4-H ANIMAL PRE-ENTRY

FORMS DUE JULY 1

The Huntington County Extension Office would like to remind all 4-H members who plan to exhibit animals at the 83rd Annual Huntington County 4-H Fair that animal pre-entry/pen reservation forms are due no later than Monday, July 1 to the Purdue Extension - Huntington County Office. These pre-entry forms were mailed to all youth enrolled in beef, dairy, starter calf, rabbit, poultry, goat, sheep, and swine projects during the 2nd week of June and are necessary to assist the various 4-H Fair livestock superintendents in determining pens and housing assignments for all animals to be exhibited during the annual 4-H Fair.

Horse & pony pre-entry forms were distributed through 4-H Horse & Pony club leaders and must be completed no later than Friday, June 28th and returned to the 4-H Horse & Pony club leaders.

Youth who did not receive these

forms in the mail should contact the Purdue Extension - Huntington County Office immediately to complete these forms to ensure sufficient pen space for their animals and planning for the various animal shows during the Huntington County 4-H Fair.

The 83rd Annual Huntington County 4-H Fair will be held July 12-26, with the livestock entry and shows at Hier's Park from July 19-24.

OPENINGS AVAILABLE

Small World Preschool in Warren is a non-profit pre-school, which has been serving the families of Warren and the surrounding area for over thirty years. Small World is still registering students for the 2013-2014 school year.

Classes begin in early September and end in early May. The 3-4 year old class attends on Tuesday and Thursday from 9-11:30 and the 4-5 year old class attends on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9-11:30 am or 12:30-3:00 pm, if the morning class fills up

and there are at least 8 children signed up for the afternoon class. Children must be 3 or 4 years old by August 1, 2013.

The cost is \$70 a month for the 3-4 year old class and \$85.00 a month for the 4-5 year old class, with a \$40 application fee. The registration fee increases to \$50 after June 30th and registration ends July 15th. Scholarships and payment options are available.

COUNCIL NOTES

The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, June 19 in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Marvin Surber opened the meeting at 7 p.m. All

in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

A citizen in attendance asked if Van Buren has an Ordinance concerning BB guns. Officer Collins said the Ordinance only states fire arms and is not specific as to what kind.

Another citizen was concerned as the progress to get local properties cleaned up. They were informed that two still are not in compliance and they are being taken to court.

Officer Pat Collins gave the Police report. He said that five of the eight residents receiving notices of junk and abandoned vehicles have complied.

He also reported that his patrol car is in need of tires. He was asked to get quotes.

Superintendent Rob Reeder gave the utility report. All meters had been read in June. A number of residents had been asked to mow their lawns. All but one lawn had been mowed.

He also submitted a list of possible streets in town to be paved. Council will check prices.

A citizen who came late to the meeting was concerned about a drainage problem on West Main Street. He owns a house on that street, in which the front yard was flooded from a storm drain during recent heavy rains. The back yard was flooded due to water running off a field behind the house. There was discussion about the situation. He was advised to contact the County Drainage Board to see if the county could help with the field drainage problem.

Council member Jerry Caudill thanked local officers for doing a good job directing traffic through Van Buren because of a serious accident on I-69.

Council decided to change the July meetings to July 10 and 24.

POULTRY TESTING

Wells County 4-H will host a poultry blood testing day on Saturday, July 6th, 9:30 AM-12:00 Noon at the Wells County 4-H Park Cook House Patio. The blood test is free.

Members are reminded of the health requirements for poultry which includes proof (certificate) that the bird originated from a National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) approved flock or a negative blood test for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days of the fair. Most birds that are purchased come from an approved flock and include a certificate or proof with the birds. Birds that are hatched privately may need to obtain a blood test in order to exhibit. Only birds not from a NPIP flock need to be tested. Waterfowl, turkeys and quail do not need to be tested.

Local veterinarians can also do the blood testing.

Salmonella pullorum and gallinarum (pullorum typhoid) are bacterial diseases that can produce heavy losses in chickens, turkeys and sometimes other poultry. Losses are greatest in very young birds, but can be seen at almost any age. Survivors of these infections remain carriers for life and can become sources of infections for other birds. As a result, chicks are hatched with the infection and frequently die. These diseases can be prevented by purchasing stock from hatcheries and breeder sources listed as participants of the National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP).

R. Scott Waddell, Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV), announced today that all BMV license branches will be closed Thursday, July 4 in observance of the holiday.

ILLEGAL DUMPING

A Lake Michigan angler caught more than he bargained for earlier this month when he reeled in an 8-pound, exotic Amazonian catfish commonly known as a redbait catfish.

The redbait catfish was caught at Portage Lakefront Park by Mike Durfee. It's native to South

America's Amazon River system and is a popular aquarium fish in the United States. The fish would not have survived the cold water of Lake Michigan during Indiana's winter.

Like many other aquarium species, the redbait catfish can grow large. The International Game Fish Association world record was caught in 2010 on the Amazon River and weighed over 123 pounds.

The fish Durfee caught likely was purchased when it was 2 to 4 inches long and raised in an aquarium until it outgrew the aquarium, according to Eric Fischer, aquatic invasive species coordinator in the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife.

"The first response of some owners may be to release unwanted fish into the closest natural water body thinking they are helping their pets out by setting them free," Fischer said.

It is illegal in Indiana to release not only aquarium fish but also all other fish into public waters without a fish stocking permit.

Snakehead, an aggressive and invasive fish from Asia, and hydrilla, an aquarium and water garden plant that forms dense mats, are examples of species that have become established in the United States in large part due to aquarium releases.

"Some aquarium fish, exotic snails, and aquarium plants can permanently disrupt the natural environment," Fischer said. "Exotic species impact our native wildlife by increasing competition for aquatic resources and introducing diseases."

A person who has an unwanted aquarium pet should pursue an alternative to illegally releasing it into the wild. Many retailers will allow you to return unwanted aquarium pets or will put you in contact with another aquarium enthusiast or local aquarium society that is capable of caring for them.

If you are unable to find an alternative the most humane disposal method is to place the plant or animal in the freezer and then dispose of them in the trash.

DEER LICENSE INFO

Determining which deer license you need should be easier thanks to improvements to the DNR's online sport license finder.

The website, dnr.IN.gov/fishwild/6486.htm, has been improved to include all deer license types.

Deer season, which begins Sept. 15 with the opening of hunting in designated urban zones, may seem far away. But hunters can apply online beginning July 1 for certain reserved deer hunts, including state park deer reduction hunts, and must have a license to apply.

Previously, the deer license finder only told users a deer license was needed to hunt deer. The new system allows users to identify the type of deer license they need depending on hunting equipment, whether the hunter is an adult, and whether the hunter is an Indiana resident.

Changes to the deer rules in the 2012 season confused some hunters about which deer license types to use, said Michelle Cain, wildlife information specialist with the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife.

"Most hunters know they need a deer license, but it can sometimes be hard to determine which license you need," Cain said. "The new system allows hunters to choose their equipment type and then gives them a list of licenses for that equipment type and what can be legally harvested."

Deer licensing options are numerous and range from a simple \$7 youth hunt/trap license for deer hunters age 17 and younger to a \$65 license bundle that covers all hunting equipment and allows for the harvest of one antlered and two antlerless deer.

The license finder also helps hunters and anglers determine what license they need to legally hunt or fish for all Indiana game species. It also includes prices, stamp privileges, and, in some cases, bag limits.

FIRE BLIGHT

Fire blight is a bacterial disease, which is potentially devastating to pears, apples, crabapples, and other related trees. Symptoms of fire blight are wilting shoots, cankers on branches and blackened leaves. The tree actually looks like it has been scorched.

Janna Beckerman, a Purdue University associate professor of botany and plant pathology, recently discussed that trees are more susceptible to fire blight if a freeze occurs after blooming, which is what happened in 2012.

Beckerman said afflicted trees might not have been properly pruned last year. Trees need to be pruned 12-18 inches out from the infected area.

"The disease spreads inside the tree beyond where it is visible," she said. "If it spreads to the main stem, then the tree will die quickly."

The bacteria overwinters in cankers on the twigs. During warm, moist weather, the bacteria ooze out of the cankers. The bacteria is then spread to other parts of the plant by rain, insects (especially honeybees), and pruning equipment. The

bacteria enters the plants through the blossoms and through wounds (including pruning cuts and damage from hail storms). The disease can work its way down the branches to the trunk. Some trees (especially younger ones) will not survive the disease.

Trees that regularly contract fire blight can be sprayed during bloom with either Streptomycin (fairly difficult to get) or with Bordeaux Mixture. These compounds are designed to prevent infection before it

becomes established, not after the infection is spreading. It is too late to spray anything to help the tree now.

If trees have multiple strikes, or cankers, homeowners may want to put off pruning until winter when it's easier to prune and dispose of limbs. If you must prune now, do so only when the weather is dry. Make your pruning cuts at least 12 inches below where you see the discolored, diseased wood. Destroy or dispose of diseased clippings immediately. Sanitize your pruning shears after every cut by dipping them in rubbing alcohol or a disinfectant like Lysol.

Before pruning, homeowners should review steps outlined in Fire Blight on Fruit Trees in the Home Orchard, a Purdue Extension publication authored by Beckerman to prevent further damage the tree or spread the disease. The publication is available for free download from The Education Store at <http://www.The-Education-Store.com>.

SAFE AT HOME

Each year millions of children are brought into emergency rooms across the country due to injuries, many of which occur at home. With many kids home from school this summer, now is a great time to brush up on the main causes of injuries to children, and more importantly, how you can prevent them. Use these tips compiled by USA.gov

You can childproof your home with multiple devices to keep your kids safe around the house. Window guards keep kids from falling in case they open a window when you're not in the room. Don't forget that the kids should wear a helmet even if it is just a friendly game of softball, or if they're taking a quick bike ride down the street. Encourage your kids to keep their safety gear on, and be a good example by also wearing helmets and padding when needed. As the summer temperatures rise, make sure to keep an eye on the thermostat in case it gets too hot for outdoor games.
