## LAYMON RECEIVES LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Presented for Outstanding Contributions to the Independent Telephone Industry

WASHINGTON – The Organization for the Promotion and Advancement of Small Telecommunications Companies (OPASTCO) is pleased to announce that it has presented its Lifetime Achievement Awards to Gordon Laymon, President/general manager, Citizens Telephone Corporation in Warren, Ind. While in Korea, Laymon was an instructor for other men in the Army on communication service, and also taught them how to climb and work while on a telephone pole—not an easy feat!

After the death of his father in 1969, he became president and general manager of the company. Under his leadership Citizens Telephone Corporation has become a leader in the industry providing CATV, Direct TV, Internet, DSL and is its own toll provider.

Mr. Laymon is very involved in community projects including the installation of new sidewalks and working on restoration of the Pulse Opera House where he sits on the board of directors. He also managed the renovation of his church and parsonage.

Laymon has taught Sunday school at the United Church of Christ in Warren for 50 years, and also served as a deacon and chairman of the board of trustees.

Laymon's dedication and commitment to his community is greatly appreciated by one and all. OPASTCO thanks Gordon Laymon for his outstanding service to the telephone industry.

## STATE TAX CREDITS

The Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP), administered through the Community Development Division of the Indiana Department of Commerce, awards state tax credits to not-for-profit organizations working on projects that benefit economically disadvantaged individuals and areas. The credits are awarded annually and are deductible in the year the donation was made.

The tax credits help attract donors to the organizations by allowing their contributions to work as credits against their state tax liability. Contributors to NAP projects receive a credit against their state income tax liability in the amount of 50% of their contribution. (Example: \$100 minimum contribution = \$50 tax credit) In addition, if the agency is a qualified 501(C)(3) nonprofit agency, the entire donation is tax deductible on the federal tax return!

"These organizations are working to build a stronger Indiana, and we're proud to be a partner in their efforts," said Lt. Governor

Joe Kernan, who serves as director of the Department of Commerce. "NAP tax credits make it easier for organizations to raise money for their projects, and the end result is increased services, a better quality of life and improved communities all over the state."

On Monday evening, July 22, the Warren Town Council met in Town Hall Annex for their regular meeting. President Harold Jones called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

Local Postmistress Sheryl Horst and Suzette Gephard, representing the United Methodist Memorial Home Post Office, presented Council and the Fire Department with a framed hero stamp.

Bids for the Wastewater Project were scheduled to be opened at a special meeting on Thursday, July 25, at 4:30 p.m. in the Annex.

Council adopted Ordinances 2002-2 through 2002-10, pertaining to DCD, Ordinance, Plan Commission.

No decision was reached in a vote concerning fenced in ponds in town.

In a special meeting on Wednesday, July 24 at 6 p.m. Council was to discuss the Budget and Spectrum Engineering was to be in attendance.

It was announced that blue boxes are expected to be available from Solid Waste about Aug. 1 for townwide recycling program.

Harold Jones reported on a CEDIT meeting he attended in Huntington. A number of topics had been discussed, but no action was taken.

At the W.H.A.R.M.M. meeting, hosted by Warren, there had been a good attendance. A discussion was held on Animal Control.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison had attended a Budget meeting, BLGF on July 22 at 9:15 a.m. at the Courthouse in Huntington. Certified assessed value figures from the Huntington County Auditor will not be available until later in the budget process.

The Utility/Street Departments had put up flag poles and were still working on electricity at Langton Estates.

Fire Chief Tim Ford reported the installation of a new repeater system is on hold until the County completes their plans.

Ford said the Festival went well.

The 19th Annual National Night Out (NNO) is an event that fights these misconceptions while letting law breakers know that the jig is up! People in neighborhoods won't stand for crime, drug dealers, and shady characters near their homes. They're watching for them, and the police stand ready to take action on anything they report.

NNO is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch. Together with people living in our towns and cities, they are working to make our neighborhoods better places to live.

Time for family fun

Last year, people in all 50 states, Canada, U.S. territories, and military bases participated. In all, about 32 million people got to have some fun and got to know their local police officers at the same time.

The event isn't all serious business. Often a carnival-like affair, it may include block parties, cookouts, parades, flashlight walks, contests, and youth programs.

Celebrations differ from one locality to another, but the theme is always the same: We fight crime by uniting against it, trusting our local police, and being ready to report anything that is illegal or unusual in our neighborhoods.

This year, you could start a new tradition by deciding to make NNO an annual summer event. It's growing and becoming more fun and more meaningful with each passing year.

### VAN BUREN COUNCIL

The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, July 24, in the Council Room at Town Hall. At 7 p.m. president Tony Manry called the meeting to order and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

Council voted to purchase three turn out gear for the Fire Department at an approximate cost of \$3,900.

It was decided to delay demolition of the old water plant until after the Popcorn Festival.

Officer Wertherington presented the Police report. All officers on the force are expected to be on duty during the Popcorn Festival.

After the Festival, a list is to be compiled of junk and abandoned vehicles.

Engineer Ken Smith reported on activities concerning the new water plant. Plans are also underway to do smoke line testing.

Superintendent Jim Webb reported that all meters had been read in July. One meter had been installed and one meter repaired.

The new water plant was reported to be running well with only minor problems.

Other activities of the town employees included installation of a No Parking sign, patching streets, getting ready for the Popcorn Festival.

Fill dirt is being hauled to the sight of a Habitat House to be built soon.

Work had been done on Fifth Street.

Council voted in favor of a drainage project.

A letter was to be sent to a resident concerning a torn-out sidewalk which poses a dangerous situation.

One dog had been picked up.

On Aug. 4, John Brane is to receive the Community Service Award during a ceremony at the American Legion.

Mosquito spraying is expected to begin before the Popcorn Festival.

The Wastewater Inspector had been here.

A Public meeting is set for Aug. 2 for a Planning Grant.

Also, Budget meetings are set for Aug. 1 at 6:30 p.m. and Sept. 4 at 6:30 p.m. preceding the regular Council meetings.

### OUTDOOR CONCERT

The second in the summer concert series: "Parlor Music" at Myer's Ice Cream Parlor will feature Nicole Thrift Johnson as the entertainer. The concert will take place on Friday, August 9th on the

lawn behind the ice cream parlor. These outdoor concerts are sponsored by the LaFontaine Arts Council and Myer's Ice Cream Parlor. The concerts are reflective of past "afternoon and evening with the arts" programs sponsored by the LaFontaine Arts Council. Like the afternoons and evenings with the arts program, the goal of these summer concerts is to promote local talent from the county and heighten awareness of the arts in our community. So many times a community is unaware of the outstanding talents in and around the area.

A freewill offering will be taken after each concert. Proceeds will be directed toward the arts council's yearly scholarship which is awarded to a county student focusing on a fine arts education. The scholarship is just a part of the "Arts in Education" annual programming sponsored by the LaFontaine Arts Council in Huntington County. This programming takes place in the schools each year and features a wide range of presentations, including the Ft. Wayne Philharmonic. Each student in the county in grades K-12 encounters a facet of the "Arts in Education" curriculum.

The August 9th concert will feature female vocalist, Nicole Thrift Johnson. Nicole is a Huntington native and has entertained audiences since the age of five with her contemporary sound. She graduated from Ball State University and is an Investment Representative for Edward D. Jones. Nicole has traveled the area entertaining groups with her vocal talent. She most recently appeared in the Red Stocking Follies and was a featured performer during the "Relay for Life" fundraiser. Her sound system will be provided by Monte Seiberns, a favorite with Huntington residents.

Myer's Ice Cream Parlor provides the venue for the concerts and also offers the availability of

refreshments for those in attendance. Rod & Jeanne Myers are the proprietors of the parlor.

The public is invited to attend and enjoy these free concerts. It is suggested that attendees bring a blanket and/or chair.

Besides the concerts, the LaFontaine Arts Council upcoming calendar includes the Regional Art Show & Sale beginning August 9th through August 30th at the Wilson Gallery at the Merrilat Centre at Huntington College. Art exhibits from artists in Northern Indiana are featured.

A fall fashion show/brunch fundraiser will be held October 19 at the North Star Civic Center on Saturday, October 19. SteinMart will provide the fashions and emcee. #### CELEBRATE 100TH

Indiana's own Jim Davis, creator of the popular Garfield comic strip, is helping 4-H in America celebrate its 100th birthday. Davis, a former 4-H'er whose father founded the Lake Galatia 4-H Club in Fairmount, IN, has created a limited edition Garfield print that is only available online at [www.ebay.com](http://www.ebay.com). A total of 54 numbered prints, "Celebrating 100 Years of 4-H (1902-2002)" featuring Garfield and the 4-H Pledge, have been produced. Each 15x35-inch print has been hand-signed by Davis.

A print is offered weekly on eBay with proceeds divided equally between the National 4-H Council and a specific state 4-H foundation. Print # 39's auction week, benefiting the Indiana 4-H Foundation, is fast approaching: Au-

gust 4th - 10th. To view the print, go to [www.ebay.com](http://www.ebay.com). In the Search box, type, "4H Garfield" then click on "Find." Detailed information and step-by-step instructions on how to bid are provided at this site. The minimum bid is \$250.

The weekly eBay auctions of the 4-H Centennial Garfield Prints began November 18, 2001 and have raised more than \$30,000 to date. More than 8,000 visitors have experienced the 26 auctions to date with 510 bids placed.

Median selling price is \$1,200. The highest bid so far is \$1,650 (Texas).

The Indiana 4-H Foundation issues a challenge to all Hoosier 4-H supporters to earn more money for their state 4-H foundation than any other state! 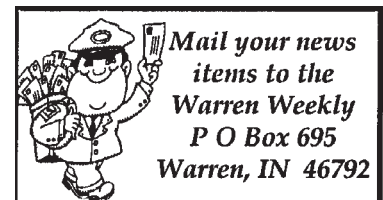

### CLEAN YOUR HOUSE THE NATURAL WAY

Be kind to Mother Nature and save money, too — here's the battle plan!

YOU can clean everything from fabrics and furniture to the kitchen sink with safe and effective cleansers that cost only pennies — because you make them yourself!

That's the word from author and herb expert Susan Ambrosino, who explained in a recent issue of her Herb Report newsletter how you can clean, polish, disinfect, deodorize, launder and remove stains without poisoning yourself or the environment.

Here's a sample:

- Make a great air freshener by dropping a few slices of lemon, lime, grapefruit or orange in a pot with enough water to cover the citrus. Simmer gently for an hour or so. If you use aluminum pots, the citrus actually will clean them while freshening the air!

- To keep drains smelling sweet and flowing freely, pour a half-cup baking soda down the drain and follow with a half-cup of vinegar or lemon juice. The mixture is sure to buzz and pop but wait a full 15 minutes before flushing with hot tap water.

- Window cleaner is easy to make and use. Simply saturate a rag with lemon juice and wipe glass. Buff lightly when done.

- To clean your toilet, simply drop a vitamin c capsule or two in the bowl and leave overnight. Swirl toilet brush around bowl in the morning and flush. No scrubbing required!

- Clean plastic or vinyl shower curtains with a vinegar-saturated sponge to remove soap buildup, mildew and mold. It works like a charm.

- Make a reusable furniture-cleaning cloth by mixing a half-teaspoon olive oil with quarter cup vinegar or lemon juice. Dip soft cotton rag in solution and use for

dusting, polishing and shining wooden furniture.

- All you need to clean soiled wallpaper is a slice of white bread. Rub it over the soiled area—then sweep crumbs off the floor below!

- You don't need laundry bleach—just add a quarter-cup vinegar to your wash cycle instead!

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### LAKE OF THE WOODS SHIMMERS

Lake of the Woods, a 416-acre natural lake near Bremen, Ind., is a new sparkling spot for white bass, often called "silvers." Indiana Department of Natural Resources fisheries biologist Bob Robertson reports that white bass, not found at Lake of the Woods until just a few years ago, now make up a large portion of the lake's fish population.

"Although I am concerned about the white bass population explosion affecting abundance of other species, there is a silver lining for anglers right now.

Anglers are catching white bass up to 20 inches long," said Robertson.

Local anglers report fast action on spinners, minnows, and other fish-like lures. Robertson recommends casting into "shimmers" on the surface caused by small fish trying to escape from feeding schools of white bass. Ultra light tackle or fly rods can enhance the fishing experience.

There is no size limit on white bass, but there is a daily bag limit of 12.

Lake of the Woods anglers may also hook into walleye. DNR biologists stock the lake each year with thousands of young walleye.

A public access site is located on the southwest shore of the lake.
