WHODUNIT?

The Mousetrap Opens May 12 On a snowy afternoon in 1952, five travelers meet at Monkswell Manor. As the snow cuts off all access to the outside world, someone cuts the phone line. There are radio reports of a murder with no word as to where the murderer is hiding. Could there be a murderer on the loose at Monkswell Manor?

This classic Agatha Christie murder mystery is the longest running show in the world. Opening on November 25, 1952 at the Ambassadors Theatre in London, it is still running after more than 20,000 performances. The original Mousetrap was a 30 minute radio play, The Three Blind Mice, which was presented in honor of Queen Mary's 80th birthday. Christie based a short story on the radio play and eventually the short story became The Mousetrap. It was stipulated that the story not be published as a book as long as it was running as a play. It has still not been published in the United Kingdom.

Agatha Christie has said of the play, "It's not really frightening. It's not really horrible. It's not really a farce. But it has a little of all of these things and perhaps that satisfies a lot of people."

OFFERS GREAT BENEFITS

Barbara waits patiently in her tiny room covered with angel figurines both small and tall, with the temperature too warm for most.

The 43-year-old woman is awaiting a trip she makes four days a

A cerebral palsy patient with no mobility of her lower extremities and very limited movement of her upper body, Barbara Ruble, one of the many residents at the Warren Methodist Memorial Home that take advantage of the center's exercise room and pool, visits each the pool and exercise room twice a week.

The Warren Methodist Memorial Home Pool/Health & Fitness Center, open six days a week to not only residents, but also members of the community, offers various benefits to all kinds of people.

The exercise room features five treadmills, three bikes, an elliptical, two weight machines, a rowing machine, and a neustep, which is great for exercisers like Barbara who have either arm or leg disabilities because it moves the arms and legs simultaneously.

Barbara intends someday soon to be able to get back in a car, so exercise machines like the neustep benefit her greatly and move her forward in reaching her desired goal.

The room also has a big area with enough space to perform wheelchair exercises, mirrors on walls for exercisers to see their posture and balance, and stabilizing bars and balance balls for stretching.

The center offers classes like Tai-chi, which helps with balance and is slow-moving, and ballroom dancing lessons, as well as yoga, pilatte, and balance bar videos.

The Pool/Health & Fitness Center staff is also very accessible and helpful.

"The pool staff working in a noncompetitive atmosphere makes the exercise not only helpful but comfortable," said Monnie Boykin, who frequently exercises at the center.

Stacia Perry, the center's director is very optimistic about the results she has seen in those who come to exercise; and works with them to make them feel better and more at ease about their exercises.

The pool is great for warm water rehabilitation and therapy due to the 90 degree temperature and the hot tub jets located at one

The pool also includes a water wheelchair and parallel bars for those who have problems balancing themselves in the water, as well as separate men's and women's locker rooms, and a couple's locker room.

Many swimmers, some of whom needed a lot of coaxing just to step foot in the pool, have witnessed great results since they began their pool exercises.

"At the age of 85 I purchased my very first swim suit," said Georgia Pugh, a resident at the United Methodist Memorial Home in Warren, Ind. "I go to the pool not only for physical benefits, but also social and emotional benefits."
