YOU THINK YOU KNOW WHAT THANKSGIVING IS?

By the time we celebrate our Thanksgiving Day, Canada already has a two week jump on us. When my father was born on a farm over one hundred years ago, the official definition of Thanksgiving was a better fit, "The giving of thanks at the conclusion of the harvest season." I am sure that as a boy, in an America that was largely rural, he was thankful in many ways that later on I, as a city boy, never could identify with.

Ask most people what Thanksgiving Day means to them and they may say sitting in front of the TV and watching football games. Or, if so inclined, playing the game with friends and annual opponents. Or they may begin by noting what they will be eating too much of: turkey or roast pig, mashed potatoes, stuffin', gravy, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, corn, turnips, and a collection of favorite desserts.

It is interesting to note that since we are indeed a large melting pot, the above menu will have many different dishes and preferences. A Lebanese American family might dine on hummus, stuffed grape leaves, okra and lamb served over rice, stuffed squash and yes, the not to be forgotten turkey.

An Italian Thanksgiving meal might include antipasto, escarole soup and lasagna filled with sliced hard boiled eggs.

Whatever ethnic background, a look at the menus show a blend of the old and the new.

There will be talk of Thanksgivings past and what one can be thankful for today. Perhaps, a historian in the group will dredge up the fact that the first Thanksgiving prayer took place in the Virginia Colony on December 14, 1619. It wasn't until two years later that the Pilgrims set it apart as a holiday.

And the Pilgrims at this time were particularly thankful for a Patuxet Indian named Squanto. He had lived in England as both a slave and freeman and therefore was able communicate to them how to catch eel and grow corn. His skills as an interpreter saved them from many serious problems. Without his willingness and skills they might well have not survived long enough to be thankful for anything.

As to Thanksgiving, the turkey pardoned every year by the President is probably the most thankful of all. Flown to Disneyland as an honorary grand marshal in the annual Thanksgiving parade I am sure he would grin if only he knew how.

One thing is for sure, the Bible certainly thinks that the word Thanksgiving is important. There are 28 references in the King James Version.

Whenever a Thanksgiving Day play is put on by children or adults, the pilgrims are inevitably dressed in black. You may find it interesting to note that this is not necessarily the way they always dressed. Women's aprons, stockings and petticoats were as often red, earthy greens, browns, violets and blues as gray or white or black. The men were less colorful and leaned toward white,

HELP AVAILABLE

Medicare beneficiaries who have limited income and resources may qualify for extra help to pay for prescription drug cost. Nationally, more than 2 million people qualify to get Extra Help paying their Medicare prescription drug costs but don't know it. In Indiana, up to 174,000 may Hoosiers qualify for assistance.

The Social Security Administration estimates that Extra Help can save beneficiaries on average \$3900 per year. Some people are automatically eligible for the low-income subsidy or Extra Help. These are individuals who have Medicare and:

- · Medicaid
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) only
- · Medicare Savings Programs

A change starting in 2010 is those auto-eligible individuals as of 1/1/2010 will remain eligible until 12/31/2010. If at some point during the year, they are no longer in a category that receives auto-eligibility, their automatic status will end 12/ 31/2010. All others must apply for eligibility via Social Security Administration (SSA) and/or state Medicaid office. If you want to find out if you qualify contact your local Area Agency on Aging at 1-800-986-3505 or your SHIP office at 1-800-452-4800 for more information.

Thanksgiving celebration for our family is over for another year and what a nice day we had. A very nice dinner was at Treva and John's. The food was great and as usual too

much to eat.

There was a lot of good and happy conversation going as usual, with memories and funny stories that sometimes were not so funny when they happened.

One story I can share involves poor Treva. When she was about 6 years old we had in our yard a wishing well that my dad had made for me to set plants in during the summer. It was quite large. The girls were playing ball and the ball went into the well, being the good "big sister" Gayle lifted her in to retrieve the ball and then had to make a quick bathroom break before getting her out. While in deep thought in the bathroom she realized her favorite TV show was on and decided to watch it, leaving the little blond toehead stranded. She could barely see over the top of the well. After several attempts to get her dad's attention failed, luckily George Bergman walked down the street and having the ball yet she threw it up into the air and he came to investigate why the ball came up from there. He found the poor little girl in tears and about the same time Gayle told me she had left Treva in the wishing well. After retrieving her and drying her tears her comment was "sure ain't much to do in a wishing well." That was when momma nearly lost it trying not to laugh. Believe me our girls have kept us well entertained thru the years and they still do a good job today when they are together. I made cranberry salad to take for our dinner. FARMER TRANSPORTATION

There are some questions which make you stop and think before you can respond to them. Years ago old-timers might ask a question just to confuse you. One question that comes to mind is, "Do you walk to work or do you carry your lunch?" Maybe the best response to this question (after some head-scratching) is, "Well, it depends."

It seems every time Fred Whitford, coordinator of Purdue Pesticide Programs, is speaking to a crowd that he is asked a question in which he must respond by saying, "Well, it depends." Typically the questions being asked by those in the audience are in regards to state and federal farm transportation laws. Fred often will have to say, "Sir, I don't know the answer to your question right now, but I will find that answer for you." Fred can oftentimes make a phone call after the presentation to

find the answer to the particular question.

One example of a question that might be asked by a farmer is if he needs brakes on his farm trailer. The quick answer to this question is, "It depends." There are some exceptions to the general statement that Indiana state law requires equipment on the highway to have brakes. If the trailer is considered to be an implement of agriculture, then the answer might be "No."

A new publication (PPP-83) called "Transporting Farm Equipment" is available from Purdue Extension which helps address the transportation regulations governing implements and trailers pulled behind farm trucks and trailers. It can certainly be frustrating for growers to hear multiple answers to questions. The information provided in the publication will help growers do their part in keeping themselves - and others – safe. If you would like a copy of this publication, you can contact the Huntington County Extension Office.

The areas covered in the publication include: farm tractors, implements of agriculture (ie. wagons and sprayers), and trailers/semitrailers. There is also a section in the publication in which the reader can test their knowledge of transportation laws. In this section, pictures are shown of different scenarios that farmers might face in their daily lives. A question and answer is provided to help folks better understand how they can comply with regulations.

It is unfortunate that some accidents have occurred in the area during this harvest season involving farm equipment. As noted in this publication, the transportation regulations provide the standard for operating in the state, whether it is a car driven by your nextdoor neighbor or farm equipment traveling up the highway. One Indiana grower was quoted, "If we as farmers do not follow the existing rules, we may lose some of the privileges afforded to us."

Farmers may be overwhelmed at times with understanding these laws as they relate to their situation. Purdue Extension can assist you in finding solutions. 



These free materials help you facilitate conversations with your children by using educational cartoons and testimonies from other kids and by discussing smart techniques to help escape peer pressure situations. They also include a set of kid's coupons good for a dinner of their choice or "getting out of chores" when they complete the activities. And there's a contract that both you and they can sign that promises mutual respect and openness when discussing alcohol.


