit information in response to the recently disclosed theft of personal data from the U.S. Veterans Administration.

"At no cost at all, there is an easy step you can take to prevent an identity thief from opening any accounts in your name: Place a fraud alert on your credit report," Applegate said.

An initial fraud alert is a consumer statement that gets added to your credit file and lasts for 90

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days. It alerts creditors of possible fraudulent activity and requests that they contact you prior to establishing credit in your name.

"Veterans may place a fraud alert for free by contacting any of the three major credit bureaus: Equifax, Experian or TransUnion," Applegate said.

A veteran himself, and possibly one of the veterans affected by the theft of this data, Applegate says he has already placed a fraud alert on his credit record. "The automated system walked me right through the procedure. It was very easy," he said.

"Once you place the fraud alert in your file, you are entitled to order free copies of your credit reports, and, if you ask, only the last four digits of your Social Security number will appear on your credit reports," Applegate said. "In the meantime, I am urging all veterans to carefully monitor the balances of their financial accounts. If you notice unexplained charges or withdrawals, you should not assume that there's been a mistake and do nothing. Always follow up with the business or institution to find

Other indications of identity theft include: failing to receive bills or other mail, which may signal an address change by the identity thief, receiving credit cards for which you did not apply, being denied credit for no apparent reason, or receiving calls or letters from debt collectors or businesses about merchandise or services you did not buy. Go to http://www.consumer.gov/idtheft/con\_steps.htm to learn more.

The Director noted that residents may get one FREE copy of their credit report every 12 months from each of the three major credit bureaus. Go to www.annualcreditreport.com to learn more.

"To track your accounts over the coming year, you may want to order a free report from one credit agency now, request one in a few months from a second credit reporting agency, and contact the third agency for your free annual report in nine to twelve months," Applegate said.

The Federal Trade Commission brochure, Your Access to Free Credit Reports, explains your rights and how to order a free annual credit report. This is available at www.ftc.gov.

Applegate also wants Hoosier veterans to know that the data on file at the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA) is secure. Sensitive information on veterans is secured after working hours and employees of IDVA do not take veteran data home.

#### **DINNER CHOICES**

by The Dinner Diva, Leanne Ely Buddy Hackett once said, "My mother's menu consisted of two choices. Take it or leave it."

That's what my mother's menu consisted of, too. We had the choice of eating the dinner she prepared or leaving the table hungry. If we didn't like what she prepared, we weren't allowed to make ourselves a PB & J. If we snuck a banana or anything else for that matter, we were in big trouble. Why? Was my mother abusive and mean? Was my family dysfunctional because the children weren't allowed to call the shots on what was for dinner? Am I in therapy now because I was made to eat my vegetables?

Nope. My family had issues like any other family, but it was pretty "normal". I've noticed however, that what was fashionable in the childrearing of yesterday is now considered barbaric and obsolete. Today, we are told, that if we "make" our children eat what's in front of them will develop eating disorders. Not giving children "choices" will harm their self esteem, so say the "professionals". The very words "eating disorder"

The very words "eating disorder" sends us into a tailspin. Consequently, after years of permissive parenting at the dinner table, we suddenly realize our children may have never eaten an honest portion of veggies in their entire young lives. In our perfectionism (and boy, parenting is the place where we wear our maternal stripes with pride!) we have been more concerned about our children's psyches than teaching them an important life skill - -eating nutritiously. Because we want to be better parents than our own parents, we want our children to have "perfect" childhoods with no conflict whatsoever. We buy all of that, don't we? And, to use a food analogy, the proof is the pudding--just take a look at the kids.

Childhood obesity is at epidemic proportions. According to the International Obesity Task Force, there are about 22 million children in the world, UNDER 5 that are overweight or obese! In another study, the Canadian Medical Association reported that obesity among young boys ages 7 to 13 yearsold, TRIPLED between 1981 and 1996.

That's just the children. What about the adults? In the United States, 7 out of 10 adults are overweight or obese (according to the Centers of Disease Control)! The problem of obesity or what we like to call Body Clutter, is a FAM-ILY problem. And we, the parents have a huge responsibility to teach our children how to be healthy (by eating right and exercising) and we do that primarily by example. You can't preach healthy living if you're

not doing it yourself.

Idon't pretend for a minute to hold all the answers to this and other child rearing dilemmas. Like you, I struggle with my decisions as a parent. However, as a nutritionist, I have to look at the statistics and they are absolutely mind blowing. That's how I want you to evaluate what I'm saying—look at this from a nutritionist's point of view.

Believe it or not the family dinner table is one place that you can make a difference in your family health quota. By serving a healthy, balanced meal at least once a day, you'll be making great progress. But the problem is schedules, sports, dance classes, band practice, church...did I miss something else that has you going almost every night of the week? We often find ourselves in the car at dinnertime schlepping kids to yet another activity during dinner time. Orwe're driving thru for a quick bite (and feeling guilty about it) or going out to dinner (again-there goes the family budget!).

How do we get back to the dinner table anyway? The first step would be to reevaluate your family's schedule. What is the reality of your schedule? Are you out of the house almost every night of the week? Can any of these activities be combined and done in one night instead of two? Can you eliminate anything?

If you're out nearly every night of the week, ask yourself these questions honestly: how often are you eating fast food? And even if you are eating fast food, how often are you making the healthiest choices on those menus?

The package's handy suggestions will also help you prevent food from spoiling, whether it's on your counter or the picnic table. Store foods at safe temperatures. Keep foods cold until you're ready to cook them, and don't thaw food on the countertop so bacteria won't grow. When you cook on the stove or the grill, use a meat thermometer to make sure food gets hot enough to kill bacteria and germs.

Don't let down your guard when you get takeout or eat out. The safest way to eat meat, poultry, eggs, and fish is to order them fully cooked. And when you take left-overshome, refrigerate them within two hours or throw them out. Make sure to reheat your food until it's hot and steaming to get rid of cold spots where germs can live.

Food safety rules can do more than keep food from going bad. Following the rules can head off serious illnesses. The bacteria, viruses, and parasites that grow in food can cause some nasty and serious symptoms, especially for infants, the elderly, and those with weakened immune systems. With the Summer Food Safety package, learn which foods often harbor bugs, so you can keep everyone

you serve safe.
