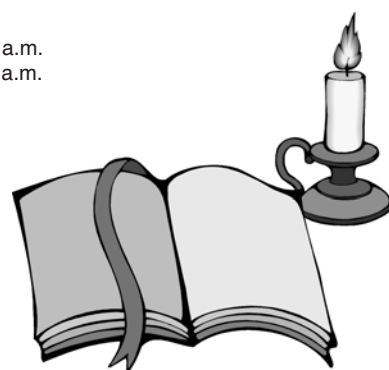

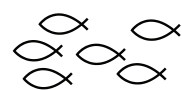

TEA PARTY

Saturday, July 4, 2009, on the Huntington County Courthouse lawn the second gathering of constitutional patriots will gather for a picnic lunch on the north lawn of the Courthouse. The event is planned to begin at 11 am with a small handful of speakers to be featured at noon. Barry Jamison will open the program with his own concert to be enjoyed by everyone. Nick's Kitchen and George's Doghouse will both be offering picnic lunch venues. A children's face painting booth will be open for their enjoyment.

The primary function, though, is to discuss, as American Patriots, our concerns regarding congress's "out of control" spending and usurpation of states sovereign rights and the financial burdens being placed on our children and grandchildren. for work at two other places in order to remain eligible for benefits. Claimants may apply for work in person, by mail, e-mail, or online, but must be able to document to DWD their job application and work search on their on-line weekly voucher. Previously unemployment insurance recipients needed only to conduct three work searches per week. All claimants are required to register for work at www.IndianaCareerConnect.com, post their resume and have their resume available for employers to view to be eligible for benefits.

New Wage Guidelines for Suitable Work. Unemployment Insurance recipients must accept any offer of suitable work.. HEA 1379 codifies wage requirements for "suitable work." During weeks 5-8 of receiving unemployment insurance benefits, a claimant must accept work that pays at least 90% of his or her previous wage. After 8 weeks of collecting benefits, claimants must accept work that pays at least 80% of previous wage.

The vast majority of changes mandated by HEA 1379, most notably the new tax schedule for businesses, will not go into effect until January 1, 2010. Hoosier companies will receive their new tax rate in a mailing during the 4th quarter of this year.

UNEMPLOYMENT CHANGES

On July 1, 2009 several changes to the unemployment insurance system went into effect due to the passage of House Enrolled Act 1379, the Unemployment Trust Fund Bill. Below are the key claimant components of this legislation that will go into effect July 1.

Claimants must submit one job application per week. For all vouchers filed after July 1, claimants must submit one application per week and look

A citizen in attendance presented a petition to Council asking that all members of the Van Buren Library Board be removed and that Stephanie Beck be reinstated as Librarian.

Officer Pat Collins recently presented Council with an Ordinance to review concerning skateboarding. Action is expected later.

4TH CELEBRATION

The Huntington County Historical Society and the Historic Forks of the Wabash Museum are collaborating to present an old-fashioned Independence Day Celebration on the lawn at the Historic Forks of the Wabash Museum.

The program will feature Mayor Simeon T. Cast and Jennie (Bailey) Cast, portrayed by David and Diana Dean with the help of Mathias Nuck (Charles Hayden) and his son Joseph (Matt Stephenson). The Erie Band, under the direction of Thaine Campbell, will present a prelude of patriotic songs and will also perform during the program. The Company Singers will lead in a sing-along of popular Civil War era music.

This will be the 11th celebration held at the Forks property, but is the first time the Historic Forks of the Wabash Museum and the Historical Society have collaborated in an effort to include the history of the city of Huntington, as well as the historical significance of the Forks of the Wabash.

The two museums have both recently undertaken expansion projects. At the Historical Museum, a building addition has been constructed and new exhibits designed. The 60' X 60' space will allow more room for telling the story of the development of Huntington County through expanded displays of agricultural history and the railroad, in addition to exhibits featuring the Wabash and Erie Canal, school sports, and business and industry in the county. The entire museum is undergoing a "face lift", which will include the creation of a changing exhibits gallery.

Free programs on a variety of topics related to Huntington County history are offered to the public at the Historical Museum on the 3rd Tuesday of March, May, July, September, November and December. Over 400 students from Huntington County schools visited the museum for educational tours in addition to privately scheduled tours for adults and children. The museum welcomes visitors Tuesday through Saturday.

The Historic Forks of the Wabash is a park dedicated to the preservation of historic buildings and artifacts. The programs and activities focus on the history of the Miami Nation, German settlers, Irish builders of the Wabash and Erie Canal, as well as the French Traders. Over 5,000 students from Huntington and surrounding counties participated in the educational school tours. This is in addition to the public events and privately scheduled tours. All tours and programs are facilitated by community volunteers.

To meet the growing interest, an expansion to the Visitor's Center is under construction. When completed, the new addition will double the amount of space for museum activities and gatherings. The volunteer organization is also responsible for maintaining and repairing the historic buildings located on the property. The "Nuck House" located on the property is in need of extensive repairs to weather-damaged timbers. A generous "matching fund grant" has been awarded, but additional funding and volunteer hours are needed to maintain the quality of the buildings and grounds.

The 4th of July celebration program is free to the public, with a free-will offering that will go the museums' projects. The event will be held on the grounds of the Forks of the Wabash at the intersection of US 24 and SR9. The program begins at 10:00 am, with free watermelon and lemonade following the program. The buildings at the Forks of the Wabash Museum will be open until 1:00pm with no admission charge. Due to limited seating, the public is encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets. In case of inclement weather, the program will be cancelled.

1/2 cup oil, 4 squares unsweetened chocolate melted, 2 cups sugar, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon pure vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup powdered sugar

Mix oil, melted chocolate, sugar, Blend in 1 egg at a time until well mixed add vanilla stir in salt, flour and baking powder. Chill dough several hours. Heat oven to 350 degrees drop teaspoonful into powdered sugar, roll and shape into a ball place 2 inches apart in greased baking sheet Bake 10-12 minutes. Makes about 50 cookies.
