The mobile unit will be at Heritage Pointe, located at 801 Huntington Ave in Warren from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., on Wednesday. BMV Commissioner Andy Miller explained that BMV services available at the mobile branch include driver's license renewals, issuance of identification cards, vehicle registration renewals, and title transactions. D.P.A. TESTING

Digital Pulsewave Analysis (DPA) Testing will be available at the Warren Pharmacy on Tuesday 4/28/09. The DPA System measures the elasticity of the arteries and evaluates the health of your circulatory system. This is a safe and inexpensive method of evaluating conditions that lead to heart attacks, strokes, heart failure, kidney failure and/or sudden death. The

screenings include Abnormal Heart Rhythm, Aortic/Left Ventricular Ejection Time, Pulse/Heart Rate, Blood Hydration levels, Arterial Elasticity, Large/Small/Peripheral Artery Circulation or Blockage and a grade on the Biological Age of your Arteries.

This quick test involves placing your index finger in an LED sensor device. No blood, no needles, no invasion of the body. The test will be administered by DPA technicians Jerry Raush and Rachel Raush of Harvest of Health, Bluffton, IN.

There is a special integrity to being able to praise someone who is better rather than curse them for it. A case in point is a true story about Sir Walter Scott. For many years he was the leading literary figure in the British Isles. It was agreed that no one could write as well as he...that is until a review came out that named Lord Byron as the leading writer in the land. Eventually, it was discovered that the writer of the review was Sir Walter Scott himself.

Jealousy and envy walk hand in hand end up giving each other emotional and mental poison ivy.

How to handle it? Well, first look at the things about you that are really good and emphasize them to yourself. A great deal of jealousy grows out of a lack of self confidence. In short, even in a joking way stop making negative comments about yourself. Eventually you really will believe them.

Don't say you're not jealous when you are. You can't solve a problem you refuse to admit exist.

The husband, wife, boy friend or girl friend who is attracted to another person of the other sex because of their looks or intellect doesn't mean they want to carry this attraction any further than just liking what they see or hear. Do you want them to turn into the kind of person that is attracted to nothing or no one.

In closing lets take a look at jealousy and what it is and what causes it...whether it concerns sexual relationships, or jobs or athletic endeavors or.....

The basic cause for all jealousy is selfishness. Jealousy simply says, "You are doing or being what is making me unhappy. Stop it and start doing or being what will make ME happy." This creates what is called a conflict of interest.

Jealousy is a weed in the garden of life. There is no beauty to it. Neither party or parties can enjoy the good that is around it when this weed is taking over. It is bad enough to look down and see it has

COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met at 6:30 p.m. on Monday evening, April 13. President Bill Cartwright conducted the meeting. All in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

Kevin Drayer, from Salamonie Mills, was in attendance and expressed his concern about Council's consideration to make Railroad Street off limits to truck traffic. He was concerned because of the amount of grain trucks traveling on that street. Marshal Dennis Spitler and Curt Day are working on the project.

Council denied a request for a \$300 for an easement on the Minnich property.

Council passed a Resolution to update the personnel policy.

A discussion about the Feral Cat problem was tabled until the next meeting.

Council approved a street sweeping agreement with INDOT in the amount of \$450 per year for local streets which are state highway.

Curt Day reported everything is ready for the Heartland Aluminum project as far as the town is concerned.

Day also reported fluoridation is being phased out.

Work is scheduled to begin again on the Habitat House on April 18.

Grant money in the amount of \$31,825 has been received for a compressor for the Fire Department. Local match is \$1,675.

Alex Fiock has been hired as a summer employee.



His evolving interests in cosmology and astrophysics prompted him to erect a radiotelescope on the new Science Hall where he studies galactic rotation. He is engaged in active research on muon decay that retains his interests in nuclear physics.

Smith is a member of numerous professional organizations including the American Physical Society, American Chemical Society, American Association of Physics Teachers and the American Association of University Professors.



GET BIO-BLITZED

A "bio-blitz", an attempt to secure a detailed inventory of nature, will be jam-packed into one weekend at Brown County State Park, June 5-7.

The goal is to take stock of every living plant and animal species in the nearly 16,000 acres of Brown County State Park; you can help. A traditional bioblitz lasts 24 hours, but because the park is so large, the bioblitz is scheduled to run all weekend.

Brown County State Park needs volunteers to assist scientists and naturalists who will lead this inaugural event. Many volunteering will see areas of the park that are normally off limits to the public. The effort will yield a valuable record of common as well as rare, endangered and exotic (plant) species living in the park; it will help property staff to learn more about what resources are present and aid in better resource management decisionmaking.

"This will be a fun and important event," said Jim Eagleman, the park's interpretive naturalist. "It will give us a snapshot of the biodiversity of Indiana's largest state park. We encourage anyone who enjoys nature and the outdoors to volunteer; learning from today's scientists about their area of expertise will be a bonus!", he said.

Those visitors concerned about the physical demands of volunteering may wish to attend a talk with a researcher. Public programs presented by the park interpretive staff will highlight species being discovered during the 3-day event; visitors can also learn what environmental demands are facing today's botanists and biologists.


taken root. It is even worse to fertilize it.


