HOOSIER HOMESTEAD AWARDS

Lt. Governor Becky Skillman and Acting Indiana Agriculture Director Ken Klemme recently presented two local family farms with a Hoosier Homestead Award in recognition of their more than 150 year commitment to Indiana agriculture.

In 1851 the farm of Jack and Martha Buzzard was established in Warren in Huntington County. Jack and Martha and one of their sons are pictured above receiving their award.

In 1902 the farm of Guy and Carlene Jackson was established in Warren in Huntington County. Accompanying Guy and Carlene to accept their award was daughter, Karen Johnson and grandchildren, Jackson and Jada Johnson (pictured below).

"Hoosier farmers are part of the fabric of our great state," said Lt. Governor Skillman. "As we focus on leading and expanding agriculture's future, it is only appropriate that we pause to recognize these families who have continued our rich agricultural heritage."

The Buzzard and Jackson family farms join nearly 4,500 Hoosier Homestead farms. To be named a Hoosier Homestead, farms must be owned by the same family for more than 100 consecutive years and consist of more than 20 acres or produce more than \$1,000 of agricultural products per year.

WOW coordinator Linda Guthrie will begin the fourth series on September 17th at 7:00 p.m. in the conference room of the Wabash Friends Counseling Center. This first meeting will be an introduction to all the services that WOW provides. In addition, you will receive a packet of information that has area employer listings; career and leadership websites; specific employer application procedures; leadership development luncheon series information and many other resources to help you begin your journey.

After a wonderful response to the first three series, Guthrie is looking forward to providing tools and resources to aid additional women in finding the jobs they desire. Some of the participants have commented: "The workshops are balanced, informal, and packed full of awide range of information. I've learned so much the past few months, I can't believe how everything has fallen into place." "This is a wonderful service you are providing." "... a jump start in the right direction." There is a \$6 registration fee per workshop or \$30 for the complete series listed below.

Many women today are re-entering the workplace after staying home to raise a family, retiring from a successful career, changing life and/or career goals, or just want a new challenge. WOW provides women with a place to start making informed decisions toward this next phase in their lives. "The educational choices and employment tools for re-entering the workplace are vast. Other resources available to WOW women include: Leadership Assessments, Career Testing, Higher Education Degree Information, Career Counseling with one of the Counseling Center's professional counselors (sliding scale fee) and Individual Career Coaching. 



ARCHAEOLOGY MONTH

Hoosier history buffs can learn about archaeological sites and artifacts, make stone tools and talk with archaeologists during Indiana's 13th annual Archaeology Month, starting Sept. 1.

This year's slogan, "Travels in Time," conveys early Hoosier transportation and archaeology related to these types of sites. Sites and features related to canals, roads, railroads and waterways provide fascinating archaeological information about the past.

Gov. Mitch Daniels Jr. issued the official proclamation citing September to recognize the contributions of archaeology to the state and the clues it can offer about Hoosier history. Years of archaeological investigations have helped state residents understand the complexity of the prehistoric and historic people who also called this land home.

"Archaeology tells us not only about the past but sheds light about ourselves today and our future," said Robert E. Carter Jr., DNR director. "Archaeology Month provides a perfect way for Hoosiers to find out how with programs that are not only educational and informative but also fun."

In honor of this celebration, the DNR invites Hoosiers to discover the stories behind the facts of the state's archaeological tale. For instance, the state archaeologist works for the DNR. Also, archaeologists have done investigations in Indiana since the early 1800s, finding and recording more than 56,000 archaeological sites.

Recent changes made by House Enrolled Act 1129 to Indiana Code (IC) 14-21-1 expanded the definition of "artifact" to protect artifacts and features formed before Dec. 31, 1870, rather the old date of Dec. 11, 1816, thus increasing the number and types of archaeological resources protected in the state.

OSTEOPOROSIS SEMINAR

For more than 44 million Americans over the age of 50, osteoporosis is a major public health threat, according to the

National Osteoporosis Foundation. By the year 2010, it is estimated that more than 52 million women and men in this same age category will be affected and, if current trends continue, the figure will climb to more than 61 million by 2020.

Parkview Huntington Hospital recently introduced a new, minimally invasive treatment for compression fractures associated with osteoporosis, called balloon kyphoplasty, and will offer a free educational program on the new treatment at an Osteoporosis Seminar. The seminar is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 16, at Parkview Huntington Hospital in its lowerlevel classrooms 1-3, beginning at noon. A free boxed lunch and beverage will be provided during the seminar.

The seminar will be presented by Steven G. Wynder, MD, of Orthopaedics Northeast, who has an office at Huntington Health Park in the John B. Kay Medical Office Building.

Traditional treatment for vertebral compression fractures (VCFs) is limited to bed-rest, bracing and management of pain, often with narcotics. Although appropriate in some cases, this type of treatment does not address the deformity that can occur with multiple fractures. A balloon kyphoplasty treatment stabilizes the fracture, reduces back pain and restores height and spinal alignment.

Seating for the seminar is limited and registration for the program is required, with Sept. 11 the deadline for registrations. In the event that registrations exceed the number of seats available, an additional program will be scheduled.

Kids.gov is a great resource for finding lots of different career paths. There are many descriptions of jobs, including what an FBI special agent or a zookeeperdoes day-to-day. One federal job that's spotlighted on Kids.gov is that of Peace Corps volunteer. The Peace Corps is a federal agency that is devoted to world peace and friendship. While volunteering for the Peace Corps for a period of two years, young adults work overseas and learn skills that will help them prepare for other jobs later in life. If your child likes helping others solve problems, they might be a good Peace Corps volunteer. Log on to Kids.gov and find lots of other jobs to excite your child's imagination, from NASA astronauts and architects to research scientists and artists.

As your kids head back to school, Kids.gov's 1,300 web pages can assist them with homework and projects in math, science, and social studies. And with the election approaching, Kids.gov offers children the chance to learn more about the process of electing a president and vice president.

Kids.gov is fun, easy to navigate, and a great place to learn more outside the classroom. And it's not just for kids. For teachers, Kids.gov offers links to lesson plans and fun classroom activities like games for teaching kids about protecting their privacy online and using the metric system.

Ask SHIP

Q: I have a Medicare drug plan, but now it won't pay for my prescriptions because I've reached the "donut hole". Is there any help to pay for my prescriptions?

The coverage gap in Medicare

Part D is sometimes referred to as the "donut hole." This gap in coverage leaves many without coverage after they incur \$2,510 in total drug coverage. Part D enrollees must then pay 100% of drug costs until they reach catastrophic coverage at \$5726.25.

The most you will have to pay out-of-pocket is \$4,050. Once you have reached this limit, you will only pay a coinsurance amount of 5% of the drug cost or co-payment (\$2.25 generic, \$5.60 brand name) for the rest of the calendar year.

Many beneficiaries must find ways to lower their prescription drug costs during the gap. There are several ways to do this.

Compare drug prices at more than one pharmacy. Many pharmacies will meet their competitors' prices.

Consider generics for your prescriptions or consider less expensive brand name drugs. This will lower your overall drug expenses while still counting toward the coverage gap. Talk to your doctor about your options.

Many public and private charitable programs exist to help pay for drug costs. These include the National Patient Advocation Foundation and the National Organization for Rare Disorders. More information can be found at www.benefitscheckup.org.

If you are an honorably discharged veteran, you could use the VA drug benefit for \$8 per month per prescription. Call 1-877-222-8387 to apply. You must see a doctor at a VA medical facility before a prescription will be filled; a prescription from a non-VA doctor will not be accepted.

Many major drug manufacturers offer assistance programs for people enrolled in Medicare Part D during the gap in coverage. You can look to see if there are special programs available for each drug you are taking at www.medicare.gov/pap/.

Some beneficiaries may qualify for what is call Extra Help.

Beneficiaries are eligible for the extra help if they have limited income and resources. There is no gap in coverage if you qualify for Extra Help. The extra help can increase your cost savings by paying for part of the monthly premiums, annual deductibles and prescription co-payments for Part D plans. The extra help could be worth up to \$3,600 per year.

You may automatically qualify for Extra Help if you meet any of the following categories.

You have Medicare, full Medicaid coverage and live in a nursing home.

You have Medicare and full Medicaid.

You get help paying your Medicare premiums from the Medicare Savings Program (QMB, SLMB, QI).

You have Medicare and receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) but not Medicaid.

If you do not meet any of these categories, you may still qualify for Extra Help. If your annual income is \$15,315 or less (\$20,535 if married and living with your spouse), and your resources are \$11,710 or less (\$23,410 if married and living with your spouse), you may still qualify. You will need to apply. You can do this by calling the Social Security Administration (1-800-772-1213), visit www.ssa.gov, or apply at your local Medicaid office.

SHIP is a free, unbiased counseling program provided by the Indiana State Department of Insurance. For assistance, call your local SHIP site to make an appointment or call the state office at 1-800-452-4800 to obtain a list of local SHIP sites.
