Tax Software Training: Friday, January 6th from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M. or 4:00 P.M. until 8:00 P.M., or Saturday, January 7th from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M.

All trainings will take place at Pathfinder Community Connections, located at 2824 Theater Avenue in Huntington.

The free tax preparation program begins on Tuesday, January 29th and runs through Monday, April 15th. Volunteers can work as many hours as they like and tentative hours for the program are Monday through Thursday from 9:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. and Friday and Saturday from 9:00 A.M. until noon.

2011 was the second year for the program and over 550 tax returns were completed by 20 volunteers with 162 families qualifying and receiving \$211,339 in Earned Income Tax Credit and a total of \$756.103 in tax refunds. The Farned Income Tax Credit (EITC), provides tax credits to working adults and families with low or moderate incomes. Funding for the program comes from NeighborWorks America, United Way of Huntington County and Rural LISC

PESTICIDE PROGRAM

Residents of Huntington and Whitley Counties and surrounding areas who are licensed private pesticide applicators in Indiana are encouraged to attend a recertification training session on Thursday November 29. This session will be held in two locations.

The first session will be from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m in Heritage Hall at Hier's Park in Huntington. Program registration will begin at 12:30 p.m.

The same program will also be offered at the Whitley County 4-H Center in Columbia City, IN from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Program registration will begin at 6:00 p.m.

This program will include the following topics and presenters:

Problem Weeds: Herbicide Resistance and Control Strategies by Travis Legleiter, a Purdue Extension weed specialist

Fertilizer Application Regulations Update for 2013 by Dave Addison & Ed Farris, Purdue Extension Educators

· A \$10 fee is required for those who wish to obtain recertification credit for attending the program. Attendees who wish to obtain credit are reminded to bring their Indiana Private Pesticide Applicator license number with them. Please pre-register by Nov. 28 by calling the Huntington County Extension Office at 260-358-4826 for the Huntington workshop or the Whitley County Extension Office at 260-244-7615 for the Whitley County program. Light refreshments will be provided at each location.

One of the topics presented at the Nov. 29th program is in regards to the Fertilizer Material Use. Distribution, and Record Keeping Rule, an Indiana law administered by the Office of Indiana State Chemist (OISC). The intent of the rule is to develop standards so that fertilizer materials (both commercial fertilizers and manures) are being handled and applied in a manner that will help ensure protection of our environment. Full compliance with this rule (355 IAC 8) is required by Feb. 16, 2013.

Note that his rule applies to anyone who uses or distributes fertilizer material (commercial fertilizer or manure) for the purposes of producing an agricultural crop. An exemption is made for those who apply less than 10 cubic vards or 4.000 gallons in a year. Additional information can be found on the

usually till the garden started coming on in the spring.

Thanksgiving Day was also a special day for rabbit hunting for all the male members who might have been at our home which was always my two uncles and cousin. I don't think even a blizzard could have kept them away on that day for two reasons , the hunting and Mom's cooking. Many good and precious memories of those days. I will share with you how Mom made her dressing if I can remember it all.

Cut up very dry dread into small pieces, usually enough to fill a 6 or more quart pan. Added enough chicken broth to make it moist and added 4 eggs, 1 cup diced onion, 1 cup diced celery, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, salt and pepper as desired, and if we were lucky to have extra money some fresh oysters. If needed she added more broth as she had it like a very thick soup. Baked it in a roaster pan covered for about an hour then uncovered and continue baking till the center tested clean with a knife inserted. She never used a real recipe just put it all together till it looked right. Many times I helped or watched her make it.

HAZARDOUS TREES

Tree failure is a major cause of residential property damage, as well as the leading cause of power outages nationwide. An ice storm can overload all the branches on a tree, a hurricane or high wind can blow down a tree if its roots are compromised, or a cracked tree can fail under its own weight.

"Homeowners who are worried about trees falling and damaging property should call a professional arborist for an on-site inspection.'

advises Tchukki Andersen, CTSP, BCMA*, staff arborist with the Tree Care Industry Association.

Andersen notes that trees are genetically designed to withstand most storms, but all trees can fail and defective trees fail sooner than healthy trees. A sound tree becomes potentially dangerous when the tree's woody structure is weakened by one or more defects. During storms, preexisting defects predispose trees to failure.

"To a professional arborist," notes Andersen, "defects are visible signs that a tree has the potential to fail."

Broadly defined, there are seven categories of defects:

- 1. decayed wood
- 2. cracks
- 3. root problems
- 4. weak branch unions
- 5. cankers
- 6. poor tree architecture
- 7. dead trees, tops or branches.

Healthy, well-maintained trees growing on suitable sites will be able to minimize the extent of decay and other defects. Trees that are stressed have reduced energy reserves, and therefore have less ability to deal with wounds and decay.

Most urban trees survive on construction-altered soils that may be compacted, poorly drained, high in clay, sand or gravel, very alkaline or littered with construction debris.

Additionally, many urban trees are subjected to chemicals such as de-icing salts, herbicides and fertilizers commonly used in landscape maintenance, Poor tree maintenance is another contributor to stress. These



cumulative stresses all take a toll on tree vitality and structural integrity, increasing the risk of failure

Defects and Decay

Professional arborists have an understanding of the factors that create or accelerate the development of defects in trees. They also understand that some species have growth characteristics that make them prone to certain defects.

All defects in trees cannot be detected, corrected or eliminated. Although a professional arborist can readily recognize most defects, there are root problems and some internal defects that are hidden. These trees may require in-depth assessments and specialized diagnostic tools. Homeowners should also keep in mind that defects change with time. A tree that looked fine three years ago may have severe problems today. By doing regular inspections, arborists can successfully manage the risk of tree failure.

Advanced decay and cavities result in less structural strength and reduced stability. Wood decay is an internal process with just a few external indications, such as mushrooms, conks, rotten or punky wood, cavities, hollows, holes, in-rolled cracks, and bulges in the wood.

The healthy layer surrounding the decay column is called the shell. If the shell thickness is thin relative to the size of the tree, the shell is

likely to fracture, causing the tree to fail. A tree can have internal decay and an opening and still be structurally sound provided that the shell is thick enough and the opening is not too wide.

If a tree is repeatedly wounded by the presence of in-rolled cracks. included bark, canker-rot fungi, or equipment (mowers, plows and weed whips), decay occurs in every annual ring of wood. These trees should be carefully inspected by a professional arborist because they do not form a sound shell of wood. The tree is likely to fail at or near the location of the crack or wound because a large and everexpanding column of decay is present there. Again. professional arborist can evaluate shell thickness and opening width to help determine the tree's potential for failure.

Find a professional

A professional arborist can assess your landscape and work with you to determine the safest course of action. Contact the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA), a public and professional resource on trees and arboriculture since 1938. It has more than 2.000 member companies recognize stringent safety and performance standards and who are required to carry liability insurance. TCIA has the nation's only Accreditation program that helps consumers find tree care companies that have been inspected and accredited based on: adherence to industry standards for quality and safety; maintenance of trained, professional staff; and dedication to ethics and quality in business practices. An easy way to find a tree care service provider in your area is to use the "Locate Your Local TCIA Member Companies" program. DEPRESSION OR JUST SAD? WHAT TO DO ABOUT EITHER.

by V Neil Wyrick Everyone has down days and the following suggestions will help whether actual depression or not.

To define depression is to begin to rid yourself of it. If you have lost interest in everything, have difficulty concentrating and are constantly restless an agitated you are certainly exhibiting some classic examples of depression. So what to do about it? And why

are you so afflicted?

It could be a chemical imbalance. At the famous Minrith-Meier Clinics - in an average week, 50,000 people visit for therapy. Seventy-five percent of these clients, says Dr. Meier, will have either clinical depression or some sort of anxiety disorder.

But there are other reasons and remedies as well.

Consider the findings of Andrew Newberg, director of clinical nuclear medicine at the University of Pittsburg who studied the brains of religious individuals who either prayed or meditated.

The study discovered a dramatic increase in action in the front region of the brain called the prefrontal cortex. The group also discovered decreased activity in a region of the brain known as the

superior parietal lobe.

Without going into so much detail you will be on the verge of earning your neuroscience degree let it be said that his final conclusion was that prayer and meditation have been shown to lower the risk of depression and heart disease and improve immune function.

During one of his lectures on mental health someone once asked Dr. Carl Menninger: "What would you advise a person to do if that person felt a nervous breakdown coming on?"

Most people thought he would say, "Go see a psychiatrist immediately," but he didn't.

Much to everyone's astonishment, Dr. Menninger replied, "Lock up your house, go across the railroad tracks, find somebody in need, and help that person."

Caring about and doing for other people has long been known to be an antidote for self-centeredness which is often one of the causes of depression.

How long ago did you complain about something? How long before you will complain again? Your answers may well define the depth of your depression or its lack.

Who are you presently mad at? How long have you been mad? If I asked you to consider forgiving who you are mad at would you consider it or would you say "No way." Your positive response to the question or negative response will define the depth of your depression or its lack.

Who are you with on a regular basis? When they speak are their thoughts most often negative or positive.

Quote to me what you have been hearing on a regular basis and I will tell you the depth of your depression or its lack.

Do you rejoice with your friends and weep with your friends and be a friend to your friends come what may? Your answer will define the depth of your depression or its lack
