IT DOESN'T ALWAYS HAVE TO BE A TEEN VS. PARENT FIGHT

from the American Counseling Association

Parents and teenagers are always going to disagree about some things. It's simply the nature of the beast.

You, as the parent, are the half of the relationship with experience, who knows the limits, who wants to protect your child and who hopes to help guide him or her in positive ways.

Your teenager is the half of the relationship who is not only dealing with physical and emotional changes, peer pressure, and the normal developmental growth of desiring more independence, but who has to also put up with all the rules, "those totally unfair rules", that you, the parent tend, to impose.

Yes, some conflict between parent and teen is inevitable, but there are things you can do to minimize the disagreements.

Start by remembering that you are the adult. Stay in control. Your teen may be trying to act grown-up, but often realizes deep down that protection and guidance are needed. Children want to be reassured that their parents are still in control, helping to guide the teen's life and development.

Most importantly, learn to listen! It's easy to be the busy adult, ignoring or misunderstanding your child. Instead, remember your own teen years and try to understand what your child is feeling and trying to communicate. Really listening to your child, understanding and respecting what is being expressed without being judgmental, can help strengthen and improve overall communication.

You also want to set limits, but limits with options. Your teens may argue, but they also understand that there are always limits to what is allowed. Instead of being a dictator, offer options whenever possible that keep things within limits but do allow your teen some freedoms. Choices are important to a growing teen, even if sometimes the wrong choice might be made.

You also want to build a relationship with your teen, not one where you are your teen's best friend, but rather one as an

EXTENDED DEADLINE

There is more time to get registered to learn about nature and then share your knowledge with others by becoming an Indiana Master Naturalist through Ouabache State Park.

Ouabache State Park has partnered with Friends of Ouabache State Park, Wells County Purdue Extension and Limberlost State Historic Site to host an Indiana Master Naturalist class from March 14 through May 9 on Wednesdays from 9 a.m.-noon.

The Indiana Master Naturalist Program is an educational/volunteer program developed by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources and Purdue University Extension to provide Hoosiers who love experiencing and then sharing nature with others by learning through hands-on educational opportunities. Participants will learn about Indiana's plants, water, soils and wildlife at local sites.

The fee for the class is \$75.00. Registrations are due by March 5. SAFE SITTER CLASSES

Lutheran Children's Hospital is now enrolling participants for its first Safe Sitter® class of the year scheduled for April 3. This coincides with spring break week for multiple area school systems. Safe Sitter is an instructional program that teaches girls and boys how to handle emergencies when caring for young children. Classes incorporate basic first aid skills, CPR, how to change diapers, how to screen babysitting jobs to decide which ones to accept and which ones to decline and how and when to talk to a 9-1-1 dispatcher.

The classes are taught by Lutheran Children's Hospital staff and prepare babysitters to confidently handle normal situations and crises. The training also dives into how to be safe with social media and obtaining resources online for appropriate children's activities.

Registrations are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, and class size is limited. The cost for the class is \$60, and it includes a Safe Sitter backpack / kit.

But as time went on, I grew to adore this child, filled with ideas for having fun and enjoying life. This is a photo of me when I was four. As an adult, when I look at this photo, I know what this child went through by the time she was this age. I'd been hospitalized three times, with each stay being a week long. My parents were constantly worried about my

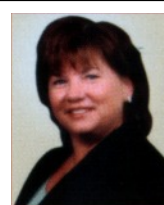

PARKINSON'S DISEASE

Dr. Hermanowicz also suggests that caregivers prepare for the next appointment by considering the following statements and speaking to their loved one's PD specialist if any of them apply.

- I have observed my loved one interacting with things, seeing things or sensing things that are not there (hallucinations).
- My loved one has had false beliefs toward me or others, such as believing someone is stealing from them or being unfaithful (delusions).
- These experiences have affected our daily life.

how to connect with a pain specialist in the area. Patients can share information from the app with their physicians who may decide to use the information to tailor a treatment plan and assess what may not be working with their current approach.
