A number of people were in attendance when the Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, September 19. The meeting was held in the Council Room at Town Hall. At 7 p.m. president Tony Manry called the meeting to order with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting

were approved as submitted.

Most of those attending the meeting were concerned about applications being made locally to spread manure on fields close to Van Buren. A discussion was held as to what steps can be made to stop this activity. They were advised of a number of meetings to be held concerning this matter. Also it was suggested they attend County Commissioners meetings.

There was still no word concerning widening of State Road 5 in front of the Library and making the sidewalk more narrow.

Officer Pat Collins presented the Police Report to Council.

It was announced that Mike Elliott has purchased the Lubritory.

Council voted to hold a Community Halloween Party, to be held in the gym at the Elementary School. Also Trick or Treat hours will be from 6 to 8 p.m. Halloween night.

Superintendent Jim Webb gave his report. All meters had been read in September. Four meters had been installed and two meters repaired.

Fire Hydrants are to be flushed the first week in October.

The wastewater inspector had made a good report.

The lagoons were reported to be low at this time due to lack of rainfall this year.

Town Clean-up for Van Buren has been set for the second week in October. No tires or appliances will be accepted.

The dump truck was scheduled to be repaired.

Plans are to work on drains on Ballard Street.

A citizen asked about who sets off the tornado siren in Van Buren. They were informed it can be done locally or by the County.

A member of the Popcorn Festival committee expressed their thanks to Superintendent Jim Webb for his assistance at that time.

The next Council meeting will be Wednesday, October 3.

The youth hunter must comply with all deer hunting regulations including wearing hunter orange, tagging the deer and checking it in to a deer check station within 48 hours of the take. The youth hunter may use a legal shotgun, rifle, muzzleloader, bow and arrow, or crossbow, to take the deer, but may possess only one type of equipment to take a deer while in the field. The accompanying adult cannot possess a firearm, muzzleloader, bow and arrow or crossbow while in the field with the youth hunter.

BEWARE OF DEER

As the days shorten, a driver's chance of hitting a deer grows, so drivers need to be careful as fall approaches.

Nearly 50 percent of all accidents involving white-tailed deer occur between October and December, according to Chad

Stewart, deer research biologist at the DNR. The most basic reason is the increase in deer activity.

With their breeding season approaching, deer become more active in the fall. This activity often leads them to encounter roads more frequently, increasing the opportunity for a collision. Factors such as deer density, vehicle density, surrounding habitat, speed limits, and time of day are other contributors to accident frequency.

"With the number of deer and the number of vehicles out there, deer-vehicle accidents will happen," Stewart said. "The best we can do is to take measures to keep them to a minimum."

The best method to reduce your risk of hitting a deer is to practice defensive driving. Knowing the following information will help reduce your chances of becoming a deer-vehicle collision statistic:

- Fall is most common season to strike a deer.
- Deer are most active between sunset and sunrise.
- Deer often travel in groups, so if you see one, another is likely nearby.
- Drive especially carefully in areas where you have seen deer before.
- Use high beams when there is no opposing traffic; scan for deer's illuminated eyes or dark silhouettes along the side of the road.
- If you see a deer, slow your speed drastically, even if it is far away.
- Exercise extreme caution along woodlot edges, at hills, or blind turns.
- Never swerve to avoid missing a deer; most serious crashes occur when drivers try to miss a deer but hit something else.

Drivers should pay attention to traffic signs warning of deer crossings they may be tempted

to ignore, and may want to steer clear of gimmicks.

"Deer crossing signs have proven effective, but motorists tend to get acclimated to such signs, and their efficiency can be reduced overtime," Stewart said. "Fancy whistles or reflectors can be placed on your car to scare deer away, but truth be told, they will only keep you from hitting unicorns or dragons."

Stewart said that even when practicing safe driving, sometimes hitting a deer is inevitable. Caution is also the best approach after the fact.

"If you hit a deer, remain calm," he said. "Do not approach the deer unless you are sure it has expired. Despite their gentle nature, their hooves are sharp and powerful, and can be extremely dangerous."

Stewart said that, like cars and people, deer can be found anywhere, so drivers should be on the lookout.

"Whether you're driving through the Hoosier National Forest, your developed neighborhood, or inside the city limits of Indianapolis, keep your eye out," he said. "Though a deer-vehicle accident can occur at any time of the day during any season, your chances of striking a deer are greatest at low light conditions between October and December."

"Take additional caution during these times, lower your speed, and be alert."

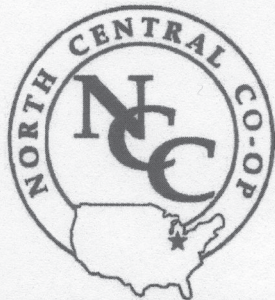

Cream together 1 cup lard or shortening 1 cup white sugar and 1 cup brown sugar Add 2 lightly beaten eggs and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Sift together 1 1/2 cup flour, 1 teaspoon soda and salt. Add 3 cups rolled oats 1/2 cup shredded coconut and mix all ingredients together. Form into rolls and chill several hours. Slice and bake. It gave no time or temperature but I baked them 345 degrees and for 7 or 8 minutes. I also added a teaspoon coconut flavoring for the extra flavor.
